### Indianz.com... Winnebago Tribe's corporation turns in signatures for gaming vote

Ho-Chunk Inc., the economic development corporation of the Winnebago Tribe, owns the site of the former Atokad Downs in South Sioux City, Nebraska, and operates it as Atokad Park. A group backed by Ho-Chunk Inc., the economic development arm of the Winnebago Tribe, has turned in signatures in hopes of putting a series of gaming initiatives on the November ballot. Keep the Money in Nebraska collected 310,000 signatures, The Omaha World-Herald reported. That's more than enough to qualify for the ballot but the Secretary of State will now verify the petition.

"Now we have to get through the verification process and any legal challenge there and we will set about convincing the voters. It will be like a conventional campaign at that point," spokesperson Scott Lautenbaugh, a former state lawmaker, told The Lincoln Journal Star. If voters approve the ballot measures, racetracks with existing licenses will be able to offer games of chance. Ho-Chunk Inc. owns the South Sioux City Racing and Events Center, a licensed track. Approval could also lead to expanded gaming in Indian Country and maybe even Class III gaming compacts. Under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, tribes can engage in the same types of games that are permitted in a state. "You have to ask yourself, 'Why did the Indians put up a million dollars?'" Pat Loontjer, the director of the anti-casino group Gambling With the Good Life, told The Journal Star. "Not because they like horses. Get real. They put it

up because they know once we change our Constitution we will have unlimited Indian casinos and slots parlors all over the state." Class III gaming is legal in various forms in all of Nebraska's neighboring states: Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, South Dakota and Wyoming. # In My Opinion

## Thoughts and Facts about Per Capita Payments...

I remember when a tribal council member some years ago used the term stimulus payment instead of per capita payment. I thought it was an interesting term taken straight from the news because the country was in the middle of the great recession and the federal government was implementing all kinds of stimulus programs. No matter what you call it, the net effect is still the same. The Tribe issues some amount of money to every man, woman and child on the tribal membership rolls.

The last few years the tribe has been giving one or two stimulus payments of 250 per member. That doesn't sound like a lot but you have to remember that there are approximately 5700 tribal members. So each \$250 stimulus/per capita check actually costs the tribe about \$1.4 million. So in years when the tribe issues two checks, the total is \$2.8 million.

This may surprise you, but I am not privy to the details of the tribal budget. The tribe doesn't ask me what I think. However, I have some pretty good ideas and pieces of information. The budget has two main funding sources: federal dollars and tribal dollars. The federal dollars fund the bulk of the budget, but has many restrictions on usage. The tribal funds are much more flexible and come primarily from the casino, dividends from Ho-Chunk, tribal taxes, and income from land leases. Also, we sometimes have little windfalls like a settlement of some lawsuit, but they are not regular events.

The money that comes in from the tribal sources is used primarily to provide jobs for people. Not counting the Casino or Ho-Chunk, Inc., the tribe has around 300 employees. Most of them are paid for with federal dollars, but somewhere around 80 to 100 are funded almost exclusively with tribal funds. This is a lot of people to pay and every two weeks the tribe needs to come up with about \$550,000 dollars to make payroll. This is over \$14 million per year. I will skip the math details, but I estimate the Tribe needs to come up with about 4.5 million dollars a year to fund the non-federally funded tribal jobs.

I am now going to just make a few rough guesses and realize the amounts can be highly variable depending on how well WinnaVegas does, but the big four of WinnaVegas, Ho-Chunk, Inc., land leases and taxes might bring in about \$6 million per year. This amount has been less occasionally and in the past much more. But as you may recall the Hard Rock Casino came in two years ago, which has impacted what the tribe gets from WinnaVegas. Ho-Chunk, Inc., taxes and land leases are all up some which helps but it is not enough to off set the declines from the impact of the Hard Rock.

But as tribal people, we are loath

to hurt our people so we didn't really change the tribal discretionary budget much after the Hard Rock came in. We didn't want to lay people off. We kept the per capita in place. We got away with this fiscally because we had a big legal settlement about 2 years ago that gave us a big one-time boost. This allowed us to not change much and still provide the expensive per capita payment.

We are at a critical point. The tribally funded payroll and one \$250 per capita payment equals roughly \$6 million or everything we have coming in. However, the tribe just authorized a \$350 clothing allowance, which costs \$450,000. This means if we issue the per capita at Christmas we will be \$450,000 in the hole because we will have spent \$6.5 million, but only brought in \$6 million. If the tribe issued a pow-wow and Christmas stimulus, we would be approximately \$1.8 million in the hole. Now maybe we get a windfall or the casino does better and we pull it out, but is that really how we want to run our tribe?

I sat in a meeting where the tribe was trying to figure out how to build 8 to 10 emergency housing units for our people. We simply didn't have the money in the budget because it ALL and then some is spent on jobs, clothing allowance and per capita payments. So we have very little left to invest in things like homes, education, providing for elders.

The simple fact is that we have over and over again chosen the short-term gratification of \$250 in stimulus over homes. If you add up all the per capita payments we have had in the casino era it will be over \$30 million, which would have provided every tribal family on the reservation with a home. Instead, I see people demand their \$250 or \$500 and don't even realize they are hurting their own chances to own a home, get an education, help the elders, or get a good sustainable job.

The Winnebago Tribe is a miracle and we have come so far so fast, but this complete short-term focus on things like per capita is making our lives worse not better. We have 30 kids a year graduating from high school and we don't have a chance of providing enough homes fast enough for them. Even the 100 house plan we are working on is only 20 units per year, and we need about 40 a year for the next 6 or 7 years to catch up to existing demand.

We don't have the money to do it all. We need to make choices and I think the average tribal member will choose good long term planning to provide homes, educational funds or to help build elder housing over a modest per capita payment if they just understood the math behind these things. But I have no doubt we will likely do one and it will be announced before the tribal election, because we have come to expect it as a minimum right and place large amounts of pressure on our political leaders to write that check. However, think about what you spent your \$250 on when you notice 3 families living in one small home instead of everyone having a quality place to live and ask yourself if it was worth it.

## JESUS OUR SAVIOR LUTHERAN OUTREACH

"The Ho-Chunk's Creed #2"

"The Ho-Chunk's Creed" was given out in a Winnebago History 1 class at Little Priest Tribal College. Our instructor listed fifteen main thoughts of the Ho-Chunk Nation. The second one was: 'He believed in the immortality of the soul, and that his future condition was to be determined by the behavior in this life.'

Would you agree with this second main thought of belief?

The first part of this second main belief is that the soul is immortal or everlasting. In God's Sacred Word at the time of Jesus there were two major groups of spiritual leaders. The one group was the Pharisees who indeed believed and taught that there was life after death. The other group of Spiritual leaders was the Sadducees. The following is a true story regarding this second group:

There came to [Jesus] some Sadducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, and they asked him a question, saying, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, having a wife but no children, the man must take the widow and raise up offspring for his brother. Now there were seven brothers. The first took a wife, and died without children. And the second and the third took her, and likewise all seven left no children and died. Afterward the woman also died. In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had her as wife."

And Jesus said to them, "The sons of this age marry and are given in marriage, but those who are considered worthy to attain to that age and to the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage, for they cannot die anymore, because they are equal to angels and are sons of God, being sons of the resurrection. But that the dead are raised, even Mo-

ses showed, in the passage about the bush, where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham and the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for all live to him." [Luke 20:27-38 ESV]

Jesus, the Son of God, brings division separating those who believed and taught lies from those who believe and teach the truth.

Now on to the second half of the second belief of the Ho-Chunk Creed 'and that his future condition was to be determined by the behavior in this life.' Jesus touched on this when he said, "considered worthy to attain to that age."

The question is who is considered worthy by God? We turn again to God's Sacred Word: 'as it is written: "None is righteous, no, not one; no one understands; no one seeks for God. All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one." [Romans 3:10-12 ESV] On your own you are doomed and considered totally unworthy.

The apostle Paul goes on to give you the Good News: 'But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith.' [Romans 3:21-25a ESV]

Next time we will reflect from God's Word on the third main thought from the Ho-Chunk's Creed: 'He revered his body as the sacred temple of his spirit; and believed it was his duty in all ways to perfect his body, that his earthly record might be better.'

## The Story of Little Hill-A Winnebago Chief

**Winnebago History**

In May of 1863, the Winnebago Tribe was moved by boat from St. Paul, Minnesota to Crow Creek, South Dakota. The trip down the Mississippi River and up the Missouri River took 25 days. Along the way, they passed the Omaha Reservation by Black Bird bend. Here, War Chief Little Priest made two Winnebago warriors drop off the boat and swim inland to the Omaha village. These two men were, Little Hog and John Omaha. They were to meet with Omaha chiefs about the possibility of buying land from them so the Winnebago's could move down to North East Nebraska. The rest of the Winnebago's went up to their new reservation located at Crow Creek. The living conditions were horrible there, and the people had nothing to eat, and many of them froze to death. Between, June of 1863 to June of 1865, some 673 Winnebago people died.

Chief Little Priest was asked by General Alfred Sully to scout for him against the Northern Lakota people. If he helped him, he then would help get land from the Omaha's for the Winnebago people. It hurt little Priest deep in his heart to fight against his own brothers, but he didn't want all his people to die at Crow Creek. So he said he would scout for the U.S. Calvary against the Lakota. The same time, Little Priest asked one of the Chiefs to travel down to the Omaha reservation to open up further negotiations with the Omaha Chiefs. This had to be done secretly, since the Winnebago's already escaped down the Missouri River to Northeast Nebraska.

So when Little Priest went north

and west to help General Sully fight the Lakota, Little Hill and Little Hog left for Nebraska. While he was gone, Chief Little Hill lost his whole family to the elements. Four of his children froze to death, and three died of starvation along with his wife of many years. When he heard what happened to his family at Crow Creek, he felt devastated. But as a true Chief, he finished up his negotiations with the Omaha's, and they agreed to sell the Winnebago's land on their northern border. Soon after the Council meeting was over with, Chief Little Hill went into mourning. And he stayed in mourning for 4 years.

When the rest of the Winnebago's arrived in northeast Nebraska in 1865, they paid their respects to Little Hill. As much as he loved his family, he also loved his people. His family died so he could help his people. This is what tribal love for your family is about. Little Priest said it best;

"Ma-Ona made us Chiefs. And the tribe always comes before our own family. My friend Little Hill is glad that his people have a new home. He told me his family will understand that. They are now in their new home in the spirit world. This love of our people will always hold us together. When we quit loving our own people, then it is time for us to die and be like the white man. Little Hill is strong, and my heart will always think of his sorrows. Ma-Ona will take care of him now. For he is our father."

Little Priest also lost 2 family members at Crow Creek, and he would later lose his life for fighting against his own brothers, but he never forgot the love of family either.

## Land Buy Back Forum...

Winnebago Land Corporation held a Public Forum on Thursday June 7th, I thought it went well as the board and I answered some of the communities inquiries. There was an array of questions from the audience but in the end I thought our mission of buying fee land was accepted by the majority. I post up on my personal facebook about how our tribe formed TOPLA (Tribal Operating Procedures for Land Acquisition) back in the early 80's. It was and still is a great idea to keep a percentage of revenue to acquire more land. As our population is growing, homeownership growing, job growth, etc. etc. need the additional land base to support those efforts.

Land Buyback Outreach will be in full swing the week of the Pow-wow. Other news the Winnebago Land Corporation will be relocating to the office next to Daga's Mexican Grill by the end of July. It will be a work in progress while we are transitioning to the new offices, so excuse us please. I can be reached at youngrogue13@gmail.com.

## Mosquito Control Awareness: Say Goodbye to Mosquitoes at Home



Now that it's mosquito season, it is the perfect time to look in and around your home for ways to control mosquitoes that can carry viruses like Zika and West Nile.

Install or repair window and door screens.

There are many options when it comes to mosquito control for your home. No single activity will effectively control mosquitoes, so you should combine both indoor and outdoor mosquito control activities to keep in and around your home free of mosquitoes.

### Control mosquitoes inside your home

No one likes having a mosquito flying inside their house. Luckily, there are easy steps you and your family can take to keep mosquitoes out and to get rid of the ones that do get in.

First, keep mosquitoes from getting in by making sure you have screens installed on your windows and doors, and fix any

holes in them. Although a summer breeze is nice, keeping windows and doors shut and using air conditioning when possible will help keep mosquitoes out.

Mosquitoes lay their eggs near water. Those that get into your home will look for vases or flower pot saucers with water to lay their eggs on. To eliminate these areas and prevent eggs from hatching, once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, or throw out any items that hold water.

Finally, if you have a hard time keeping mosquitoes out, you can apply an indoor insect fogger or spray according to label instructions to kill mosquitoes that get inside. Mosquitoes like dark and humid places, so make sure to spray under sinks and furniture and in the laundry room.

### Control mosquitoes outside your home

Empty areas of standing water where mosquito can lay eggs.

Summer is the time for backyard bar-

beques and fun, but that can quickly be interrupted if your yard is full of mosquitoes. There are many things you can do to reduce mosquitoes in your yard and make time outdoors more enjoyable.

Areas with standing water around your yard are perfect places for mosquitoes to lay their eggs. Once a week, you should empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out any items that hold water like tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, or trash containers. Water storage containers should be tightly covered and for those without lids, wire mesh with small holes than an adult mosquito can't fit through.

For areas of standing water that will not be used for drinking and cannot be covered or emptied, like backyard ponds, use larvicides to kill young mosquitoes.

You can use an outdoor insect fogger or spray in your backyard to reduce the number of mosquitoes. Always follow the instructions on the label. Make sure to spray under patio furniture or under the carport or garage where mosquitoes like to rest.

If your home has a septic tank, repair



cracks or gaps and cover open vent or plumbing pipes with wire mesh that has holes smaller than an adult mosquito.

Help with mosquito control

If you do not want to apply indoor or outdoor mosquito control products yourself, you can hire a pest control professional.

Prevent mosquito bites

In addition to controlling mosquitoes in and around your home, you should also protect yourself and your family from mosquito bites. Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents with one of the following active ingredients: DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol. Apply insect repellents according to label instructions. When used as directed, EPA-registered insect repellents are proven safe and effective, even for pregnant and breastfeeding women. Wearing long-sleeved shirts and pants will also help prevent bites.

## Zika: The Basics of the Virus and How To Protect Against It

### About Zika

Zika virus spreads to people primarily through the bite of an infected *Aedes* species mosquito (*Ae. aegypti* and *Ae. albopictus*). People can also get Zika through sex with a man infected with Zika and it can be spread from a pregnant woman to her fetus. People can protect themselves from mosquito bites and getting Zika through sex. This fact sheet explains who's most affected and why, symptoms and treatment, and how to protect against Zika.

### How Zika Spreads

The mosquitoes that carry Zika are aggressive daytime biters, but they can also bite at night. A mosquito becomes infected when it bites a person already infected with Zika. That mosquito can then spread the virus by biting more people.

Zika virus can also spread:

- During sex with a man infected with Zika.
- From a pregnant woman to her fetus during pregnancy or around the time of birth.
- Through blood transfusion (likely but not confirmed).

### Zika Symptoms

Many people infected with Zika won't have symptoms or will only have mild symptoms. The most common symptoms are fever, rash, joint pain, or red eyes. Other common symptoms include muscle pain and headache. Symptoms can last for several days to a week. People usually don't get sick enough to go to the hospital, and they very rarely die of Zika. Once a person has been infected with Zika, they are likely to be protected from future infections.

### Why Zika is Risky for Some People

Zika infection during pregnancy can cause fetuses to have a birth defect of the brain called microcephaly. Other problems have been detected among fetuses and infants infected with Zika virus before birth, such as defects of the eye, hearing deficits, and impaired growth. There have also been increased reports of Guillain-Barré syndrome, an uncommon sickness of the nervous system, in areas affected by Zika.

### How to Prevent Zika

There is no vaccine to prevent Zika. The best way to prevent diseases spread by mosquitoes is to protect yourself and your family from mosquito bites. Here's how:

- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
- Stay in places with air conditioning and window and door screens to keep mosquitoes outside.
- Take steps to control mosquitoes *inside and outside your home*.
- Treat your clothing and gear with permethrin or buy pre-treated items.
- Use *Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered* insect repellents. Always follow the product label instructions.
  - When used as directed, these insect repellents are proven safe and effective even for pregnant and breastfeeding women.
  - Do not use insect repellents on babies younger than 2 months old.
  - Do not use products containing oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol on children younger than 3 years old.
- Mosquito netting can be used to cover babies younger than 2 months old in carriers, strollers, or cribs to protect them from mosquito bites.
- Sleep under a mosquito bed net if air conditioned or screened rooms are not available or if sleeping outdoors.
- Prevent sexual transmission of Zika by using condoms or not having sex.

### What to do if You Have Zika

There is no specific medicine to treat Zika.

Treat the symptoms:

- Get plenty of rest.
- Drink fluids to prevent dehydration.
- Take medicine such as acetaminophen to reduce fever and pain.
- Do not take aspirin or other non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs.
- If you are taking medicine for another medical condition, talk to your healthcare provider before taking additional medication.

To help prevent others from getting sick, strictly follow steps to prevent mosquito bites during the first week of illness.

Y Fitness Schedule for July (starts 7/1/16 - 7/27/16) We will not be open 7/4/16 (Tribal Holiday)

Due to the increasing incidences happening at the Whirling Thunder Wellness Center, I have provided a review of a few of our policies and procedures. Our goal is to provide a safe environment where people can come and use the facility without harassment or bullying.

Profanity, bullying, or name-calling will not be tolerated. If a participant refuse to change their behavior after one warning, they will be removed from the activity for one week. Adult behavior is subjected to this policy when participating in or attending a WTWP activity. The severity of the incident will be evaluated by staff who witnessed the incident and consultation will take place with the Supervisor(s). Parents and children have the right to file an incident report on both children and other adult behavior. The parents of each respective child or parents will be called in for a meeting to discuss the incident and come to a reasonable solution. If the behavior continues and future incidents occur, more serious actions will be deemed necessary and a decision will be made by the Supervisor(s) as to what that will be.

A "fight" will be defined as kicking, punching, pushing, slapping, etc. between 2 or more participants mutually engaged in this behavior. The police department will be notified to come investigate and file a report on the incident. This should be considered a serious incident and a suspension from the facility will occur. The person that started the fight will be removed and suspended. Adult behavior is subject to this policy when participating in a WTWP activity. Penalty is automatic restriction from the use and participation of our services and equipment for a period of six (6) months.

All WTWP staff, activities, and program events must be alcohol and drug free. If a patron(s) participating in or attending a WTWP activity or event is suspected of or found to be intoxicated they will be asked to leave the premises. If the "suspect" patron refuses to cooperate, police will be contacted immediately. "Suspected of" is in reference to having the odor of behavior of being intoxicated with alcohol, marijuana, or chemical substances. If the "suspect" patron causes any violent incident such as a fight, the "suspect" patron will be asked to leave the premises and the police will be contacted immediately. If any WTWP staff is suspected of being intoxicated, the Winnebago Tribe Policies & Procedures will be strictly adhered to.


