

Educare Adds More Trees to its Outdoor Learning Area



On October 18th, 2016 the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska's Early Language Initiative of Educare Winnebago received a grant of seven trees from the Nebraska Environmental Trust and US Forest Service Redesign Grants as part of the Re-Tree Nebraska Program of UNL. The trees were recently planted in our new outdoor learning area. This is the first phase of development for the Educare Winnebago Early Language Initiative "Outdoor Learning Area". We began to develop the Outdoor Learning Area for all the students of Educare Winnebago to help them learn about their cultural connection to the Earth and all the living things around them. They are taught about nature, the earth, the sky, the weather, the insects, the animals and all of earth's beauty. All of this is taught to them in English and in the native language of the Winnebago Tribe "HoChunk". All students of Educare Winnebago are taught the basic words they are learning in Early-Head Start and in Head Start in the HoChunk language. As part of the grant we are hosting a special event to educate the students of Educare Winnebago about the importance of trees, in our lives, in the lives of the animals and in the life of Mother Earth. The trees were planted by the students of the seven preschool classrooms and each tree will be their tree to raise for many generations. We will offer some cultural practices to help the trees grow and to let our sacred children bless the ground with their sacred foot prints. A call to form the 'United Sovereign Indian Nations of America' Notes from Indian Country By Tim Giago (Nanwica Kciji - Stands Up For Them)

In what seemed like a virtual nightmare a misogynist bigot was elected as the President of the United States. Of course he is called the "President-Elect" until he is sworn in, but the ceremony itself is just a formality.

The fear among the people of the "Sovereign Indian Nations of America" should be genuine. President-Elect Donald Trump was emphatic in his opposition to Indian gaming and used his own form of racial insults to get his point across. "They don't even look like Indians" was his favorite put-down. He slammed Senator Elizabeth Warren, who was born and raised in Oklahoma, as "Pocahontas." Warren mentioned at one time that she believed she had some Indian blood but never ever used that claim to advance her career.

It is reported that Trump has holdings in the Dakota Access Pipeline and is so strong in his support of the oil industry that he is considering reviving the Keystone XL Pipeline, a project that was shut down by President Obama. There is great fear at the Indian Health Service that if, or we should say when, he rejects the Affordable Health Care Act, or Obama Care, as it was labeled by the Republicans, the Indian Health Service will be among the losers.

The emphasis on this editorial should be "Sovereign Indian Nations of America." For too long the Indian Nations have been going their separate ways. The rich tribes have grown richer while the poor tribes have gone poorer. The large tribes known by some as "Treaty Tribes" have for the most part been left standing by the roadside. The saying "A House divided cannot stand" made famous during the Civil War, should be adopted by all of the Indian Nations.

Some may scoff, but I believe the election of Donald Trump will put the Sovereign Indian Nations of America at a crossroads they have not faced since the turn of the 19th century when their lands were being divided piece meal by a greedy Congress pushed hard by those who coveted that lands of the Sovereign Indian Nations of America.

And please, those of you who believe we should not be concerned or should not participate in this Nation's elections remember this, it was an elected president, Abraham Lincoln, who signed off on the condemnation of 38 Sioux warriors for defending their country in the largest mass hanging in the history of America.

It was Teddy Roosevelt who, along with Congress, took millions of acres of Indian lands and turned them into National Parks. And to put an emphasis on what a president and a Congress can do in its infinite control over the Indian Nations, Google the Dawes Severalty Act of 1887. By a stroke of a pen millions of

acres of Indian land were opened up to the white settlers without the input of a single Native American.

I strongly suggest that the very wealthy tribes lead the fight to form a United Sovereign Indian Nations of America by bringing all of the sovereign tribes together in one united front. It would appear that history tells us that the Indian tribes could never unite in any endeavor, but when their very survival is on the line, it is time that history is changed.

The natural leader in this effort should be the National Congress of American Indians because they have the history and the wherewithal to do the job, but do they have the courage and determination?

50 years from now when the Indian people look back at this time in our history will they have strong regrets over what we have lost or will they have great praise for what we have won?

Candidate Hillary Clinton had the slogan that the Indian Nations must adopt; "We are stronger together." Her loss is our loss.





Rudi Giuliani as the Attorney General. When he was the mayor of New York City he really went after some of the New York tribes for selling tribal tobacco, which is a major business for Ho-Chunk, Inc. If he is the Attorney General, he will have the power to basically ignore tribal laws and hand over more power to the states. Strike Three!

Also, you can forget about stopping the Dakota Access Pipeline by expecting the federal regulatory agencies to be come to the rescue. Trump is going to put oil company representatives in key positions and has people advising him who don't believe in climate change—although it was 66 degrees today and it is mid-November. Strike Four!

Even worse, the U.S. Supreme court is divided equally and he has promised to appoint people like the late Justice Anthony Scalia, a guy who never choose tribal rights over state rights. Our economic growth is dependent upon a very few key legal cases and I am very concerned that the legal landscape will tilt against tribes even more. Strike Five, if there is such a thing.

On a final note, I am not just worried about Indians. Lots of working class white people voted for Trump. If they think he gives one care about them then they are dreaming. He doesn't build working class housing. He builds luxury towers. He doesn't build golf courses or country clubs for the average Joe. He wouldn't let most of his voters join his clubs. He has a history of using the legal system to threaten people and stiff the average worker. So enjoy it while he cuts taxes for rich people and explains how cutting your benefits and health care is actually good for you—maybe it builds character or something. It is going to get real weird fast in this country and I hope the damage is limited, but I suspect tribal interests and working class people will not be happy four years from now.

I think I might be bad luck. Everyone I mentioned I would vote for lost. I knew that my state legislature vote probably wasn't going to work because her opponent was the clear favorite. But I never expected Hillary to lose. Geez. I am having a hard time believing that Donald Trump is our president. JESUS OUR SAVIOR LUTHERAN OUTREACH

"The Divine Task of Fatherhood"

In his earthly ministry, Jesus used "Father" more than any other name for God. The essence of fatherhood is found in God, not in human beings. And an awareness of the Divine [or God-given] task goes further: God exercises fatherhood, in part, by means of human fatherhood. [This quote taken from page 117 of Gene Edward Veith Jr. and Mary J. Moerbe's book entitled Family Vocation: God's Calling in Marriage, Parenting, and Childhood]

The Divine Task of fatherhood begins with Jesus' Heavenly Father and now those who place their trust in Jesus can call His Father their father. When Jesus was asked by his disciples to teach them to pray he gave them his own prayer. It begins "Our Father who art in heaven."

In explaining what these words mean, Martin Luther in 1529 wrote that the head of the household should teach "With these words [Our Father who art in heaven] God tenderly invites us to believe that He is our Father and that we are His true children, so that with all boldness and confidence we may ask Him as dear children ask their dear father."

The most important task that a father has been given by God is to teach his child or children to trust in God. The father is to be the spiritual leader, leading his family in daily prayer, study of God's Sacred Word, and to gather with God's family in a weekly Divine Service. How are you fathers doing with this God-given duty?

Sadly way too many children are spiritually deprived, mainly due to the failures of fathers to fulfill their God-given duty. Fathers are called to be like Jesus who disciplined his students, teaching them through words and deeds. Earthly fathers are also called to discipline (a form of the word disciple) their children and to assist in forming them morally and spiritually. The fa-

ther's failure usually leads to horrible consequences affecting his children emotionally, physically, mentally and spiritually.

The writer of Hebrews puts this God-given duty of discipline this way:

And have you forgotten the exhortation [from Proverbs 3:11-12] that addresses you as sons? "My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor be weary when reproved by him. For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives."

It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons. For what son is there whom his father does not discipline? If you are left without discipline, in which all have participated, then you are illegitimate children and not sons. Besides this, we have had earthly fathers who disciplined us and we respected them. Shall we not much more be subject to the Father of spirits and live? For they disciplined us for a short time as it seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness. For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it. [Hebrews 12:5-11 ESV]

A loving, caring servant-type father has not merely survived God's discipline but learned and thrived from this experience. As Jesus came into the world not to be served but to serve and lay down his life as a ransom for many, so too a Christian father serves his family, his wife and their child(ren).

A loving, caring servant-type father also knows what it means to forgive as he has been forgiven. He is willing to forgive his child(ren) and to provide them with emotional support, physical protection, and mental encouragement. First and foremost a loving father leads his family to trust in Jesus, as Lord and Savior!

American Broadband Customer Notice

American Broadband provides basic and enhanced telecommunications services within its service area. Basic services are offered at the following rates:

Single Party Residence Service	\$19.95/month
Single Party Business Service	\$30.00/month

Local residence and business service includes voice grade access to the public telephone network; minutes of use for local service provided at no additional charge; access to 911 emergency services; and toll limitation for qualifying low-income consumers.

The Nebraska Telephone Assistance Program (NTAP) is available for qualifying customers. This program provides for monthly service discounts on telephone service. NTAP reduces the cost of local phone service by up to \$12.75 per month. Toll blocking at no charge and reduced deposits are also available through NTAP. NTAP is administered by the Nebraska Public Service Commission

NTAP and Toll Blocking support is available from American Broadband. These programs provide discounts to eligible low-income consumers to help them establish and maintain telephone service.

NTAP assistance lowers the cost of basic, monthly local telephone service. Eligible consumers can receive up to \$12.75 per month in discounts. In addition, the Federal Universal Service Charge is not assessed to consumers participating in Lifeline.

Toll Blocking prevents the placement of all long distance calls for which a subscriber would be charged. Toll blocking is available to eligible consumers at no cost. Also, by choosing this option, consumers are usually not charged a deposit.

To qualify for NTAP, subscribers must either have an income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or the subscriber, one or more of the subscriber's dependents, or the subscriber's household must receive benefits from one of the following assistance programs:

- Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP);
- Federal Public Housing Assistance (Section 8);
- Medicaid;
- Children's Health Insurance Program/Kids Connection (SAM, MAC or EMAC);
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) (formerly the Food Stamps Program);
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI);
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF);
- National School Lunch Program/Free Lunch program; and/or
- State assistance programs (if applicable)

Tribal Lifeline and Tribal Link Up support is also available from American Broadband. These programs provide discounts to eligible low-income consumers to help them establish and maintain telephone service.

Tribal Lifeline assistance lowers the cost of basic, monthly local telephone service. Eligible consumers receive \$26.45 per month in discounts.

Tribal Link Up reduces the cost of initiating new telephone service by providing a \$30 credit. Eligible consumers also qualify for a deferred payment schedule for remaining costs of up to \$200.

A subscriber who lives on Tribal lands and is an eligible resident of Tribal lands is eligible for Tribal Lifeline service if the subscriber, one or more of the subscriber's dependents, or the subscriber's household participates in any of the above-listed qualifying assistance programs or one of the following Tribal-specific federal assistance programs: Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance; Tribally Administered Temporary Assistance for Needy Families; Head Start (if income eligibility criteria are met); or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR). Tribal subscribers may also qualify if the household income is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. For information regarding Tribal Lifeline services from American Broadband call American Broadband's office at (888) 262-2661.

American Broadband's voice service is a Lifeline-supported service. Only eligible consumers may enroll in the Lifeline program. Lifeline applicants must present documentation demonstrating eligibility either through participation in one of the qualifying federal assistance programs or through income-based means. Lifeline recipients are required to recertify their eligibility every year. The Lifeline program is limited to one benefit per household, consisting of either wireline or wireless service. A household is defined, for purposes of the Lifeline program, as an individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Lifeline is a government benefit program, and consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain the benefit can be punished by fine or imprisonment or can be barred from the program.

Tribal Council Meeting Minutes

WINNEBAGO TRIBE OF NEBRASKA SPECIAL TRIBAL COUNCIL MEETING RE-ORGANIZATION October 14, 2016
