## Cobell Land Buy Back of Winnebago

As part of the Cobell Settlement, the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska was selected to participate in the \$1.9 Billion Dollar Federal Land Buyback Program with a purchase estimate of \$18.5 Million dollars to be allocated to individual land owners. The timeframe for an offer to be sent to out from the Federal Land Buyback Program is February/March

2017, through a Cooperative Agreement the Winnebago Land Buyback Program is here to assist in pre-offer outreach, answering general questions and notarizing documents and directing other inquiries to the Trust Beneficiary Call Center 888-678-6836. ## Indians.com... Dina Gilio-Whitaker: #NoDAPL crackdown shows how racism lives on

As authorities made hundreds of #NoDAPL arrests in North Dakota, an all-White jury in Oregon was clearing seven people who took over a federal refuge with arms and ammunition. The disparate treatment shows how racism

is alive and well in the United States, argues Dina Gilio-Whitaker, a member of the Colville Tribes:

October 27, 2016 will go down as one of the saddest days in a very long time for Indian country, and for the United States more broadly. The events of this day--the violent police crackdown on the Standing Rock water protectors and the acquittal of Ammon Bundy et al for their armed occupation of a national wildlife area--taken altogether point to a much larger reality that still exists in twenty-first century US: the settler state is here to protect settlers and settler institutions; Native problems are not important enough for the press to be concerned with; which all points to the unavoidable conclusion that white supremacy is still the unspoken law of the land.

The announcement of the Bundy acquittal hit the mainstream media toward the end of the day after hours of a brutal standoff on North Dakota's highway 1806. People were exposed to pepper spraying, sound cannons, concussion grenades, tasers, rubber bullets, the shooting (and killing) of horses, the confiscation of sacred items, and violent arrests. There was even a narrowly averted

incident with a DAPL employee armed with an automatic weapon who was thankfully apprehended by BIA police.

As the aggression unfolded throughout the day, virtually the only live coverage on the ground came from social media. None of the major media outlets appeared to be there to document what may amount to the worst civil rights violations since those of the 1960's. I sat and watched on facebook all day, in horror, as one live feed after another was jammed and then re-established in my effort to bear witness to the crackdown.

## Frank LaMere Speaks...

DEAR GOVERNOR RICKETTS,



AS YOU KNOW I HAVE ASKED COUNTLESS TIMES OVER THE YEARS FOR NEBRASKA TO STOP THE ILLEGAL FLOW OF ALCOHOL FROM WHITECLAY ONTO THE DRY PINE RIDGE INDIAN RESERVATION IN SOUTH DAKOTA. MY PLEAS HAVE FALLEN ON DEAF EARS! I CAME FROM THERE SUNDAY AND I WOULD SHARE THAT THINGS HAVE NEVER BEEN WORSE!

THERE EXISTS AT WHITECLAY A CLIMATE OF FEAR, TENSION AND FRUSTRATION BROUGHT ABOUT BY HOPELESSNESS AND THE TARGETING OF THE VULNERABLE AND ADICTED THERE THAT PREVAILS IRRESPECTIVE OF WHAT APOLOGISTS FOR THE BEER SELLERS WOULD SAY. SHERIDAN COUNTY AND THE STATE OF NEBRASKA PROVIDES LITTLE IF ANY LAW ENFORCEMENT, PUBLIC SAFETY, OR PROTECTION FOR THOSE VICTIMIZED AND EVEN MURDERED AT WHITECLAY AND IT HAS LED TO FEELINGS OF HOSTILITY THAT MUST BE RECOGNIZED BY THOSE IN THE PUBLIC TRUST. IT HAS SADLY BEEN IGNORED! WHITECLAY IS LIKE A TIME BOMB WAITING TO GO OFF! IT CANNOT BE EXPLAINED AWAY.

IN THE EARLY DAYS OF YOUR ADMINISTRATION I ASKED YOU TO SHUT DOWN WHITECLAY AND YOU SAID YOU WOULD ADDRESS THE MATTER. YOU ATTEMPTED TO DO SO BY PUTTING TOGETHER AN ALMOST EXCLUSIVELY WHITE WORK GROUP WHO REMAINS DEVOID OF ANY AUTHORITY, TRANSPARENCY AND ROLE IN THE PUBLIC TRUST. THEY HAVE SECRET, CLOSED MEETINGS THAT I HOPE YOU HAVE NOT SANCTIONED. THEY HAVE BECOME A "STRAW MAN" WHOSE ONLY FUNCTION THAT I SEE IS TO KEEP THE FLOW OF ALCOHOL AND MISERY GOING NORTH AND THE DOLLARS AND TAX REVENUE FLOWING SOUTH. I RECOUNT ALL OF THIS FOR A REASON GOVERNOR.

I HAVE ASKED YOU AND THE STATE OF NEBRASKA TO STOP THE DEATH, THE DYING AND THE LAWLESSNESS AT WHITECLAY AND THE CRIPPLING OF THE CHILDREN CAUSED BY FETAL ALCOHOL SYNDROME BY TAKING THE LICENSES AWAY FROM THE BEER SELLERS. YOU SAID YOU HAD NO AUTHORITY AND THAT I SHOULD APPROACH THE LIQUOR CONTROL COMMISSION. I DID SO. THEY SAID THEY HAD NO AUTHORITY AND THAT THEY WOULD NEED EVIDENCE. I GATHER THAT FIVE UNSOLVED BRUTAL MURDERS SINCE 1997 WAS NOT ENOUGH EVIDENCE SO I FOCUSED

ON THE BEATING DEATH OF SHERRY WOUNDED FOOT WHO WAS FOUND IN WHITECLAY ON AUGUST 5TH. I ASKED THE STATE PATROL OF THEIR INVESTIGATION BUT THEY SAID THEY HAD NO AUTHORITY AND THAT SHERIDAN COUNTY MUST LEAD THE INVESTIGATION. THAT TRAGICALLY IS HOW IT HAS GONE AND HOW I BELIEVE IT WILL ALWAYS GO.

YESTERDAY, I WAS TOLD THAT MORTON COUNTY, NORTH DAKOTA SENT OUT A PLEA FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS FROM NEBRASKA TO JOIN THEM AT THE DAKOTA ACCESS PIPELINE CONSTRUCTION SITES TO COUNTER PEACEFUL AND PRAYERFUL NATIVE PEOPLE AND THEIR ALLIES WHO ARE EXERCISING THEIR TREATY AND CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS TO STAND UP FOR MOTHER EARTH AND FOR OUR WATER.

I AM TOLD THAT NEBRASKA BY AGREEMENT MUST DO THAT AND THAT ALL THE POWERS THAT BE IN THE GOVERNORS OFFICE, THE STATE PATROL AND OTHER AGENCIES IN THE PUBLIC TRUST HAD NO PROBLEM FINDING THE AUTHORITY THEY NEED TO SUPPORT WHAT I THINK IS ONE OF THE MOST CORRUPT STATES IN THE COUNTRY. NORTH DAKOTA HAS ALLOWED OIL COMPANIES TO RUN RAMPANT OVER TRIBAL LANDS AND THEN MISTREAT THOSE WHO WOULD ASK THEM WHY.

AS A NATIVE AMERICAN AND A NEBRASKAN I WOULD ASK YOU WHY YOU WOULD EVEN CONSIDER SENDING NEBRASKANS TO STAND BESIDE LAWYERS WHO WOULD PEPPER SPRAY, USE BATONS, PHYSICALLY ABUSE AND OTHERWISE MANHANDLE INDIAN MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN WHO HAVE NO WAY TO DEFEND THEMSELVES. SOME OF YOUR OWN NEBRASKA NATIVE CITIZENS WERE MACED AND BITTEN BY ATTACK DOGS! IT IS UNCONSCIONABLE THAT NEBRASKA POLICE OFFICERS OR MEMBERS OF THE STATE PATROL EVEN CONSIDER BEING A PART OF THE FIASCO THERE MUCH LESS ON A FRONT LINE STARING DOWN THOSE WHO ARE LOOKING OUT AND EVEN PRAYING FOR THEM.

I DO NOT KNOW PROTOCOL NOR DO I WISH A TUTORIAL. I SIMPLY ASK YOU TO RESCIND ANY ORDER OR AUTHORIZATION OR PULL BACK ANY NEBRASKA LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL FROM THE STANDING ROCK GATHERING. LET THOSE AT STANDING ROCK EXERCISE THEIR GOD GIVEN RIGHT TO TRY TO LIVE, TO GROW AND TO FLOURISH AND TO PROVIDE A BETTER WAY FOR THE GENERATIONS TO COME! WE WILL ALL BE THE BETTER FOR IT.

IF THERE IS JUSTIFICATION NEEDED TO KEEP OUR PEACE OFFICERS AT HOME SEND THEM TO SHERIDAN COUNTY AND WHITECLAY TO ENFORCE THE LAW, TO SOLVE COUNTLESS UNSOLVED MURDERS, TO STOP BOOTLEGGING, TO ENFORCE LIQUOR LAWS VIOLATED BY SELLERS HOURLY AND TO KEEP ORDER. I SAY ORDER BECAUSE THERE IS NO PEACE. NEBRASKA HAS OUR OWN STANDING ROCK...IT IS WHITECLAY. WE SHOULD TAKE CARE OF OUR OWN PROBLEMS. THANK YOU FOR YOUR INDULGENCE,

Donald Warne, MD, MPH is the chair of the Department of Public Health at North Dakota State University, and he serves as the Senior Policy Advisor to the Great Plains Tribal Chairmen's Health Board. In addition, he is an adjunct clinical professor at the Arizona State University Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law where he taught American Indian Health Policy. Dr. Warne is a member of the Oglala Lakota tribe from Pine Ridge, South Dakota and comes from a long line of traditional healers and medicine men. He received his MD from Stanford University in 1995 and his Master of Public Health from Harvard University as a Commonwealth Fund/Harvard University Fellow in Minority Health Policy in 2002. Dr. Warne is a Certified Diabetes Educator (CDE), and he is a Diplomate of both the American Board of Family Practice and the American Board of Medical Acupuncture. In addition to Minority Health Policy, he completed a Fellowship in Alternative Medicine from the Arizona Center for Health and Medicine.

The Governor has been rough on the tribe lately. He was against our gambling petition. He cancelled our tobacco compact negotiations in what seemed like retaliation for our gambling petition and he recently sent the Nebraska state patrol to arrest native pipeline protesters in North Dakota.

The Governor has been giving people money who he expects will do what he wants. I heard that Mrs. Albrecht said she would not be beholden to him, but giving the situation, I think that Ardel Bengston is the better choice for me.

I sometimes wonder what is more important in Winnebago, the national election or the Tribal election. I would usually say the tribal election except for the fact that our turnout for the last tribal election was embarrassingly low compared to some previous years—less than 500. Our low voter turnout combined with the fact that most of our members live off the reservation or are under age means approximately 8 percent of the Winnebago people decided who should be our leaders this year.

I have never been a big proponent of off-reservation voting, but when only 8 percent of us vote it creates a problem. The whole election system becomes susceptible to manipulation by one or two large extended families with an embedded interest. Families tend to vote together and they vote their financial interest more often than not. This creates the potential for overt and subtle abuses.

I don't like the possibility that our tribal government is at risk of becoming a family business, but the promises made to get into office and to stay in office often create real pressure to provide jobs or benefits to those family members or close supporters. All of this creates inefficiency, costs money and leads us down the wrong path.

### Hillary?

The whole goofy presidential election is the largest reality TV show in history and has made the entire election a joke. Maybe Trump will finally get his Emmy. I am voting for Hillary Clinton. She isn't the most inspiring candidate and she is so politically calculating that it is hard to imagine any significant changes under her administration. But, I sure as heck ain't voting for Trump who just

### "A Time for Civil Disobedience?"

Civil disobedience, when it is proper and necessary to disobey those who are in authority? Please be very careful how you answer this question.

When people in position of authority abuse their power they should be held accountable. However, as my mom taught: two wrongs don't make it right.

Soon there will be an election and it appears that less than half of Americans support either presidential candidate. Who is responsible for the one who will be left standing and voted in? In a word: 'God.' Yes, God allows those who by fair elections, or by hook or by crook, are elected or even those who over power others.

This is what Paul, who was inspired by God's Spirit, wrote to all those in Rome who are loved by God and called to be saints: 'Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment.' [Romans 13:1-2 ESV]

Saul, the first king of Israel rose up against a shepherd boy named David in order to kill him. David was given two opportunities to take King Saul's life, but he would not harm the one whom God had anointed as king.

In Jesus' day, Caesar was the dominate emperor of the occupying forces of the Roman army. Caesar had appointed Herod Antipas, the son of King Herod the Great, to rule over the region of Galilee. It was during this time that the Pharisees and the Herodians, (those who supported King Herod), attempted to trap Jesus with this question: "Teacher, we know that you are true and teach the way of God truthfully, and you do not care about anyone's opinion, for you are not swayed by appearances. Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar, or not?" [Matthew 22:15-17 ESV]

If Jesus took a position by saying 'yes' or 'no' to their question he would be called a traitor. Saying 'Yes', he would either be a traitor to Caesar, the one whom God had placed in position of authority, or saying 'No' then he would be a traitor to his own tribal people. What was his answer?

"But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, "Why put me to the test, you hypocrites? Show me the coin for the tax." And they brought him a denarius. And Jesus said to them, "Whose likeness and inscription is this?" They said, "Caesar's." Then he said to them, "Therefore render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's." Matthew 22:18-21 ESV]

It was not long after this encounter that Jesus would unjustly be sentenced to death by the Roman governor, Pontius Pilate. This same Pilate released Barabbas a known terrorist and attempted to wash his hands of the matter.

The Good News is that Jesus was willing to be unjustly stripped, whipped, spit upon, mocked, and nailed to a cross by a ruler that His Heavenly Father placed in authority. Jesus paid with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death all the injustice in the world. Jesus died so that you might have the promise of the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation. Faith in Jesus receives these blessings and no government or authority can deny you of them.

Back to the question found in the title of this article: Is there a time for civil disobedience? Yes, when it comes to honoring God above all else.

One example is when Peter and John were instructed to stop telling others the Good News about Jesus they replied to the Jewish ruling council: 'Judge for yourselves whether it is right in God's sight to obey you rather than God. For we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard.' [Acts 4:19 NIV]

Effective January 1st, 2017, The Social Services Program (JET/TANF) will no longer be providing clothing vouchers to anyone who has already obtained employment. The program will only provide a clothing voucher to current clients of the program. Each client will be required to participate in our job ready curriculum and actively seeking employment. Once the client obtains employment, we will then be able to help with a clothing voucher, as long as the employment is permanent and full time. We cannot do clothing vouchers for those that are hired through a temp agency, such as Manpower or Short Staffing. However, there are other avenues to take for those particular situations. Participants do not need to be receiving TANF or GA grants to be considered a client of the Social Services program. They simply need to be involved with the TANF, General Assistance, or Employment & Training

**Programs.** All clothing vouchers will require a transport by one of our staff during business hours. In order to follow new policies in our Finance Department, we will be required to obtain receipts and return them the same day. Please keep this in mind when applying for assistance. We are not able to make any exceptions regarding this policy.
