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## Indians 4-Peat at Shoot Out on the Elkhorn



The Winnebago Indians have claimed the Championship for the 4th year in a row at the Shoot Out on the Elkhorn Holiday Basketball Tournament, held annually at the Wisner-Pilger Public Schools in Wisner, Nebraska. The Indians opened up the Tournament with a battle against Norfolk Lutheran Northeast, taking that game with a 68-45 win. The Pierce Blujays were next up in Tournament action and gave the Indians their toughest game yet this season. The Indians have been starting games stone cold and have been taking a good quarter to get warmed up, or mad, which ever happens first. Pierce kept with the Indians for a whole half of basketball until the Indians decided to step it up and finish off the Blujays, 51-39, winning by double digits. The Championship game against rival Indians, from Ponca, was also a close contest until after the half, when the Indians would come out shooting and building on a double digit lead, taking the game by 15, 78-63. Scoring for Winnebago were: David Wingett with 27, Drake Gorrin with 17, Aspen LaPointe with 17, D'Von LaPointe with 7 and Cedrick Blackdeer with 6. Congratulations Indians!

## Indians Record Now Sits at 14-0



After a convincing win over the Ponca Indians the Winnebago Indians were off to Fremont, Nebraska to take on Howells-Dodge in the Knight Holiday Classic. The Indians had already disposed of Hartington Cedar Catholic with a, 82-46 first round win. Host Fremont Bergen did not have the stuff to make it to the Championship game, which would have given the Indians a chance to avenge their only loss on last years record. The Indians had their slow start but ended the game on top, 82-46. Wingett lead all scorers with 32, followed by D'Von LaPointe with 19, Gorrin with 10 and Aspen LaPointe with 7. After the Holiday Tournament circuit was over the Indians traveled to take on the Norfolk Catholic Knights. The Knights were hoping to avenge their loss to Winnebago at last years District Finals, but regardless of the home court advantage, the Indians made quick work of the State Football Champs, whose play carried over onto the basketball court, by a score of 72-61. Wingett lead all scorers with 30, followed by D'Von LaPointe with 21, and Aspen LaPointe with 15. The Indians latest test came at Oakland, where the Indians took on the Oakland-Craig Knights. Unfortunate for the Knights the Indians passed their driving test early in the season, scoring 91 points to the Knights 48, securely the Indian's 14-0 record.

CRETE, Neb. – Deandra Young (SR/Mims, FL) had a huge presence in the paint Wednesday night and led the College of Saint Mary basketball team past Doane College 58-53. Young finished with 21 points and 18 rebounds in the Great Plains Athletic Conference contest. The Flames outscored Doane 38-18 in the paint and, for the first time this season, didn't score any 3-pointers. CSM shot 38 percent on the night, while the Tigers shot 30 percent. "We knew we had a big advantage in the paint and it was our plan to use it," CSM Coach Jesse Flanagan said. But the Flames weren't able to capitalize on it until the second half. Doane led the game all but 19 seconds of the opening half and still led 41-38 after three quarters of play. But CSM outscored the home team 20-12 in the final frame to earn the win. "Doane was double and triple-teaming Dee in the first half," Flanagan said. "At halftime the coaches realized

### Indianz.com... Meskwaki Tribe secures \$1.6M ANA grant to benefit produce farm

The grant comes from the Sustainable Employment and Economic Development Strategies (SEEDS) program at the Administration for Native Americans. The money will be used to plant more crops at the 40-acre Red Earth Gardens and provide more opportunities for tribal youth. "As it works to integrate traditional organic and sustainable foods back into the tribal community utilizing Meskwaki values, programming at the farm is designed to be an incubator for developing future farmers and rediscovering growing practices in tune with the environment," the tribe said in a press release. The tribe's award for the current fiscal year comes to \$331,359.

With the win, the Flames improved to 2-7 in the GPAC and 8-8 overall, while Doane fell to 2-7, 9-8. CSM returns to action Friday with a 2 p.m. game at Dakota Wesleyan University.

"I just like how we battled tonight," Flanagan said. "We were down by 10 points at the half and we battled back. I was proud of the team."

understandable if the media does not have a representative at every competition. Each one matters greatly to those participating, but it is hard enough for a local paper like Native Sun News to have a correspondent on hand to cover one of the competitions comprehensively, let alone get pictures and interview participants at all the others.

Each would be an interesting competition in its own right, but resources are limited even at the big dailies, and given the scarcity of East River schools in the tournament, not surprising the Argus Leader or the Aberdeen American aren't much of a presence. Although I was graciously informed by the editor of the Aberdeen paper some years back, that Lakota issues are not local news, meaning if I were to write a column for them it would have to be on non-Indian topics. An inadvertent admission, an

East River town surrounded by Indians on all sides, has very little interest in anything Indian.

## Controlling Head Lice with Integrated Pest Management

### What Is IPM?

Integrated pest management uses information about the pest in order to choose methods of control that are safe and effective. IPM methods include pest prevention, exclusion, and using nonchemical tools first. If chemical pesticides are needed, products that pose the least risk to human health are chosen. With IPM, you start by asking, "Why is this pest here?" and then try to eliminate the conditions allowing the pest to enter and live. This approach solves pest problems rather than just treating the symptoms. It also reduces the need to use pesticides repeatedly. IPM can be used to combat bed bugs, cockroaches, mice and other nuisance pests that can make our lives difficult.

### STEP 1: Pest Identification

Head lice are tiny insects that spend their entire lives on the human head. Thank goodness their not disease vectors, but they do cause itching and irritation. Most of us have dealt with head lice, especially if our children are in school. There are lots of great photos on the Internet if you're unsure of what they look like.

### STEP 2: Pest Prevention

Head lice are not caused by poor hygiene. The don't jump or fly from one person to the next. They walk. Transfer is usually from head to head contact. Be careful about sharing hats, brushes or combs.

### STEP 3: Controlling Head Lice Safely

Head lice can be physically removed by combing and/or killed by heat. Everyone knows how expensive lice shampoos can be, especially if you're repeating the treatment every week, or you have multiple family members struggling with the problem. Here, s one of the best IPM tricks I know of.

1. Find a well-lit area to do the treatment.
2. Brush hair well, and saturate with hair conditioner. The conditioner doesn't kill them, but it keeps them stationary. Divide hair into sections, the smaller the better. Using a lice comb, or a flea comb for pets works really well, comb each section out, starting close to the scalp.
3. When all the sections have been combed out, rinse the hair well. Towel dry, and apply an application of white vinegar and water-equal parts. Cover

with a plastic cap and let this stay in the hair for 30 minutes. The vinegar dissolves the glue that holds the nits to the hair shaft, making combing the nits out much easier. Redivide the hair, and finish combing out the nits. Combing thru your kids hair once a week with conditioner can make sure you are lice free. It's a good habit, like brushing your teeth. This method is cheap, doesn't involve costly treatments with harsh pesticides and can be applied to young and old also. We would like the community to know that we are offering 80% tuition reduction in our chemistry courses and in our intermediate or college algebra courses while the project is under development during the next two years. We are developing our chemistry courses in collaboration with Nebraska Indian Community College and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The project is funded by the National Science Foundation. We plan to use this new method of chemistry instruction in our other science and math courses.
