Bago Boys say Thank You to their Fans



"We would like to thank everyone from the bottom of our hearts for supporting us this past year. We are grateful to be a part of the change in so many lives, not only here in Winnebago but across the nation", says the Bago Boys. The Winnebago Indians were not successful last week in Lincoln as they went down with every intention to repeat as State Basketball Champs, but came up short against a team that had the game of their life. "I tell my team that they play for the fans, play for the School of Winnebago, play for the Tribe of Winnebago Nebraska, play for Indian Country, play for our families, and play for respect for native people", said Coach Jeff Berridge. Although they did not come home with 1st place honors they still came home Champions, beating another team, Amherst Broncos, who also brought an undefeated record to the State Tournament, for the Consolation Championship, after a single overtime, 74-73. When asked about his plans for next year, Coach Berridge says "I am here to keep Winnebago Basketball alive, and it won't die as long as I am here to save it. I am here to build a dynasty, I am here to compete with the best of the best, I am here to make this trip every year and trust me we will be back."







WINNEBAGO COMMUNITY SURVEY RESULTS




Ho-Chunk, Inc. has two mission set for it by the founding Tribal Council in 1994.

Mission #1 is long-term economic development for the Tribe.




What is the most important benefit that Ho-Chunk, Inc. has provided to the Winnebago Tribe?

In My Opinion

Thoughts from the State Tournament...

Winnebago had a great boys basketball season, but fell short in the semi-finals and finished the season with only 1 loss and ranked third in the state. A great season by any measure. But something about it bothered me.

Like the rest of our community I followed the team by watching highlights on facebook, going to a few games, listening to a few games on the radio and even watching some online. The team was great fun to watch. They could shoot. They played great defense and played with great emotion. But the team only had one big guy and he sometimes was the point guard. The lack of a constant low post power player was always going to make winning the state championship a tough hill to climb.

Don't get me wrong, I have picked a side and was 100 percent in Winnebago's corner. What was worrying me was the growing pressure these young high school kids were under to win. It was like they had become the face of the entire community and carried the burden of the tribe itself on their young shoulders.

It wasn't just about the team anymore. Their success became part of the identity of the whole community. If they won, then the tribe was stronger. If they won, then it proved Indians were better at something. This is natural in a community who has suffered so much over last 200 years. Winnebago has been booming for 25 years and working on getting better for the last 50. The Casino, Ho-Chunk, Inc., the hospital, the college, the Ho-Chunk Village the additions to the school, and the Educare facility are all physical manifestations of the growth. These are nice, but the success of the team did more than anything else to elevate our community's perception and our own self-image. We were winners! Indians were winners. Winnebago's were winners.

Dear Winnebago Community Members and Relatives,

I am writing as a Winnebago Public School Board member to update you and keep you apprised of some changes in education rules and regulations I believe will benefit our children.

First, the Every Child Succeeds Act (ESSA) was signed into law by President Obama on December 10, 2015 replacing the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) -thank goodness. I have written to the State School Board President, Rachel Wise from Oakland, requesting she ensure the reservation schools are at the table when Nebraska develops its plan to be implemented August 2016.

There are numerous positive changes for us. First and foremost is that it recognizes funding for Impact Aid schools. While we are still considered discretionary funding; this act includes an amount set aside for Impact Aid schools this year.

There are numerous other changes. ESSA encourages a smarter approach to testing by moving away from a sole focus on standardized tests around the quality of schools, and by allow-

ing for the use of multiple measures of student learning and progress, such as progress indicators of student success as a way to make school accountability decisions. Our children have lots of strengths tests can't measure such as their ability to learn and adapt, and their intelligence. It is incumbent upon us, as adults to discover new ways to support them.

Anyone who knows me knows I love winning and I loved watching this team. But towards the end of the season, the games got closer. The tension built. The stress on the team grew. Talent kicked in over and over again and the boys pulled it out in every game but one. Two things happened that made me think about the overall psychology of what was going on. Someone told me the story of how one of their young relatives was on the team and heading to state to fight for the championship and the pride of the Winnebago Tribe, but didn't have any spending money to take on the trip and asked for a little help. It occurred to me that a kid that can't afford a pop was about to take on the burden of the success and all the complications of what that means to our community.

The second that happened is that something negative went viral. Someone took a picture of someone texting racially insensitive remarks during the game about Indians. The texts pissed me off, but the next day I was messaged by a reporter who asked me and someone else if they thought it should be a story for the paper. The other person agreed and I was inclined to also, but then I remembered the young man who didn't have any spending money and the pressure to succeed we already were placing on these young men.

I asked the reporter to downplay it because these young men were already under so much strain and adding fighting ignorance and racism was only going to increase the pressure cooker they were living in.

When the boys lost a tough semifinal game it was heartbreaking to watch the entire team shed tears at center court. All that pressure came pouring out in front of the entire arena. Some people got up and left in frustration with the loss, but most stood and gave them a very long standing ovation and shouted encouragement. I also noticed how most of the fans of Elmwood Murdock did the same when they saw how emotional the loss was for our boys.

I couldn't be more proud of our team and our community and I will continue to root for the success of all our teams, but Winnebago's rise in all areas is remarkable by any measure. We are winners no matter the outcome of a single game. I also know young people are resilient and that they will be loaded again next year, but I hope that some of the pressure on these boys has been released and they can just play for themselves a little bit too. The Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) will hold a public information open house regarding proposed improvements of US-75 in Thurston County. The meeting will be held at the Winnebago Public School - Gymnasium, 202 Osborne Street in Winnebago, on Tuesday, April 5th, 4:00 – 6:00 P.M.

Identified as In Winnebago, the proposed project would reconstruct approximately 0.45 miles of US-75, starting north of the US-75/77 roundabout at MM 169.05 and extending north to MM 169.50, the north corporate limits of Winnebago. A roundabout is being considered for the intersection of US-75 and Mission Road/Avenue C. If incorporated, the project limits would be extended from MM 169.50 northerly to approximately MM 169.79.

The purpose of this project is to preserve the transportation asset, improve the reliability of the transportation system and perpetuate mobility of the traveling public including pedestrian mobility. The need for this project is based on the condition of the existing roadway and recent inspections showing that the pavement distresses of US-75 require rehabilitation.

The planned construction would consist of removing the existing pavement and replacing it with doweled concrete pavement with integral curb over foundation course on a prepared subgrade, curb inlets and storm sewer, new pedestrian facilities, and lighting would also be updated. Additional work would include surfaced drives and intersections, barrier curb constructed between sidewalk and parking areas, relocation of utilities, and driveway work.

The proposed project would require the acquisition of additional property rights which could include new right-of-way (ROW), permanent easements (PE), and/or temporary easements (TE). Access to adjacent properties would be maintained during construction but may be limited at times due to phasing requirements.

Potential impacts associated with the proposed project include grading, sidewalk, and driveway work near the Winnebago Public School, sidewalk and driveway work, temporary impacts to fencing near the basketball courts south of Mercer Avenue, temporary impacts to Veterans Memorial Park, and temporary impacts to the bike trail between Osborn Avenue and Wilson Avenue.

Construction could begin as early as summer of 2018 with completion by fall of the same year. The proposed project would be constructed under traffic.

This public open house meeting is being held to provide information regarding the project, currently in the design phase, and to receive the public's input. All interested persons are invited to attend and present relevant comments and questions. Design information will be displayed and personnel from NDOR will be present to answer questions and receive comments. The information "open house" format allows the public to come at any time during the advertised hours, gather pertinent information about the project, speak one-on-one with project personnel, and leave as they wish.

NDOR will make every reasonable accommodation to provide an accessible meeting facility for all persons. Appropriate provisions for the hearing and visually challenged or persons with Limited English Proficiency (LEP) will be made if the Department is notified by March 28, 2016. The public is being encouraged to make suggestions or express concerns regarding this proposed project. Comments will be collected through April 20, 2016. There are videos on Strongholdsociety.org where it shows and proves that skateparks and skateboarding has saved lives and has a positive impact on the community.

I have been in contact with Jim Murphy through email, and this is what he recommends. First, the Tribe

should see if there's a spot where the park could be made. Second, I need to prove that there is a demand for the park and how it could be a positive benefit for the community by keeping kids active and out of trouble. Once we've done that Jim can connect us with the Tony Hawk Foundation so we can apply for a grant to get money to build a skatepark. I need your help to grab the attention of our Tribal Council and get this project in motion instead of just talking about it. Kid Nutrition Basics for Parents



Of course you want good nutrition for your children. And you know that means making sure they're eating a balanced, healthy diet. But when you get nutrition advice from other parents, your pediatrician, and the media, it can be tough to decide which direction to follow.

A good place to begin sorting out the nutrition puzzle is to learn about the basics. Here, we lay out the details on five nutrients that a growing body has to have every day. The payoff? A child with strong bones and teeth, a well-regulated digestive system, oxygen-rich blood, and healthy nutritional habits the child can carry throughout life.

Calcium

Calcium helps make strong bones and teeth, and this nutrient is most important during the years when bones are growing. Foods that are highest in calcium come from the cow -- low-fat milk, cheeses, and yogurt. But some leafy vegetables and fortified juices are also good sources of calcium. Here are some ways to give your child the calcium he needs:

Start his day with a bowl of cold or hot whole-grain cereal topped with skim or low-fat milk and sliced fresh fruit.

Serve low-fat yogurt, smoothies, or cheese after school and between meals for a nourishing calcium-rich snack.

Calcium-fortified juices and cereals are fine nondairy alternatives to help meet your child's daily requirement.

Snack idea. Boost your kids' calcium intake by blending low-fat chocolate milk, a banana, and ice into a delicious smoothie for a quick meal, dessert, or snack.

Fiber

Grandma called it roughage and everyone, kids included, needs plenty of it each day to keep their digestive system working well. Here's how to get your kids used to the taste of fiber-rich foods, which they can come to love.

A bowl of high-fiber cereal is a great start to meeting your child's daily needs. Read food labels to find whole-grain cereals that provide 3 grams or more of fiber per serving. Usually, the more sugar in a cereal, the less fiber. Add sweetness to cereal with fresh, canned (unsweetened), or frozen fruit.

Have cut-up whole fruits and veggies on hand to help your child meet the recommended five or more daily servings of fiber. Keep fruit juice to a minimum. Whole fruits and vegetables contain much more fiber and less sugar than most juices.

Beans are loaded with fiber and protein. Drain and rinse canned beans and toss into soups, stews, salads, scrambled eggs and omelets, and salsas.

Snack idea. Spread crunchy peanut butter onto celery sticks and top with raisins for a kid-favorite "ants on a log" snack.

Protein

Every cell in the body is made of protein, which makes this major nutrient essential for healthy growth and development. Protein is found in animal products such as dairy, eggs, seafood, and meats. In somewhat lesser amounts, it is also in beans, nuts, vegetables, and grains. Boost your child's nutritional intake with these protein-rich food ideas.

Even finicky kids love eggs. French toast, scrambled eggs, pancakes, and omelets are kid-pleasing dishes that contain plenty of protein, iron, and other important nutrients.

Branch out from fish sticks and try salmon dishes that kids will enjoy. Top salmon or other fish fillets with salsa or teriyaki sauce to give your child lean protein along with heart-healthy omega-3 fatty acids.

Add nuts to cereals, yogurts, or vegetables for added protein, fiber, and healthy unsaturated fats.

Snack idea. Trail mix is a great snack for on-the-go that is also easy to prepare. Throw together a mix of dried fruits such as raisins, bananas, apples, or cranberries, nuts (soy nuts or peanuts), and high-fiber cereal.

Antioxidant Superfoods

Antioxidants help defend the body against harmful substances that can damage the body's cells. Power up your child's diet with foods rich in antioxidants, such as almonds, berries, citrus, carrots, spinach, tomatoes, and bell peppers.

Bring orange wedges, 100% citrus juice, fruit, or nut granola bars to the next sports practice for a refreshing and energizing treat.

Pack school lunches with baby carrots, grape tomatoes, or red bell pepper slices for a fiber- and antioxidant-rich lunch or snack.

Add plenty of antioxidant-rich tomatoes or tomato sauce to pizza, spaghetti, meatloaf, soups, and stews.

Snack idea. Parfaits are beautiful to look at and fun to eat. Make one by layering low-fat yogurt, fresh or frozen blueberries, and toasted almonds into a tall glass.

Iron

Children's diets are often lacking in iron, a mineral that carries oxygen in the blood and helps keep kids energized. Boost the iron in your kids' diet with lean meats, eggs, fish, dark leafy greens, beans, dried fruits, and iron-fortified grains.

Vitamin C increases the absorption of iron, so pair eggs with oranges or orange juice.

Serve spinach salads at mealtime, topped with strawberries, dried cranberries, and/or slivered almonds and a light raspberry vinaigrette dressing. The fruit will help the body absorb the iron in the spinach, and kids will love the taste.

When kids refuse a meal, offer iron-fortified cereal topped with low-fat milk or yogurt and fruit as a healthy meal substitute.

Snack idea. Wrap an iron-fortified whole wheat tortilla with sliced turkey, low-fat string cheese, and dried cranberries for a healthy snack.


