IHS Awards Contract for Hospital Surveys, Education and Training

Federal-government-operated hospitals in 8 states to benefit from accreditation services

The Indian Health Service has awarded a one-year contract for \$700,000 to The Joint Commission for accreditation services for IHS federal-government-operated medical facilities and training and education services to strengthen quality and patient safety. Training and education will benefit IHS facilities in Arizona, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma and South Dakota.

Like other hospitals in the private and public sectors, IHS hospitals are "surveyed," or inspected, by independent experts so IHS can identify and correct any issues before they affect patients. IHS hospitals will benefit from this new contract that will test their readiness for compliance surveys conducted by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), another part of the Department of Health and Human

Services. CMS surveys assess hospital compliance in meeting Medicare program requirements.

"This new contract underscores the IHS commitment to enhancing patient safety and ensuring high quality care for our patients," said Mary Smith, principal deputy director of the IHS. "IHS is working with our tribal partners and with independent hospital quality experts to ensure that uniform processes for identifying any potential issues are in place, consistent with best practices in hospital administration."

This contract is part of ongoing IHS efforts for quality improvement in patient care in federally operated IHS hospitals. IHS is proactively ensuring that all federally operated IHS hospitals meet the standards required for CMS certification and are prepared for CMS surveys. IHS has previously announced that it is beginning a system-wide mock survey initiative at its hospitals to assess compliance with Medicare program

requirements and readiness for re-accreditation.

With this contract, IHS is also responding to requirements of the Systems Improvement Agreements between IHS and CMS for Rosebud and Pine Ridge Hospitals in South Dakota. These hospitals are two of those covered by the contract announced today. IHS will provide training on the CMS Conditions of Participation for the Medicare and Medicaid programs and expand its capacity to support quality improvement work through this contract, as required by the agreements.

Sixteen IHS federal-government-operated hospitals are currently accredited by The Joint Commission.

The IHS, an agency in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, provides a comprehensive health service delivery system for approximately 2.2 million American Indians and Alaska Natives.

Indianz.com... Chukchansi Tribe sends disenrollment letters to founding families

The Picayune Rancheria of the Chukchansi Indians in California is once again trying to remove more people from the rolls.

This time the targets include members of the tribe's founding families. They are the ones who kept the Chukchansi people together following their termination by the federal government in 1958. The tribe was eventually restored to recognition through the landmark Tillie Hardwick case in 1983.

"I am really disappointed by this council, though I should not be surprised," Sam Lawhon, 47, who has been threatened with removal despite being a member since 1983, told The Sierra Star.

Lawhon's wife, Kim, also received a disenrollment letter, the paper said. She is one of the few people who can teach the Chukchansi language. One of the last fluent speakers was ousted by the tribe a few years ago.

Editorial: Name of hotel in Arizona is a slap in the face to Native women

Pointe Hilton Squaw Peak Resort a slap in the face to Piestewa

Is the word "squaw" an obscene word? We think it all depends on the many variations of "Obscenity."

In the Algonquin language the word squaw simply translates to mean "woman."

On the Oprah Winfrey Show in 1992 where Tim Giago, Suzanne Harjo and Michael Haney were guests to talk about the Washington football team's usage of the word "Redskin," Harjo said, "The word squaw is an Algonquin [sic] Indian word meaning vagina, and that'll give you an idea of what the French and British fur trappers were calling all Indian women, and I hope no one ever uses that term again."

Of course the people in the audience and Oprah herself let out a big, surprised groan, Giago said and they all were stunned by what Harjo just said.

Most people now feel that this was the beginning of organized efforts to remove the word "squaw" from the name of places, etc. The word was bandied about after that and no one could really refute what Harjo had just said. Giago's Indian Country Today newspaper had a branch office in Scottsdale, Arizona at the time and the paper began to question the city of Phoenix for having named a hill in the middle of town "Squaw Peak."

As the paper researched the origin of the name its writers soon discovered that the original name of the hill was "Squaw Tit Peak" but a group of Christian ministers found the word "Tit"

much too offensive so they petitioned the city to drop the "Tit" and just call it Squaw Peak." A present day writer for Indian Country Today named Vincent Schilling apparently had no inkling of the history of his own paper so when he wrote an extensive article for the newspaper about the usage of the word "squaw" he completely left out the campaign his own newspaper ran in the early 1990s to change the name of "Squaw Peak" to "Piestewa Peak" to honor Specialist Lori Piestewa, a member of the Hopi Tribe, who was the first Native American woman in history to die in combat while serving in the U. S. military. She died in the first few days of the invasion of Iraq.

A lot of other more powerful sources joined the fight and the peak was renamed "Piestewa Peak." Indian Country Today's actions in bringing about the change were soon overshadowed and that is probably why one of its writers knows nothing about his own papers history.

The staff of Native Sun News was shocked and annoyed to read a recent travel magazine that listed two places where vacationers would find peace and harmony. One was the Pointe Hilton Squaw Peak Resort in Phoenix and the other was the Resort at Squaw Creek located at Squaw Valley in Tahoe, California.

What was particularly annoying was

Hawk's Dad: Thank you son, I'm proud of you. You trusted me with the worries you have about your friend. I want you to know I'll always have your back-don't ever doubt it! But what's making me really proud is you know how much we love you. We have tried to show you who we are as Native people and that it means truly caring for each other. Many of us have problems that are not always seen by others, and as I grow older I know it helps to share problems, I do that with your mom. You're really helping Mike. I know a little about his situation because Uncle went to school with his dad. I'm not really sure what we should do first, but we need to talk to his grandma too, maybe you never knew but we are related. Uncle used to call her Auntie and we should too!

Ms. Greengrass and Mr. Kotter are heading up to see Grandma during lunch. They knock on the door and are greeted by a woman in her early 70's. Ms. Greengrass presents her with some biscuits she made this morning. Grandma invites them in and gives Mr. Kotter a long look. They head to the kitchen table and grandma has coffee ready.

Mr. Kotter tells Grandma that Mike's a good kid. I can see his intelligence and he's protective of his sister. Sherry let us know about the loss of your son and daughter-in-law on the first day of school. We know you are doing a lot for your grandchildren and it can't be easy. Everyone sits in silence for a while. Grandma starts to speak.

Grandma: I get them off to school, put food on the table, they help with the laundry and cleaning, but I don't know how to help them with the problems I know they are going through. I know they feel they are a burden on me, but I wouldn't have it any other way even though it's been hard. That's why when you called I felt some hope, like someone cared.

Ms. Greengrass pulls her chair closer and reaches for grandma's

hand. You know you don't have to do it alone, my grandma raised six of us, but she had the help of her sisters and brothers-my uncles and aunties really pitched in. Grandma listens and all are quiet in the moment. The silence is interrupted by a knock on the door.

Mr. Kotter gets the door. Joe, Hawk's dad, is standing in the doorway. Joe greets his Auntie and tells him he is Jack's brother who used to always hang around with her son Sam. She gives a little cry and says she remembers. They hug and she tells him these are Mike's teachers and they are here cause Jesse, Sam's youngest, asked them for help. He is worried about Mike. Joes says, well guess what Auntie that's what I'm here about too, I should be surprised but I'm not, you know how we always say things happen for a reason.

Kotter is happy to meet Hawk's dad and there is a good feeling among the four of them and talk comes easy. They all agree on what the next steps are. Joe is gonna invite Mike over to spend more time with their family and because he and Hawk got a long so well. Kotter and Greengrass will talk to school admin about the bullying and what their policies are-since they are only here this year for summer school. Ms. Greengrass will reach out to someone within the tribal offices for resources for grandma. With this all are feeling good about the session and Kotter and Greengrass head back to the classroom.

Grandma and Joe are sitting at the table talking. After a long while Joe asks about the kids and how they are dealing with their parents' accident. He wonders if they had the time to deal with the loss spiritually, since he knew the accident didn't allow for the usual funeral, being able to view the body, our sending off ceremonies- and with them being buried in the cities. She starts to quietly cry. They sit for a while again and Joe says, Auntie I want to have a ceremony for all of you.

that although the name of the hill had been changed the City of Phoenix still would not let go of the name, or perhaps it was the Hilton Hotel chain. By continuing to use the name it is a slap in the face to the Hopi warrior who gave her life for this country.

Perhaps the name "squaw" does not have the vulgar connotation assigned to it by Harjo, but through the centuries the name has become one associated with sluts and prostitutes or just easy prey for white men. Our test of whether one finds the name offensive or not has been to suggest that a white male walk up to an Indian woman and say, "Hey squaw!" He had better duck after that because there will be a fist flying at his head.

Perhaps Indian Country Today and

other Indian publications should question the owners of the Hilton hotel chain and the folks up at Squaw Valley and find out why they are still using an archaic name that every Indian woman in America deems to be an insult.

I touched on per capita payments my last two columns. My point was that we can't afford to give \$1.5 to \$3 million dollars away annually and continue to provide much needed community development. I got a ton of feedback on that column. Some was positive. Some not so much.

to pursue a better life by trying to find a better job or quality housing. Even now, we have hundreds of members living just off the reservation because they need housing or want a better education for their children.

I think the Tribe should focus on putting as much money as possible into developing the reservation. The per capita payment goes poof in a matter of days, but what if that money was used to invest in creating jobs, building more homes, beefing up our college, building a nursing home, or building more quality housing for tribal elders. If you wanted to move home then we could provide you with a place to live, a way to make a living and a quality education for yourself and your children.

I really think that the Tribe should make the commitment to making Winnebago fantastic and doing all we can to make it place you want to come back to. But we can't afford to do that and give away \$3 million a year anymore. Just think what we could do with that much money. We could build 20 nice houses a year and just give them away. I propose a free house lottery. Within a generation we will have built 400 new homes and given them to tribal members and our town will have doubled in size. So when our tribal members are ready to move home, Winnebago will be a wonderful place to live and enjoy our unique culture. Or we can take our \$250 each year and go up to Walmart and buy some stuff.

We need to quit thinking so small and set big goals and then do what it takes to make it happen. A free home for every family is within our grasp and we just need to make a few small sacrifices.

The best of the comments was a tribal member, who is known for making plenty of unsolicited suggestions about what other people should do, suggested that the Tribe implement an income tax on tribal members who work for the Tribe so that they can pay him a per capita payment. I have never known this person to work in my 23 years here in Winnebago and I can assure you I do not support a tax to pay per capita payments to those who don't bother to work themselves.

One tribal member mentioned that per capita is one of the only things off reservation members get. His comment was mostly correct. I do think the big benefit for off reservation members is educational funding help. However, that only applies to a certain subset of tribal members. But it raises an interesting point. When you leave the reservation does the tribe owe you something?

When a person moves from Nebraska to Iowa, does Nebraska have any responsibility to them as former citizens? The answer is most likely no. In our case, we are a bit more than residents of course, but I think the Tribe's primary responsibility is to developing our homeland. Lots of people had to leave Winnebago because they wanted

"The Ho-Chunk's Creed #4"

"The Ho-Chunk's Creed" was given out in a Winnebago History 1 class at Little Priest Tribal College. Our instructor listed fifteen main thoughts of the Ho-chunk Nation. The fourth main thought was: "He believed in the subjection of the body by fasting, when ever it seemed necessary for the absolute domination of the spirit; as when, in some great crisis, that spirit felt the need for better insight."

One such training that has gone out of favor is self-denial and the ability to patiently wait. In these days 'immediate' gratification is expected; 'quick' service such as fast food, microwave preparation is demanded; and 'instant' products such as messaging and texting all move us to live a fast paced life that can place us in hazardous situations as we cannot wait to read and respond right now!

And yet our prayer life and meditation on God and His Sacred Word consume only a fraction of our daily life, as we rush to fulfill our self-centered demands. There seems to be little or no time to accept the gracious invitation to gather in one of God's Houses and to allow Him to bless you, to serve you and to instruct you.

God's Sacred Word reveals that there is a time and place for subjecting one's body by fasting. 'And [the Pharisees and the teachers of the law] said to [Jesus], "The disciples of John fast often and offer prayers, and so do the disciples of the Pharisees, but yours eat and drink." And Jesus said to them, "Can you make wedding guests fast while the bridegroom is with them? The days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast in those days"' (St. Luke 5:33-35).

Jesus' disciples did not fast like others mentioned above, while He was still on the road to the cross. However, after

He rose from the dead and ascended into heaven they did fast.

Jesus gave special instructions regarding fasting so that it would not be done for the wrong reasons or in a self-righteous manner. Jesus taught: "And when you fast, do not look gloomy like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by others. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by others but by your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you" (St. Matthew 6:16-18).

The apostles and other followers of Jesus also fast from time-to-time, especially when an important decision was to be made. "When [Paul and Barnabas] had preached the gospel to that city and had made many disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch, strengthening the souls of the disciples, encouraging them to continue in the faith, and saying that through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God. And when they had appointed elders for them in every church, with prayer and fasting they committed them to the Lord in whom they had believed" (Acts 14:21-23).

Today would be a good day to set aside a day of fasting and prayer. Our community, our nation and our world could sure people who are willing to offer up prayers believing that our Creator will not only hear but respond to our petitions according to His will and in the best possible way.

Next time we will reflect from God's Word on the fourth main thought from the Ho-Chunk's Creed: 'He believed in reverence for his parents, and in old age supported them even as he expected his children to support him.'





News From Tribal EPD...

The Winnebago Tribe Environmental Protection Department Pesticide Circuit Rider Program is proudly sponsoring a Bed Bug Workshop on August 15, at Little Priest Tribal College Auditorium from 10:00 am to noon and again at NICC-Macy Campus from 2:00pm till 4:00pm. UNL Extension Educators, Clyde Ogg, Dr. Jody Green and Dr. Jonathan Larsen will be discussing bed bug biology and myths, battling bed bugs on a budget and bed bug control options. Bed Bugs have been on the rise nationally, and our community is dealing with them too. Getting them is very easy, getting rid of them can be very difficult, costly and time consuming, not to mention stressful for the family. Professional treatment from a Pest Company can cost upwards of a thousand dollars, and 2 treatments are usually recommended.

Lots of families end up throwing furniture away, and are then burdened with the cost to replace beds and sofa, s. Finding products that work can be difficult or almost impossible at times. At this workshop, you'll get all the information you need to help prevent accidentally bringing them home, low cost treatment plans and products that work. We encourage everyone to come and learn about bed bugs, because sooner or later, chances are you'll have to deal with them. As the Tribes, Pesticide Circuit Rider, I'm always available to help people who are dealing with bed bugs in their homes. FAILURE TO SEND CHILD TO SCHOOL; truancy; penalties. 1. A person is guilty of failure to send a child to school if, being the parent, guardian or other person having a child in his/her custody and care, he/she, without good cause, neglects or refuses to send such child to school in accordance with the requirements of Title 7, Article 8, of the Winnebago Tribal Code. 2. I shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of nineteen, but over the age of seven, to be absent for school without good cause. 3. A violation of this Section is an infraction. [TCR 86-79, 98-87, 05-03, 06-49.]


