

The Winnebago Indians used their extra day in February to secure their second consecutive trip to the Nebraska State Basketball Tournament to be held at the State Capitol on March 10th. The Indians once again packed Rice Auditorium on the Wayne State College Campus to claim their second straight District Championship against a rough & tumble Hartington Cedar Catholic Trojan team by a score of 60-44. Indian's fans lined the streets of Wayne early in the day to land a seat in the packed venue, outnumbering their counterparts 2 to 1. The Indians didn't disappoint their fans battling for 3 quarters before extended their lead to 16 points when the clock went blank. The Indians handled a tough Guardian Angel team from West Point in the sub-district final, 67-58, and a good warm up game against Wakefield in the sub-district opener, 86-45, in Pender. The Indians leave today for Lincoln, and will face 20-7 West Holt in their tournament opener at Lincoln Northeast High School, at 8:45 pm, March 10th. 

Indians.com... Lakota Country Times: Activists continue battle to close Whiteclay

RAPID CITY – A mixed group of Native and non-Native residents of Nebraska are again calling for the closure of the town of White Clay.
In early February Native American activist and citizen of the Winnebago Sioux nation, Frank Lamere, joined Nora Boesem a resident of the small South Dakotan town of Newell and other activists met with Nebraska Governor Pete Ricketts, top aides, legislatures, and the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission to lodge complaint about White Clay.
White Clay is a town located adjacent to the Pine Ridge Reservation just across the South Dakota and Nebraska border. Despite having a population of only 14 people the town has multiple alcohol outlets that sell over 4 million cans of beer each year. The vast majority of money being funneled through Whiteclay comes from the reservation where alcohol is illegal and where

alcohol abuse is rampant. Once purchased at Whiteclay the alcohol is then smuggled by residents across the border on to the reservation where it is legally classified as contraband.
Despite knowledge of these acts the state of Nebraska has opted to not take any action against the town amidst pleas from activists, reservation residents, and tribal governmental officials.
The group who met with the commission are advocating for lawmakers and the Governor to stop the sale of alcohol in Whiteclay and to actively enforce the law.
The group spoke to the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission at length about the ongoing problems associated with Whiteclay, Neb. Nora Boesem, of Newell, NE, who has taken in over 150 foster children and has adopted twelve special needs children of their own, all affected by Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD), drove home the impact that alcohol sales are having on the reservation.
"I come to you because every one of the children in my home has been affected by Whiteclay," speaking of the

effects of FASD.
Other activists in the group stated that one in four on Pine Ridge are estimated to be effected by FASD, saying that it has turned into epidemic proportions since Whiteclay, Neb. started selling alcohol to the residents of Pine Ridge.
John Maisch, former Assistant Attorney General of Oklahoma, said to officials "Fetal alcohol syndrome may just be Nebraska's number one export."
The group has planned an educational conference on addiction and FASD, geared towards social workers, teachers, and other community professionals, with continual educational credits (CEUs) in Whiteclay at the Lakota Hope Center on May 19-20. LCT will have a detailed story about the conference in the coming weeks. The conference will be open to the media and early-registration tickets are being sold now for anyone in the public that would like to attend.

He had a way of making you feel like you were his favorite and when pressed, each of the kids would insist they were indeed the favored child. Howard was very proud of his family and he loved to hear about their adventures and escapades.

Howard died peacefully at Heritage Nursing Home in Emerson, Neb., and he spent his last days surrounded by family.

WINNEBAGO, Neb. | Howard T. Bassette Sr., 85, of Winnebago passed away Saturday, February 20, 2016. Howard was a member of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska, and his Ho-Chunk name was Hesgeja Maniga, which means "Walks in Truth."

Services were held on Wednesday at St. Augustine's Catholic Church in Winnebago, with the Rev. David Korth officiating. Burial took place at the Winnebago Indian Cemetery, where he was laid to rest next to his wife. Visitation took place at the Ho-Chunk Center in Winnebago, with Roland Warner in charge. Arrangements were under the direction of Winnebago Wake and Funeral.

Howard was born on July 18, 1930, to Allie Hunter and Horace Bassette. Howard attended Marty Indian School up to the sixth grade.

Howard married Pamela Alice Earth in 1951. They were married for 52 years and had eight children. The couple lived in Waukegon, Ill., and Denver, Colo. They returned to Winnebago, where they raised their family. Howard retired after 30 years of service from the Village of Winnebago as the director of maintenance and water operations.

Howard was an active and lifelong member of the St. Augustine's parish, where he was an usher for several years. Howard often arrived at the church before the priest, and Father Steve Boes gave Howard his own key to the church in the early 1990s. Father Boes asked Howard to make sure the parish doors were always open and that the lights and



Physical Resources Department Update...

Greetings Friends and Relatives, my name is Joseph Painter III. I recently have been assigned to the position of Physical Resources Director on an Interim basis while the position is being advertised and filled. I would like to congratulate Mitchell "Mick" Armell on his recent retirement and commend him on a job well done for his many years of service to the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska and Winnebago Community.

I have been asked to offer up some information on behalf of the current happenings of the Projects and Programs under the Physical Resources Department of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska. Currently there are seven (7) programs under the Physical Resources Department, they are: Tribal Facilities and Grounds Keeping, Tribal Roads, Tribal Housing and Emergency Home Repair-Senior Housing, Tribal Construction, Tribal Transit, Wildlife and Parks and the Environmental Protection Department.

I will describe Program-by-Program some of the general responsibilities and major projects the Programs have undertaken.

Tribal Facilities and Grounds Keeping – James Price Sr., Manager

General maintenance and upkeep of all Tribal buildings, property, and grounds including mowing, snow removal, landscaping, custodial services and major and minor structural repair/renovation.

Vehicle Services – provides basic mechanical services including tire service, tune-up and oil change, troubleshooting vehicle problems, etc.

Wake and Burial Services – assists the Wake and Burial Director with the needs of a grieving family during the wake and burial process.

Tribal Utilities – Provide safe public drinking water, waste water and solid waste services.

Tribal Roads – Elmer Baker Sr., Manager

General maintenance and upkeep of all Tribal and BIA road routes within the exterior boundaries of the Winnebago Indian Reservation, including snow removal and mowing.

Special projects may include moving of materials and debris, construction demolition and dirt work, residential snow removal, etc.

Tribal Housing/EHR-Senior Housing – Ireta Blackbird, Manager

Management and maintenance of all Tribal housing units under the Tribal

Housing Program.

Provide Emergency Home Repair services to eligible home owners (Tribal Member or Senior Citizen) that qualify through the application process.

Tribal Construction – Ron Nohr, Manager

Provide oversight of all special projects of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska including request for proposal/qualification development, construction/renovation project management, contract development, negotiation and execution.

Assist and advise the Winnebago Tribal Council and Programs on projects that may have an impact on the Winnebago Indian Reservation or Winnebago Tribal Property.

Administer Community Water & Sewer Indian Health Service Projects and Bureau of Indian Affairs Road Program.

Tribal Transit – Herschel Snowball, Manager

Provide affordable transportation services to and from businesses in the South Sioux, Sioux City (Western Iowa Tech) and Sloan, Iowa areas from Winnebago, Nebraska. A schedule of stop and pick-up locations can be found at www.winnebagotribe.com.

Wildlife and Parks – John Snowball, Lead Conservation Officer

Enforce the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska hunting and fishing code on the Winnebago Indian Reservation.

Provide wildlife management for all regulated game animals, water fowl, birds and fish.

Provide Animal Control services within the Village of Winnebago.

Environmental Protection Department – Byron Walker, Manager (Acting)

The protection of water from contamination and pollution, both surface and groundwater, from agriculture fertilizers and pesticides and other agricultural production activities.

The protection of ambient and indoor air from contamination and pollution.

The protection of soil, water and air from contamination and pollution from the improper disposal of solid waste or hazardous waste.

Public Notice: Request and Extension of Time for Comments

**U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region 7
PROPOSED Synthetic Minor Source Permit
Thurston Manufacturing Company PERMIT R7-TMNSR-FY16-001**

Public Comment Period: February 12, 2016 – April 12, 2016

This public notice is issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Region 7 (EPA). EPA is extending the period for submitting comments on the draft Synthetic Minor Source permit for the Thurston Manufacturing Company (Permit Applicant) facility located at 1708 H Avenue, Thurston, Nebraska 68062 within the exterior boundaries of the Winnebago Indian Reservation.

Extension of time to submit comments: This comment period will end on April 12, 2016.

The Permit Applicant's facility contact is James Harral, Safety Director [Phone: 402-385-3041]. The facility produces agricultural equipment and side-dump trailers. If finalized, the EPA's issuance of this permit would regulate air pollutant emissions associated with a spray paint booth, plasma cutting table, shot blast machine, parts washer, welding operations, and fabrication machines with plasma torches.

The EPA has adopted regulations codified at 40 CFR sections 49.151 through 49.161, establishing a Federal Implementation Plan (FIP) under the Clean Air Act for Indian country. This FIP includes federal minor new source review (MNSR) regulations for the protection of air resources in Indian country. The EPA is charged with direct implementation of the program regulations where there is no approved Tribal implementation plan. This draft permit has been developed pursuant to 40 CFR §

49.158 which creates an air permitting mechanism for major sources that wish to voluntarily limit emissions to become synthetic minor sources. The draft permit includes emission limits that reduce the facility's potential emissions of volatile organic compounds (VOC), hazardous air pollutants (HAP), particulate matter (PM), PM10, and PM2.5 to less than major source thresholds. The draft permit includes monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements necessary to assure compliance with the emission limits.

HOW TO PROVIDE COMMENTS: Any interested individual may submit written comments on EPA's draft permit for the Thurston Manufacturing Company facility. Comments must specify any reasonable ascertainable issue with supporting arguments in writing by mail or e-mail to:

The EPA will consider and respond to all comments received by the end of the comment period in making the final decision regarding the issuing of the permit. Similar comments may be grouped together in the response, and the EPA will not respond to individual commenters directly.

Please note that all comments will be included in the administrative record without change, and may be made available to the public, including any personal information provided, unless the comment includes Confidential Business Information (CBI) or other information whose disclosure is restricted by statute. Thus, CBI or other protected information should be clearly identified as such, and should not be submitted through email. Emails sent directly to the EPA will capture your email address automatically and will be included as a part of the public comment. Please note that an email or postal address must be provided with your comments if you wish to receive responses to comments submitted during the public comment period and direct notification of EPA's final decision regarding the permit. An extension of this comment period may be granted if the request adequately demonstrates why additional time is required to prepare comments.

Will there be a Public Hearing? If EPA determines that there is a significant amount of public interest in the draft permit, the EPA will hold a public hearing. Any request for a public hearing must be in writing by mail or e-mail and must state the nature of the issues proposed to be raised in the hearing. The request must be received by the end of the comment period. If a public hearing is held, the public comment period will automatically be extended to the close of the public hearing.

The EPA will review and consider all comments received during the comment period. Following this review, the EPA may issue the permit as drafted, issue a modified permit based on comments, or deny the permit. The final permit action will be in accordance with 40 CFR section

49.159 and posted on the EPA website.

MOLD – If a tenant sees a spot of mold starting to grow, call the office and report to Resident Services, Ruby Bellanger or Owenah Sharp. They will share information on what to do to get rid of the mold in its earliest stages. Please don't wait until it grows. The primary cause is lack of ventilation around areas that create more than normal level of moisture in the air. The mold can be different colors: yellow, red, white and black. Resident Services can show you the products to use and how to use them. Call them at 878-2241.

PETS – The lease says “no pets”. We know it's hard to say “No” to children when they see “a cute puppy.” If you must, keep up with the puppy as it grows and take good care of it. Create your own “pooper scooper” and pick it up after every outing. NO ONE likes to step on the poop, be it on a sidewalk, street or yard. Children should not have to play in areas with the poop. It is unhealthy for them to say the least. With warm weather coming, be prepared, for health's sake

BED BUGS – We have had 5 or 6 calls for help with bed bug infestation this past year. The critters come into your house on people. In their clothes and personal belongings like backpacks, purses, stuffed toys, pillows and blankets. Be careful with “sleepovers”. Pestbusters costs an average of \$600 for the first visit. Tenant is charged one-half of the bill, which is dependent on the # of bedrooms. Again, call Resident Services to request the service. All exterminating services are done on the 4th Thursday of the month. Ruby or Owenah can inform you of the preparation work required before the service.




