Indianz.com... Dakota Access cries of financial hit as young victim remains in hospital

The wealthy backers of the Dakota Access Pipeline are again complaining of financial hits to their costly project while a young woman remains hospitalized after an assault on the frontline in North Dakota.

Sophia Wilansky, 21, already underwent an hours-long surgery at the Hennepin County Medical Center in Minnesota and is facing many more procedures to save her shattered left arm and hand, her father said on Tuesday afternoon. He was joined in a vigil and press conference there by the noted Indian activist Clyde Bellecourt. "Even though she is lying there with her arm pretty much blown off, she's focused on the fact that it's not about her," Wayne Wilansky said during a livestream provided by Unicorn Riot, an independent media group. "It's about what we are doing to our country, what we are doing to our Native people, what we are doing to our environment."

"It's unbelievable that govern-

ments are violently attacking citizens who are there peacefully," he added. Sophia Wilansky was injured on Sunday evening during a lengthy assault committed under the orders of Morton County Sheriff Kyle Kirchmeier. Numerous witnesses said law enforcement used stinger grenades, water cannons, tear gas, rubber bullets and other less lethal weapons on a night when the average temperature dropped below the freezing point.

Kirchmeier has denied using stinger grenades, instead suggesting that the young woman was injured by explosives he claimed were going to be used against his forces. But Unicorn Riot, which has had correspondents at the #NoDAPL encampment for months, has uncovered evidence that law enforcement were indeed using those types of weapons.

Photos posted by Unicorn Riot on Twitter show numerous items that are only made available to law enforcement. A description of a stinger grenade being sold by one manufacturer reads: "This product may cause serious injury or death to you or others."

Chairman Harold Frazier of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe, who was present during the assault, also contradicted Kirchmeier's assertions. He said no one set any fires or explosions despite what the sheriff claimed on Facebook and what he told the media during a press conference on Monday.

"The only explosions I witnessed was the explosions from the indiscriminate

discharge of concussion, chemical and 'less-lethal' weapons on peaceful people," Frazier said in his first-hand account. "I did see brave people attempting to address the officers and asking them not to shoot at them any longer. Their answer was to get doused with water in below freezing temperatures and shot by officers wielding weapons."

"I was there that night and I encourage the Sheriff of Morton County to be present at these conflicts before he tells people what he heard from someone else. All of these allegations were said without offering any evidence in support," Frazier said.

The Standing Rock Medic and Healer Council, a group of health professionals that responded to the assault, disputed Kirchmeier as well. Grenade pieces were removed from Wilansky's arm during surgery and "will be saved for legal proceedings," according to a statement, which noted that her father is an attorney based in New York City.

Kirchmeier isn't the only who has accused pipeline resisters of engaging in violence. In court filings for Dakota Access have characterized the #NoDAPL movement as dangerous even though no workers have ever been harmed, in complete contrast to the countless injuries and arrests suffered by the residents of the encampment in North Dakota.







In My Opinion

Thoughts from a Concerned Parent... by Lance Morgan



I took the time to look up the Nebraska high school testing results for the Winnebago school district and I believe the results were slightly improved from the past, but overall the results were still pretty bad. A very small percentage of our grade school, middle school and high school students meet the basic requirements in math, writing, reading and science.

For example, 71 percent of the students in the Winnebago school district didn't meet the basic standards for Math. In Reading, 47 percent didn't meet the basic standards. For the Writing portion of the test, 51 percent didn't meet the basic standards. For the Science portion 80 percent didn't meet the basic standards. Across the state, Native Americans had the lowest scores in every category compared to other racial groups.

Our school has some great teachers and others that are probably a little jaded about the system and the lack of constructive parental involvement. I have heard lots of stories of kids who have behavior issues, but the school worries about how the parents will react and allows the situation to devolve.

We have some great parents in our community, but overall we need to do a much better job of parenting across the board. We have some kids living in some tough situations. Crowded housing. Alcoholism. Drug Abuse. Mental Abuse. Sexual Abuse. You name it and we have some of it in our small community. Any one of these issues is bad for parenting, but when you blend a few of them together then you have a toxic environment for parenting and it is often the children who suffer.

We need to raise our standards and expectations for ourselves. We should stop having so many kids so young. We should quit abandoning our children to their grandparents. We should demand our men take responsibility for their children. We should quit blaming our schools for our children's behavior.

We should look ourselves in the mirror and make the choice to be a better parent. Not just talk about it. Not build a better youth detention center. Not sweep things under the rug to protect the feelings of bad parents. We should get upset about all this and demand change.

People in Winnebago are good at being mad about stuff. People are mad at me all the time—all the time! People are mad about Ho-Chunk, Inc. People are mad about the roundabout. People are mad they didn't get enough per capita. People are mad about who got elected or who didn't get elected. People are mad at the school. People are always mad about something. Anger is one of the things we do best!

People should get mad about how we treat our children. People should be mad about how we let bad parenting set our kids up for a lifetime of struggle and repeating the cycle of poverty. People should be mad that our kids can't read or do basic math. People should take the time it takes to be a good parent. If we do not, then it is our own people who will suffer.

There was a woman who I greatly admired. I think she was worried about my parenting skills. When my girls were very young, she asked me who was the most powerful person in the world. I said Superman, but she said I was the most powerful person in the world. She explained that I was now a parent and I had so much power over how my children would turn out. I could teach and nurture them into fine young adults or I could hurt their future in a thousand different ways. I didn't know this at the time, but it would be the last time I ever spoke to her because she died suddenly a few days later. Because it was the last thing she ever said to me, I figured she must have been telling me for a reason and I have always tried to be the best parent possible.

It wasn't that hard to try and I made a lot of mistakes, but I got better. Just start with yourself and use your power to impact a child's life positively and everything will start to get better in our world. Small steps can be very rewarding and can lead to big results.

"The LORD is our Righteousness"

The past truly has an impact on the present. Maybe you have been asked to stop and think about your life and have taken the time to jot down things that happened when you were growing up.

Prayerfully you have countless happy memories of family gatherings: birthdays, holidays, weddings and baptisms. However, each one of us has other memories that we would like to forget or at least not to dwell upon. These difficult times of pain and suffering, loss, regret can haunt us and bring us down. Many of them are of our own doings or failure to do what is proper.

People of each tribe, nation and family has had those times where one needs to be rescued, delivered, saved, supported, held and heard out. The child of Israel had historical trauma in their lives. This brings us to our Scripture text taken some 500 years before the birth of Jesus.

"Behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In his days Judah will be saved, and Israel will dwell securely. And this is the name by which he will be called: 'The LORD is our righteousness.'"

"Therefore, behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when they shall no longer say, 'As the LORD lives who brought up the people of Israel out of the land of Egypt,' but 'As the LORD lives who brought up and led the offspring of the house of Israel out of the north country and out of all the countries where he had driven them.' Then they shall dwell in their own land." [Jeremiah 23:5-8 ESV]

The last paragraph reminded the tribe of Israel that their future was about to change. The LORD had them remember how He had delivered them from slavery. Their slavery was according to the

LORD's plans following Joseph having been sold by his brothers and their travel to Egypt during years of famine.

As Jeremiah wrote the tribe of Israel found themselves in Babylon due to their persistent unbelief and worship of false gods. Jeremiah wrote 'as the Lord lives' they would once again dwell back in their own land. This was a message of hope and deliverance. The LORD calls you to trust in Him as well, no matter what past trauma that you have had to endure. This includes what you suffered that was not your fault in the least, as well as your own missteps, rebellion and self-gratifications.

"Catholic Church Thanksgiving"

Here are some interesting facts regarding Thanksgiving and the Catholic Church: (1) The first American Thanksgiving was actually celebrated on September 8 (feast of the birth of the Blessed Virgin) in 1565 in St. Augustine, Florida. The Native Americans and Spanish settlers held a feast and the Holy Mass was offered. This was 56 years before the Puritan Pilgrims of Massachusetts. Don Pedro Menendez came ashore amid the sounding of trumpets, artillery salutes and the firing of cannons to claim the land for King Phillip II and Spain. The ship chaplain Fr. Francis Co Lopez de Menendez ceremonially kissed. Then the 500 soldiers, 200 sailors and 100 families and artisans, along with the Timucuan Indians celebrated the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass in gratitude to God. (2) The second American Thanksgiving happened on April 30, 1598, when Spanish explorer Don Juan de Onate requested the friars to say a Mass of Thanksgiving. After which he formally proclaimed "La Toma," claim

the land north of the Rio Grande for the King of Spain. The men feasted on duck, goose, and fish from the river. The actors among them dressed and presented a play. All this took place twenty-three years before the Pilgrims set sail from England on the Mayflower. (3) Squanto. The beloved hero of Thanksgiving at Plymouth Rock, was Catholic. Squanto had been enslaved by the English but he was freed by the Spanish Franciscans. Squanto thus received baptism and became a Catholic. So it was a baptized Catholic Native American who orchestrated what became known as Thanksgiving. (4) And let everyone remember that "Thanksgiving" in Greek is Eucharista. Thus, the Body and Blood of Christ is the true "Thanksgiving Meal." (These facts were taken from an article by Dr. Taylor Marshall).

Land Management



I attended a tribal council meeting few weeks ago about the capital that was supposed to be invested in this tribal corporation and numerous parties were present in the audience that questioned the true intent of this company and tried to shed a negative light. From my understanding the negativity stems from misinformation that this corporation is a subsidiary of Ho Chunk Inc. and that the tribe is giving its land to Ho Chunk Inc. Both of which are untrue.

The Winnebago Land Corporation's simple mission is to purchase our reservation back utilizing the capital that was already flowing through as a department. Land Lease revenue in 2015 was \$1.4 collected by the department and \$800,000+ collected by the BIA for a total of \$2.2 Million Dollars. The implementation plan was for the corporation to pay annual dividend of \$1.2 Million to the Tribe, retain the balance of roughly \$1 million to purchase land. It was a great plan but did not happen as the lease revenue

from the BIA was excluded. There is a Plan B that the Land Corporation is devising to get the necessary capital, but it will take a positive support from our community that Land Acquisition is paramount.

I was in Green Bay last week for the Land Buyback Outreach Trip while there we visited with the Oneida Nation Land Management Program. There was a message on the wall as I entered their facility. "The Division of Land Management would like to say thank you for your strong commitment and dedication to the Division of Land Management. Without your persistence in land acquisition the 7th Generation would not have a home to come to. You are a True Caretaker of the Land." There is no truer statement than that how can you come home if there is no land to settle on. Thank you and have a great holiday.

Re: Nebraska Response to Dakota Access Pipeline Protests in North Dakota - Deployment of Nebraska State Patrol

Dear Governor Ricketts:

The undersigned Tribal Chairmen of the Omaha, Ponca, Santee Sioux and Winnebago Tribes of Nebraska are writing to you to express our collective disappointment concerning your decision to send Nebraska State Troopers to North Dakota to ostensibly increase law enforcement and public safety. You were quoted in the October 28, 2016 edition of the *Lincoln Journal Star*, wherein you stated that you "were happy to do this" and "...certainly I support anybody who's exercising their first amendment rights to free speech, but you also have to do it in a way that is within the law."

It is our belief that your decision was based on a one-sided view of the protests, which resulted in a knee-jerk reaction to send our State Patrol to join with the hundreds of police with military equipment. This is the force that raided a resistance camp on Thursday, October 27th that was established by Native American water protectors in opposition to the construction of the Dakota Access Pipeline, some of whom are citizens of this State. More than 100 officers in riot gear with automatic rifles lined up across a highway, flanked by multiple MRAPs, an LRAD sound cannon, Humvees driven by National Guardsmen, an armored police truck and a bulldozer. Police deployed tear gas, mace, pepper spray and flash-bang grenades and beanbag rounds against the Native Americans and shot rubber bullets at their horses. Police have arrested media and shot down drones over the sovereign air space of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe in violation of federal law. This is and was a disproportionate, vicious response to our water protectors, the overwhelming majority of which are peacefully and prayerfully exercising their first amendment rights.

It is our understanding that Nebraska State Patrol officers have since been sent to North Dakota yet a second time. Meanwhile, there is an ongoing need for additional law enforcement in many areas of our home state, including White Clay, and this decision only serves to diminish resources that should be serving citizens of Nebraska. We call upon you to recall these officers and that you join with us in calling upon law enforcement to respect international human rights standards for the policing of protests. Under international law and standards, arrests should not be used to intimidate or prevent people from participating in peaceful assembly. If individuals are arrested, they should not be restrained for prolonged periods of time, and should be treated humanely. Invasive searches should only be carried out if absolutely necessary and not in a manner that could be considered cruel or humiliating treatment.

Finally, we call upon you to consult with us before taking similar actions in the future affecting Native Americans in order to take our perspective into account.

Tuesday, Dakota Access ignored the crackdown altogether and focused instead on monetary issues. According to the firm, unless the pipeline starts moving oil by January 1, 2017, the backers will lose \$2.7 million per day or \$83.3 million per month.

"A 99% complete pipeline produces just as much oil-transportation revenue as one that is 50% complete: none," the filing read.

Dakota Access has filed a cross-claim that asserts it has the right to drill under the Missouri River despite lacking an easement from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The clash on Sunday took place in an area where that work is supposed to occur, in a place frequently referred to as the "north" camp.

"Our deepest gratitude, thoughts and prayers are with water protector Sophia Wilansky and her family right now. She sustained severe injuries to her arm when a concussion grenade blew part of her arm away. Doctors are

working to save her arm." Chairman Dave Archambault II of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe said in a statement on Tuesday.

"There was no reason to launch an attack against water protectors at the camp in the middle of the night unless you wanted to try and prevent the media from seeing what you were doing. None," Archambault added. "Blasting these innocent people with concussion grenades, rubber bullets the size of baseballs and a water cannon in freezing weather was a deliberate act of terror sanctioned by the sheriff."
