

## HORSE RACING RETURNS TO ATOKAD



Winnebago, Nebraska – Ho-Chunk, Inc. announced today that they are re-opening the racetrack at Atokad in South Sioux City, Nebraska for sanctioned horse racing. The inaugural live race will be held on Saturday, September 10th at the Atokad Race Track.

Ho-Chunk, Inc. purchased the Atokad property in 2012. Earlier this year, a joint effort between the Nebraska Horsemen's Association and Ho-Chunk, Inc. to amend the Nebraska Constitution to allow casino gaming at licensed Nebraska horse tracks was unsuccessful. However, the company still plans to go forward with horse racing at the Atokad property. Ho-Chunk, Inc. received its license to operate the track earlier this summer. Plans are underway to build a bar and grill in addition to the race track. Both live and simulcast racing will be held at the facility. The September 10th event will fea-

ture a family fun day with activities starting at 3:00 p.m. Events will include pony rides, face painting, a bounce house and more for the kids. For the adults, there will be a "Crazy Hat Competition" where guests can wear their most elaborate and creative race day hat. The first 200 guests will receive a commemorative souvenir. Post time for the live horse race will be at 5:00 p.m. Guests can bet on their favorite horse and enjoy a variety of food and beverages from local vendors including Hy Vee, Daga's Mexican Grill and Wendy's. ## Indiansz.com... Steven Newcomb: Vicious dogs unleashed on #NoDAPL resisters

The use of dogs to attack indigenous people isn't a new tactic observes Steven Newcomb (Shawnee / Lenape) of the Indigenous Law Institute. He traces the Dakota Access Pipeline to the long-running attempts to dominate and subjugate indigenous nations:  
On September 3, 2016, we saw an excellent illustration of a claimed right to coerce our nations into obedience: Private security personnel of Energy Transfer used

ing vicious dogs and pepper spray against Native people (women, children, and men), and non-Native opponents of the Dakota Access Pipeline (DAPL) near Cannonball, North Dakota.  
The contrast between the Oceti Sakowin's prayerful path of the Sacred Pipe, which seeks to protect the precious waters of Mother Earth, her life blood, and the greed-driven path of the Crude Oil Pipeline speaks volumes. That contrast encapsulates the centuries-long conflict between the mindset of the Seven Laws of the Oceti Sakowin (and the spiritual laws of other Original Nations), and the Seven Laws of Domination found in the meaning of Christendom's Latin term

## Colorectal Cancer Awareness and Screening

American Indians and Alaska Natives older than age 50 were less likely than non-Hispanic whites to have received a colon cancer screening test—such as a fecal occult blood test, colonoscopy or sigmoidoscopy—within the past two years, according to 2005 U.S. government data. Alaska Natives who live in rural areas have particularly high rates of colorectal cancer, typically because of lack of resources to perform routine tests that detect early warning signs of the disease, according to the Indian Health Service.

Fortunately, colorectal cancer is highly treatable if caught early enough. If you're older than 50 or at risk for colorectal cancer, you should ask your doctor about getting screened—it could save your life. If everyone aged 50 years or older had regular screening tests, at least 60% of deaths from this cancer could be avoided.

Colorectal cancer is cancer that occurs in the colon or rectum. Sometimes it is called colon cancer. The colon is the large intestine or large bowel. The rectum is the passageway that connects the colon to the anus. Some people with colorectal polyps or

colorectal cancer do have symptoms. They may include:

Blood in or on your stool (bowel movement).

Stomach pain, aches, or cramps that don't go away.

Losing weight and you don't know why.

If you have any of these symptoms, talk to your doctor. These symptoms may be caused by something other than cancer. However, the only way to know what is causing them is to see your doctor. Colorectal Cancer Can Start With No Symptoms!

Several different screening tests can be used to find polyps or colorectal cancer. Each can be used alone. Sometimes they are used in combination with each other. The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommends colorectal cancer screening for men and women aged 50-75 using high-sensitivity fecal occult blood testing (FOBT), sigmoidoscopy, or colonoscopy. Talk to your doctor about which test or tests are right for you. The decision to be screened after age 75 should be made on an individual basis. If you are older than 75, ask your doctor if you should be screened.

The tribe chartered a bus and is sending supplies. I support that protest, but we should also be creating pressure on our people to take better care of their children. Generally these things are embarrassing and we just sweep them under the rug or get mad when brought up. So people just don't say anything.

When our best and brightest students want to share their passion and half the articles relate to drugs and drug treatment then we need to listen and point the finger at ourselves. We need to demand higher standards and stop making excuses for ridiculously selfish behavior. If we need a new program, we should focus on making our young men responsible fathers and preaching to our young women not to have children till they are done growing up themselves and have their own homes and stable relationships.

I am going to stop preaching now, but I am upset. We have come a very long way and are in the middle of creating a stronger community in so many ways, but it pains me to think that in some ways our growing prosperity is really just enabling a section of our community to continue to make bad choices. The parents aren't the only victim of their bad choices, it is also their children and it should stop.

One of the Winnebago flag songs was sung, the pledge of allegiance was said, we sang the Lord's Prayer in Ho-Chunk and spoke it in English, and had an opening prayer for the school year. We asked our Creator through His Son, our Lord and Savior, to bless our preschool children, their families, our veterans for their past and present service, our community as well as our country. We truly thank God for the freedom of gathering together in His name and the courage to teach His Sacred Word.

Some have asked what the flag flying under the U.S. flag represents. This white flag bears a summary of the Christian faith. At the center of the flag is a black cross that reminds us that Jesus died to take the punishment for our sins. Jesus gave the ultimate price and while we were yet sinners died so that all who believe in Him have the blessed hope of everlasting life.

The cross is surrounded by a red heart. The red heart reminds us of the love God has for us in sending Jesus to be our Savior. The red of the heart is the color of the blood of Christ, shed for us and for our salvation. Christians were redeemed, not with gold or silver but with Jesus' holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death.

The heart and the cross are sur-

rounded by a white rose. The white rose helps us remember the work of the Holy Spirit who makes us pure and holy in our Creator's sight by bringing us to faith in Jesus and by helping us to live our lives for Him by serving our families, our neighbors, our country and even our enemies.

The white rose, the heart and the cross is surrounded by a blue background. This sky blue background pictures the joy of the new life in the new heavens that our Creator gives to all who believe and trust in Him.

Finally, the sky blue background the white rose, the heart and the cross is surrounded by a gold ring. The gold ring reminds us of our everlasting life on the new earth where Christians will enjoy complete joy and happiness in our Savior's presence.

We fly this flag high to honor our gracious and loving Creator whose mercy extends to people of every tribe and language and people and nation. We learn of Creator's compassion at the cross upon which His Son, Jesus our Savior, endured the punishment that we deserved so that we would not ourselves be forsaken and banished by our Creator.

South Omaha Campus-27th & Q Industrial Training Center Building. September 2016.

Course Description: PLBG 1010-Introduction to Plumbing—This course will introduce the students to the Plumbing Trade. The topics covered in this course will include plumbing history, plumbing tools, materials safety, applicable math for the trade, work ethic, and careers in the industry.

## Candidate's Forum

I'm Gloria Jean Eagle, and I served you during one of the hardest most heart wrenching episodes that this tribe ever experienced. Those were troubled times but the hard part is over and we must continue the job of rebuilding. The acts of those nine have left a chasm in the tribe. Our government is not a two party system but one full body representing the entire tribe. Elected council members must represent the entire tribe.

I help to write and I signed the letter of complaint that started the process of removal of those council members.

There is still much to be done. The hospital appears that it will survive in some form. The budget was balanced in 2015, and we must keep it balanced and not revert to the robbing Peter to pay Paul method. A nursing home project is on the horizon. The Land Management project is up and running. All of these things were addressed while I was on the council. There was a lot done but hospita and budget were the most urgent.

These are things that happened in the last year since May, 2015. I'm not saying I accomplished all these things alone, but for five months I was there putting my thoughts and words into all discussions/decisions and making or seconding motions. I understood the topic of each motion. I did not use the abstention option, but voted either in favor or not.

I confronted Indian Health Service director and Aberdeen Area medical

personnel and even a Rear Admiral over the deplorable treatment that the Winnebago people and anyone treated at the hospital received especially in the ER department. Things were better at the hospital for a while. The Emergency Department again has problems. I would also learn why there are a lot on non-tribal members employed at the hospital, and seek ways to remedy this if feasible.

My door was open for any tribal member to speak with me. I welcomed tribal members into my home when they needed to speak with someone. While on the council, I never felt it prudent for me to travel because of the uncertainty of the budget.

We must support our native families especially when they are defending their homelands. We must give our support and material things if necessary.

The hospital must never be left without tribal oversight if it is not a full tribal entity. We should expect full professional accountability and superior service (because that's its sole purpose). The Band-Aid, ointment and Tylenol service just will not cut it any more.

I plan to form a committee and with tribal members in-put make a plan to upgrade the pow-wow grounds with landscaping, better parking, camping areas and signage with the name that the grounds go by (maybe incorporating Little Priests Ho Chunk name.)

### Announcement of Decision to Issue Final Clean Air Act Permit

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Region 7 (EPA) is announcing its decision to issue a synthetic minor source permit in accordance with the provisions of the Clean Air Act (CAA) and the Federal Minor New Source Review Program in Indian Country, 40 CFR 49.151 - 49.161, to Thurston Manufacturing Company. The source is located at 1708 H Avenue, Thurston, Nebraska.

The EPA prepared a draft permit and held a public comment period from February 12, 2016 to April 12, 2016. During the public comment period, one commenter provided comments. The EPA changed the permit in response to the comments. After consideration of Thurston Manufacturing Company's completed permit application, the pertinent federal statutes and regulations, the comments received, and additional material considered in response to comments and contained in our Administrative Record, the EPA has made a decision to issue the final permit.

The final permit will be effective on October 21, 2016, which is a delayed effective date to provide time for public notice of this final permit decision.

Under the CAA regulations at 40 CFR 49.159(d), any person who commented on the specific terms and conditions of the proposed permit may petition the Environmental Appeals Board (EAB) to review any term or condition of the permit. A person who failed to file comments may also petition for review, but only as specified in said CAA regulation. In accordance with the regulation at 40 CFR 49.159(d) (2), EPA is specifying that the 30-day period within which a person may request review begins September 20, 2016.




