Two proposed constitutional amendments in upcoming secretarial election

Winnebago tribal members can expect to vote on two major issues in an upcoming secretarial election. The outcome of the election could affect tribal enrollment and how the tribe amends its own constitution.

One amendment to be voted upon proposes a change in enrollment criteria to a minimum total Indian blood quantum of 1/4 with at least 1/8 being Winnebago. Also, the applicant cannot be previously enrolled in any other tribe except during ages of 18-21 or for special circumstances. The amendment also proposes the change enrollment appeal process to the Tribal Court instead of to the Secretary of the Interior.

According to Tribal Counsel Danelle Smith, the proposed amendment is similar to the current requirement which counts all Indian blood, except that it will exclude persons who were

previously enrolled in another federally recognized Indian tribe (except during the ages of 18-21 or for special circumstances) and establishes a minimum baseline for Winnebago blood.

"This limits those enrolled in other Tribes from relinquishing and enrolling in Winnebago," Smith said, "any option including other Indian blood relies on the ability to obtain accurate and timely information from other Tribes. The proposed change enrollment appeal process would restore authority to the Tribe to make decisions on tribal membership appeals."

A second proposed amendment would alter the constitutional amendment process. Currently, the Secretary of the Interior (by extension, the BIA), rather than the Tribe, is responsible for calling and holding Secretarial Elections to amend the Constitution and Bylaws.

The Secretary is also responsible for approving the results of such election.

The second amendment on the ballot proposes to alter the constitutional amendment process by removing the Secretary of the Interior (and BIA) from the revision and election process and placing this responsibility under the authority of the Winnebago Tribe.

"The Tribe would need to adopt regulations to govern elections to amend the Constitution and

Bylaws. No further BIA oversight and approval or BIA funding to revise the Tribe's Constitution

and Bylaws," Smith added, "this would restore authority to the Tribe to manage another aspect of its own affairs."

A date is yet to be determined for this secretarial election, but is slated to take place in 2016.

Indianz.com... Winnebago Tribe plans election to adjust blood quantum standard

The Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska might change its blood quantum criteria.

Membership is currently open to anyone with at least one-fourth "Winnebago Indian blood and blood of another federally recognized Indian tribe," according to the constitution.

But the standard, which was adopted in 2009, does not specify the level of

Winnebago blood so a proposed change would require prospective members to be at least one-eighth Winnebago. The Sioux City Journal reported. The one-fourth Indian blood requirement would remain and current members would not be affected.

The proposal would also require appeals of enrollment decisions to be heard in tribal court, the paper said. Currently, the constitution charges

the Bureau of Indian Affairs with handling disputes.

The tribe expects to hold a Secretarial election this summer.

Little Priest hires Southwestern assistant to lead women's basketball program.


Leonard Erickson just finished his second season as the assistant coach for the women's basketball team at Southwestern Community College in Creston, Iowa. During his time at SWCC, Erickson helped turn the program around. Two years prior to his arrival the Spartans finished the season 0-30 and were recently able to compile double digits in wins. He also helped mentor four all-region players in the ICCAC.

Erickson, originally from El Paso, TX, has a bachelor's degree in history, with a minor in secondary education from the University of Texas at El Paso. He attended graduate school at Indiana State University where, in 2014, he obtained a master's degree in physical education with a specialization in coaching.

Erickson started coaching in 2004 with the El Paso Sparks, a traveling team. He coached with them for five years. He was the varsity girl's assistant coach at Father Yermo High School for five seasons from 2005-2010. During that time the team qualified for state playoffs four times and won two state championships. Other coaching experiences for Erickson included serving as the women's student assistant coach at Dakota State University in Madison, SD, in 2009; freshman girl's assistant coach at Eastlake High School in El Paso in 2011; and women's assistant coach at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology in Terre Haute, IN, from 2012-2014, during which time they qualified for two conference tournaments in the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference.

Erickson has worked numerous basketball summer camps including Snow Valley, Indiana, Illinois, and Missouri. He played high school basketball at Father Yermo High School in El Paso from 2001-2004.

Starzl received his undergraduate degree in Physical Education/Sports Management from Southwest Minnesota State University in Marshall, Minnesota in 2005 where he also earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Education/Sports leadership in 2008. A standout athlete for the Mustangs, Starzl earned All-NSIC honors in basketball three times from 2002-2005. He was team MVP in 2004 and 2005 and well as team captain for three straight seasons. Off the court, he was a two-time NSIC Scholar athlete and named to the Dean's List as an undergraduate and graduate student. While at SMSU, Eli's coaching duties included conditioning and strength training, as well as recruiting. whites have a job. The difference is 32.7 percent and that is bad!

Nebraska has a 73.4 percent employment rate for natives, which places us number one! So Nebraska is the place where a Native American has the highest chance to be working. I am positive that the growth of the Winnebago Tribe played a large role in these results. If you are curious whites in Nebraska have an employment rate of 85.6 percent, which equates to a 12.3 percent difference.

Although our employment rate is number one our difference between white and native employment rates still needs some work so we are far from done.

Employment is a tricky thing in our world. The Winnebago Tribe has more jobs than working age people, but still has plenty of people without a job. Our unemployed usually have other issues that limit their ability to participate in the workforce. We also are lucky to be located near a metro area where job demand is high. So getting a job isn't the issue, it really is all about keeping it.

Ho-Chunk, Inc. only has two missions, provide economic self sufficiency and provide for job opportunities. We are doing very well lately on the economic self-sufficiency, but could always do better on the job front. We have really been looking at our approach in this area and have been trying to revamp a few things to create more jobs and ways to put more natives in those jobs.

We haven't cracked the code yet, but in the last 2 months, we have hired 6 young native professionals to fill in with our junior and middle management positions. Six doesn't sound like much, but it took 4 years to get to 6 natives in management positions when we started Ho-Chunk, Inc. So 6 in 2 months illustrates the trend. Now if you are unemployed, this article doesn't really make you feel better, but the good news is that your chances are better here than anyplace else to get a job if you are a native. So whatever is holding you back, work on it and good luck to you.

Nebraska is number one. Not in football sadly, but in something else. I recently gave a speech at the Navajo Economic summit in Arizona. The speech went ok, but the next speaker was a friend of mine named Dr. Manley Begay. Dr. Begay is a professor at Northern Arizona focused on Tribal leadership, Tribal Nation Building and Tribal Economic Development.

During Dr. Begay's presentation he presented a slide describing native employment, not unemployment. He said everyone talks about unemployment rates, but that those numbers are not reliable. I personally always thought that some tribes' tendencies to try and be the most unemployed and the poorest county was a dubious distinction. Tribe's fight for this thorny crown because it helps them raise money I suspect, but I never want to win that contest. I want Winnebago to be as successful as possible.

Dr. Begay's reseach measured the difference between the native employment rates of 25 to 54 year olds against white employment rates in all the states that had tribal lands. The worst state was South Dakota, with only 54.8 percent of prime working age natives employed. In South Dakota 87.5 percent of prime working age

"Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer."

The next mark of a true Christian includes these three words: hope, tribulation and prayer. This trio does not seem to go together: hope, tribulation and prayer. Hope with prayer ~ yes. Tribulation with prayer ~ yes. But hope and tribulation seem to cancel each other out.

Tribulation and suffering would more likely lead one to despair rather than to hope. The experiences of abused victims or First Responders could lead one to the feeling of hopelessness.

Then there is what is known on the reservation as Historical Trauma. The trauma that is passed down from one generation to the next due to past injustice and amplified by present day injustice. Anger surfaces and hateful actions appear to be justified!

We come to the sixth mark of a true Christian which is to "Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer."

The 'hope' that is found in the Bible is not the same as the 'hope' that is often referred to in our day and age. This Biblical 'hope' is the assurance and reassurance that God is true to His Word and promises. It is not 'I hope that it does not rain tomorrow' and spoil our plans for a picnic or a trip to the zoo. No, it is a blessed 'hope' that all those who place their faith in Jesus as their Lord and Savior will one day live with Him forever. It is the hope that one's sins have been paid in full and that forgiveness is assured. We rejoice in such hope!

One question that Mrs. Tietz and I ask our preschool children at Jesus Our Savior Lutheran Preschool is 'Does God love you more when you do something good?' One might quickly respond with

'yes' with the hope that one will win God's favor and be blessed more by Him. Or we ask 'Does God love you less when you do something wrong?' The not so quick response, at first, is usually a weak 'yes.' The Good News is that God loves us just the same with His steadfast love. God's steadfast love is the blessed hope of the Christian child of God because it is based solely on the action of Jesus our Savior!

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



All who are less than 1/4 Winnebago must be disenrolled. The only reason they want to be enrolled as Winnebago is for benefits. This was started to get more voters..The tribe can't hardly take care of Bagos we have now.

If any have less than 1/4 degree Winnebago, disenroll them and do not enroll any more. Ask each Council member what they think about this.

"No Work, No Eat"

I was caught up in this so I know what I'm talking about on this issue and problem.

Someone asked me about the problem of a lot of men and women not

working. I said, "It all starts at home." Common sense will tell you they were never taught to work. They must start with school, homework and more as they grow older. "Social Promotion" contributes a lot to this problem, schools must stop social promotion. When students know they do not have to work hard to reach a certain level to pass to the next grade they will not make an effort. Doing this they do not learn. This happens in every grade until they graduate. Their "ACT score" tells all.

"No Work. No Eat" if anyone does not work don't feed them. "Don't feed the lazy" if they get hungry enough they'll work. I know about this. I hope everyone talks about this. Any ideas about what must be done to correct it?

P.S. Lazy school students always grow up to be Lazy adults.



Vaccine side effects are almost always mild such as redness or swelling at the site of the shot, but this is minimal compared to the pain, discomfort, and risk of injury and death from the diseases these vaccines prevent. Serious side effects following vaccination, such as severe allergic reaction, are very rare. The disease-prevention benefits of getting vaccinated are much greater than the possible side effects for almost all children.

Immunization protects others you care about. Children in the U.S. still get vaccine-preventable diseases. In fact, we have seen resurgences of measles and whooping cough (pertussis) over the past few years. For example, in 2014, there were 667 cases of measles in 27 states, the greatest number of cases since measles was eliminated in 2000. The following year saw measles cases as well. During 2015, 147 people were part of a large,

multi-state measles outbreak linked to an amusement park in California. Almost one in 10 people who became sick with measles in this outbreak were babies too young to be vaccinated. While some babies are too young to be protected by vaccination, others may not be able to receive certain vaccinations due to severe allergies, weakened immune systems from conditions like leukemia, or other reasons. To help keep them safe, it is important that you and your children who are able to get vaccinated are fully immunized. This not only protects your family, but also helps prevent the spread of these diseases to your friends and loved ones.

Immunizations can save your family time and money. A child with a vaccine-preventable disease can be denied attendance at schools or daycare facilities. Some vaccine-preventable diseases can result in prolonged disabilities and can take a financial toll because of lost time at work, medical bills or long-term disability care. In contrast, getting vaccinated against these diseases is a good investment and usually covered by insurance. The Vaccines for Children program is a federally funded program that provides vaccines at no cost to children from low-income families. Immunization protects future generations. Vaccines have reduced and, in some cases, eliminated many diseases that killed or severely disabled people just a few generations ago. For example, smallpox vaccination eradicated that disease worldwide. Your children don't have to get smallpox shots anymore because the disease no longer exists anywhere in the world. By vaccinating children against rubella (German measles), we have dramatically reduced the risk that pregnant women will pass this virus on to their fetus or newborn, and birth defects associated with that virus are seen in only rare cases in the United States when a pregnant woman who was never vaccinated against rubella is exposed to someone who contracted rubella in another country. If we continue vaccinating now, and vaccinating completely, parents in the future may be able to trust that some diseases of today will no longer be around to harm their children in the future.
