Tribal Leaders Show Support for DAPL Run



Winnebago Tribal Council Members; James Snow, Curtis St. Cyr, Frank White & Isaac Smith were in attendance as a group of young Runners traversed through Winnebago Tribal Lands on their way to Omaha, Nebraska. In resistance to the Dakota Access Pipeline and Big Oil, Native and non-Native citizens are running 500 miles from Cannon Ball, ND to Omaha, NE to tell the Army Corps of Engineers NO PIPELINES ON OUR LANDS. The group pit stopped at the Pony Express north in South Sioux City, NE and ran on to the middle Pony Express on the Winnebago Rez. for an overnight stop. Local Activist in training, Manape LaMere is the Nebraska organizer for the event and provided the runners with lodging and a hot meal, cooked by Fran Shapback and her helpers. Early Monday, morning the runners left Winnebago with help from local runners to deliver the Run Staff to the Omaha Reservation border where the Omaha Tribe sponsored the Run to their southeast border. The run concluded in Omaha, after a long run along the Missouri River, and a visit to the Army Corp of Engineering Offices in Omaha.

Cobell Buyback Awarded to Winnebago Tribe

The Winnebago Tribe was recently awarded a Cobell Buyback Cooperative Agreement in the amount of \$366,655. These federal funds are obligated for staff and outreach activities towards landowners to be informative, assess land interests and assist in evaluation. The final decision is yours to make on if you wish to sell back to the Tribe. Purchase estimates for the Winnebago Tribe is \$ 18 Million and for the Omaha Tribe is \$7.1 Million, so come next year there

will be a lot of money floating around Thurston County.

With that said, I attended the Homebuyers class a few weeks ago hosted by Ho Chunk Capital and Bank2, I received some good information for my own personal goals in homeownership but the Down Payment Assistance that is available to tribal members is second to none. Upwards of \$65,000 to buy a new home, can't beat that with a stick. Follow that up with Cobell and put that white picket fence up for your new home

in 2017 or a big screen TV to watch the beloved Cornhuskers in HD. GO BIG RED! All things aside, this one time opportunity coming through our area will change some lives. Thank you for your time.

Civil rights, Native rights, Gay rights, Women's rights — dammit, what about White rights? That's when America was great and we can make America great again, by God. Black lives matter, well white lives matter more. It says so right there in the Holy Scriptures.

News from the Winnebago Police Department...

The Winnebago PD would like to provide a public notice on traffic and parking offenses in Winnebago. We have briefed the Winnebago Tribal Council on our intention to slow traffic down in our community. We will be stopping vehicles for driving over the posted speed zones in our community, and we will be enforcing all parking violations.

For example we will be issuing parking tickets for vehicles parked against the flow of traffic in our residential streets. We will be enforcing the unlawful parking in "marked" area's such as painted curbs, which "red painted curbs" means fire lane, "blue paint is handicapped" and your vehicle can also be towed. 

Two proposed constitutional amendments in upcoming secretarial election

Winnebago tribal members can expect to vote on two major issues in an upcoming secretarial election. The outcome of the election could affect tribal enrollment and how the tribe amends its own constitution.

Secretary of the Interior. According to Tribal Counsel Danelle Smith, the proposed amendment is similar to the current requirement which counts all Indian blood, except that it will exclude persons who were previously enrolled in another federally recognized Indian tribe (except during the ages of 18-21 or for special circumstances) and establishes a minimum baseline for Winnebago blood.

One amendment to be voted upon proposes a change in enrollment criteria to a minimum total Indian blood quantum of 1/4 with at least 1/8 being Winnebago. Also, the applicant cannot be previously enrolled in any other tribe except during ages of 18-21 or for special circumstances. The amendment also proposes the change enrollment appeal process to the Tribal Court instead of to the

"This limits those enrolled in other Tribes from relinquishing and enrolling in Winnebago," Smith said, "any option including other Indian blood relies on the ability to obtain accurate and timely information from other

Tribes. The proposed change enrollment appeal process would restore authority to the Tribe to make decisions on tribal membership appeals."

A second proposed amendment would alter the constitutional amendment process. Currently, the Secretary of the Interior (by extension, the BIA), rather than the Tribe, is responsible for calling and holding Secretarial Elections to amend the Constitution and Bylaws. The Secretary is also responsible for approving the results of such election.

from the revision and election process and placing this responsibility under the authority of the Winnebago Tribe.

"The Tribe would need to adopt regulations to govern elections to amend the Constitution and Bylaws.

No further BIA oversight and approval or BIA funding to revise the Tribe's Constitution and Bylaws," Smith added, "this would restore authority to the Tribe to manage another aspect of its own affairs."

A date is yet to be determined for this secretarial election, but is slated to take place in 2016.
