Two young members of the Ho-Chunk Nation of Wisconsin are making history on the basketball court.

Indian Country has already been cheering on Bronson Koenig, a point guard for the University of Wisconsin Badgers. In 2015, he was the first Native American to start and play in an NCAA finals game, according to NDNSports.Com.

Koenig is repeating that success by leading his team back to the NCAA this

year. But he's also being supported by a fellow Ho-Chunk citizen -- Will Decorah, who joined the Badgers as a walk-on last fall.

After a strong season of 22 wins and 12 losses, Koenig and Decorah are in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for a big game on Friday night. The Badgers are up against the Fighting Irish from Notre

Dame (23 wins and 11 losses) as March Madness reaches a fever pitch.

"Bronson and Will have displayed true character, and are great role models for our Native youth. On behalf of our GLITC members, we wish them much success tonight and in the future," Mike Allen, the executive director of the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council, said in a press release.

The game tips off at 7:30 pm Eastern on the TBS Network.

Winnebago's Derrell Zagurski Makes 9/10 Nebraska National Dual Team

Derrell Zagurski filled in for a hurt member of the 9th/10th grade Nebraska National Dual Team that wrestled March 26th and 27th in Des Moines, IA. Derrell was the 285lb wrestler on the Nebraska Will team. On the weekend Derrell wrestled very well and showed improvement in his matches but went 1-7 in the duals. Coach Adam Tranmer from Winnebago joined Derrell on the team coaching kids from all over the state. At the National Duals the team wrestled against the all of the top Freshman and Sophomores. Congrats to Derrell and your community, family and friends are very proud of you.

NEBRASKA WILL BRONZE BRACKET CHAMPIONS!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!

The 9/10 National Duals was a great experience for a lot of boys from Nebraska. I was honored to coach the Nebraska Will Team for the weekend and we ended up Bronze Bracket Champions. The weekend started off with a dual against South Dakota Silver. We had some great wins but let a few slip away. We ended up tying in the dual with 34 points and it came down to criteria which South Dakota Silver won 8 matches to Nebraska Will's 7 so we started the day 0-1. It didn't get any easier from there. Nebraska Will took on Indiana Black where we came up short in a few matches and lost 45-27. The third dual we matched up with, the to-be Gold Bracket Champion, Iowa Black. Iowa Black took it right to us and showed they were on another level but we did fight really hard in every match. Nebraska Will lost 76-6 with the lone victory coming from Carter Kuchera who scored a defensive pin over his opponent. We then took on Polaris Elite and was handed another loss 56-15. In the cross-over dual to Pool 2 Nebraska Will faced off against Team Vision Quest Colorado and were defeated 51-22. That dual ended the day for the young squad ending the day 0-5 placing Nebraska Will in the Bronze Bracket on Sunday. Even though the team went 0-5 there were a lot of boys that got great wins and were on the verge of earning All-American status with big victories on Sunday. The Nebraska Will team had a goal to win the Bronze Bracket on Sunday and it had to start off with a big victory against South Dakota Bronze...and it did. The Nebraska Will team dominated the dual 74-10. The next dual would match Nebraska Will against Wyoming Gold. Nebraska Will poured it on at the end winning the dual 50-23. The redemption dual was up next. Nebraska Will vs. South Dakota Silver. Nebraska Will was not going to be denied the Bronze Bracket Championship earning some huge victories that they did not get in the first dual against them and came out CHAMPIONS 45-25!!!

It was a great weekend overall for the Nebraska Will team going 3-5 on the weekend in duals and had a couple of kids get close to All-American status but we did have 4 total All-Americans. Every member of Nebraska Will that was from Nebraska got a victory over the weekend 285- Derrell Zagurski from Winnebago went 1-7 on the weekend. Jesus Magada at 220 from Schulyer went 4-4 one match short of All-American. Jaden Rhan from GACC (West Point CC) went 3-5 on the weekend at 195. At 182 Will Howell from Morrill was 4-4 but had a chance at the end of every match to win in his 4 losses one match away from All-American. Caleb Novak was at 160 where he was one match away from All-American going 4-4 with some really tough losses. At 152 Connor Donscheski from Palmer got a little banged up in the opening match on Saturday and didn't wrestle well going 0-5 but set a goal of winning all three on Sunday which he did to set his record at 3-5. Lane Applegarth from Alliance, at 145, had one of the most exciting weekends wrestling he would come up one match short of All-American going 4-4 but won some very close matches showing his potential for the years to come on how he will grind out wins. Holden Schleve from Morrill at 120 showed his toughness going 2-6 but showed a lot of improvement though out the weekend. Devon Sell wrestled at 106 and had some tough matches but came away with 3 wins for a 3-5 record. Nebraska Will had two boys fill in from other teams that helped us on the weekend Derek Faul 138 from Team North Dakota went 2-6 and Bo Meyer from Montana Silver who went 0-8 at 126. Bo was a 120lb kid that bumped up to 126 to help us out.

Earning All-American Silver status on the weekend was Izaak Hunsley from Hastings at 98lbs. Izaak went 7-1 and had some huge wins for the team. At 113, Carter Kuchera from Columbus also went 7-1 and had some great battles.

Earning All-American Bronze for Nebraska Will were Nick James from Kearney going 6-2 at 138 and from North Bend Dalton Mueller at 160 who also went 6-2.

I am very proud of all the boys and the great things they did this weekend. Thank you for the opportunity to coach and hope to do this again.





In My Opinion

Thoughts from a Housing Boom!

In the old movie Cool Hand Luke, Luke bet some people he could eat 50 eggs. When asked why he said 50 eggs, he replied that it was a good round number. Well the Tribe has allowed Ho-Chunk, Inc. to retain 30 percent of its dividend in order to build 100 housing units over the next 5 years and also put in place the infrastructure for 100 more housing units.

Someone asked me why I promised we could build 100 houses and I said that is was a good round number. It will cost over \$20 Million to build the units, acquire the land, and put in the infrastructure for that many houses. The problem is that the amount the tribe allowed Ho-Chunk, Inc. to retain from the dividend is only estimated to be about \$4 or \$5 million over the next 5 years. We are about \$15 million short, so we will need to get creative to make it happen.

I love a challenge, especially if it is for a good cause. We have been busy beavers lately trying to figure out how to accomplish our goal. We have several things in the works and hopefully will have some things to announce in the next few months. But what I can share is pretty good.

We are close to opening the Warrior Apartments, in the Ho-Chunk Village. The college named them after their mascot, the Warriors. There are 27 units and college students will have some priority rights to them, but they are not exclusively for college students. These will be low-income apartments and priced in the 375 to 450 per month range, but believe me they are very nice and more than worth the price.

My big concern is keeping them nice. We intend to be fairly picky about who

we let live there and they will not stay if they do not respect the property. So if you have a bad track record of paying rent or trashing previous places then your chances are greatly reduced.

This is an aside, but people complain about Tribal Housing having boarded up houses all the time. We like to shoot the messenger in Winnebago. Someone damaged those units or they wouldn't be boarded up. We need to point the finger at the people who don't know how to act. I am tired of fixing up our current Little Priest Apartments when people don't respect them and trash them. One unit actually had hundreds of holes in the walls from a bb gun. They were drawing targets on the wall. We recently replaced 38 doors in the building because they had holes in them. 38 doors! Are you kidding me? Don't be crying around when you apply for the new ones and we say no!

We are also a few months from opening the apartments across the street from the Dollar General. These will be around \$750 for 2 bedrooms and a little less for 1 bedroom. There are only 7 apartments, but they will be the nicest apartments ever built in Winnebago. Our hope is that we can attract some young professionals who want a nice place, but still cheaper than what they would pay in Sioux City. If we can't develop a market for more expensive housing then we can build more units because they would not have to be subsidized so much.

We also had a bit of a race to buy one of the spec houses in the Ho-Chunk Village, where three people were interested in buying it all at once. Our house buying has been slow and steady, but with our improving tribal economy we are seeing more demand. We have 2 more houses under construction and intend to build 2 more spec houses yet this year.

We have more rental housing on the drawing board too and will announce them when we get them finalized, but it could be up to 12 more very nice units. So by my count we will have in the next year an additional 50 units coming on board and I think that could be low. Now a few of these projects were on the drawing board for a while so getting to 50 was always going to happen, but the next 50 are going to be tougher. However, we will have 4 years to pull it off and we have some great things in the pipeline. To be continued.

Hello, I would like to introduce myself, Anthony "Tony" Wood, the CEO of the Winnebago Land Corporation. I want to take the time to tell a little about myself and give some information about upcoming items that the Land Corporation will be participating in. First off, my parents are Larry Wood and Carla Hallum, and I am an enrolled Winnebago tribal member, my family comes from the Rogue/St. Cyr lineage. I

have been involved with Winnebago land since 2002 when I was hired to be the Administrative Assistant for the Land Management Department, advanced my professional career in 2009 to be the Environmental Protection Director, then on to the corporate side with Ho Chunk Farms in Ag Business, I have a strong professional background and the passion for land to take this in the right direction.

Some upcoming news the Winnebago Tribe will soon be awarded a Cobell Buy-

back Cooperative Agreement to perform outreach activities towards individual Indian owners of fractionated land on our reservation. The schedule for offers out to individuals is tentatively set for the first quarter of 2017. The Land Corporation was strategic in the Priority Tract listing to which were determined as; 2 mile radius from the Village of Winnebago for possible future expansion, advantageous agricultural tracts, and parcels with 35-49%+ Tribal

FROM THE OFFICE OF BROWNFIELDS:



I attended the 15th Annual Smart Growth Conference February 11, 12 and 13, 2016 in Portland, Oregon. I was amongst a five panel distinguished guest list which included Blasé Leven, TAB Program Coordinator-Kansas State University, Ignacio Dayrit-Program Director for the Center for Creative Land Recycling, Oakland, California, Elizabeth Limbrick-Project Manager, New Jersey Institute of Technology and Moderator Sarah Sieloff, Executive Director for the Center for Creative Land Recycling, Oakland, California. We all partnered to show stakeholders how beneficial the BIT - Brownfields Inventory Tool is. The record keeping, efficiency and just how user friendly the system is. We wanted to reach out to local government, stakeholders and other regions for implementation. As a whole, the speakers do work in all ten EPA Regions, in addition to my and Blasé's work here in EPA Region 7. I met Blasé in 2011 and he introduced me to this tool. To date, I have 49 Brownfield sites entered, from basic inventory to current and completed sites with new homes on them. I am thankful to K-State and the Smart Growth Committee for giving me this opportunity and to put the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska on the US Map showing amazing work in Indian Country. It was a great honor and I am thankful for my work here on the reservation. I would like to say a "special thank you" to Ms. Alicia Brown, Project Coordinator from the Local Government Commission out of Sacramento, California who made all my training and traveling arrangements.

ADVISORY
 OPINION

At the outset it is noted that as per the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska (WTN) Constitution, this opinion only applies as to procedural improprieties not substantive issues. In every due process case the question is what process is due.

The WTN Constitution, Article VI, Section 2 (a) provides in its entirety, "The Tribal Council may by a two thirds (2/3) affirmative vote of the Council expel any member, including any Officer, for gross neglect of duty or gross misconduct. The Secretaryshall deliver to the member a written notice of the alleged violation and stating the time and place of hearing before the Council. The member shall have a reasonable opportunity to present his or her defense of the allegations. Following a vote in favor of removal, the removed member may, within fifteen (15) calendar days of removal, submit the decision to the Tribal Court for an advisory opinion regarding the procedural integrity of the removal process. The Judge shall then conduct a hearing and based on testimony and record evidence, shall issue an advisory opinion as to whether the Tribal Council followed proper procedures in implementing the removal. Following consideration of such opinion, the Tribal Council may in its discretion, reinstate the removed member and/or reinstate the removal process correcting any procedural improprieties."

The Parties have done a great job of presenting this case to the Court. The joint statement of facts is thorough and the briefs are well written. After careful consideration of the Plaintiffs' assignment of errors, this Court finds that Defendants' procedures were proper in all respects.

Plaintiffs argue, in alia, that Defendants should have granted their request for a continuance to assure, "...a reasonable opportunity to be heard." WTN Art VI, Sec 2 (a). This Court is mindful that Plaintiffs were not notified of the exact date of hearing until six days before hand and it is difficult to schedule the attendance of legal counsel and witnesses on such short notice let alone prepare. However, this short notice was not so onerous as to rise to the level of a denial of due process required by the WTN Constitution because thirty days prior to setting the hearing date the council had voted that they would set a hearing date, "if necessary". Plaintiffs had over thirty-six days to review the evidence, consult counsel and decide if they wanted to contest removal or resign.

The other assignments of error by Plaintiffs are without merit and not reiterated here.

ownership to get to the 51% to gain the Land Use determination. Will have more information after the award is accepted, but this is a major project towards self determination for the Tribe.

I had a phone conversation recently, about the corporation getting into farming, having the knowledge about current farm economics and the future outlook due to my time in Ag Business. This is not first on the agenda at this time, not out of the question but this corporation has to be decisive moving forward. Currently farmers are in survival mode, with grain prices dropping from \$7/bushel in 2012 to yesterday's \$3.16/bushel on the open market. The best options at this time are to look at alternatives such as; custom farming, cost share agreements and value added production Non-GMO and possibly Certified Organic (3 year process). I just want people to know

that there is activity towards more than leasing land.

Lastly, will be scheduling informational sessions to answer any questions on the path of the Land Corporation and will have those dates posted in the community and on the Winnebago Land Corporation Facebook Page. I know some individual inquiries have stated why did they incorporate? But in my opinion our land was at a crossroads, do we continue with bureaucratic methods or do we blaze our own path. The federal government has passed legislation such as the Self Determination Act and HEARTH Act to get to this point, the Tribe incorporating is definitely proactive rather than reactive. I have said this for a few years but no one would ever consider the BIA to be a Fortune 500 company.
