Winnebago Tribe names executives for takeover of troubled Indian Health Service hospital



Indian hospital in Nebraska heads into new era

Winnebago Tribe taps leadership for new health care system

As a July 1 deadline looms, the Winnebago Tribe has named two executives who will manage the troubled hospital on the reservation after taking it over from the Indian Health Service.

The tribe has named its longtime legal counsel, Danelle Smith, to serve as executive director of the newly established Winnebago Comprehensive Healthcare System (WCHS), which will be the name of the tribe's new hospital. The tribe also has named Gary Wabaunsee, a citizen of the Seneca-Cayuga Tribe of Oklahoma, as hospital administrator.

Winnebago Tribal Councilmember Victoria Kitcheyan said the hiring of Smith and Wabaunsee demonstrates the tribe's commitment to improving patient care at the hospital.

"Ms. Smith and Mr. Wabaunsee bring a wealth of knowledge and experience that will serve the Winnebago tribal hospital well," she said.

Smith, a citizen of the Winnebago Tribe, has served for 14 years as the tribe's general legal counsel and spent the past 2 ½ years on the tribe's self-governance steering committee, which has carried out planning and implementation of the tribe's assumption of the Indian Health Service hospital on its reservation.

Smith served as a former partner with Fredericks Peebles & Morgan LLP, a law firm that represents tribes and Native organizations. She worked on the administrative team for nine years for the Winnebago Tribe's college, first at the Nebraska Indian Community College and later at Little Priest Tribal College.

She has also served on the governing boards for a variety of organizations, including the Ho-Chunk Community Development Corporation, Nebraska Justice Center and Legal Aid of Nebraska.

She earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Wayne State College and a law degree from the University of Iowa.

Wabaunsee has almost 40 years of experience in health care management, having retired from the U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps at the rank of captain in 1995. He also served as health director for federal

Tribal Health Programs operated under the Indian Self Determination and Education Assistance Act and as CEO at several IHS locations.

He earned a bachelor's degree from Northeastern Oklahoma State University and a Master of Public Health in health administration and planning from the University of Oklahoma.

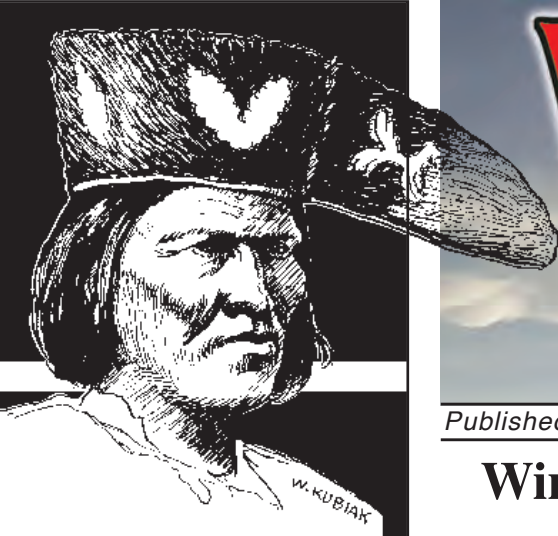
He said his goal is to "provide quality health care service in a compassionate, caring and culturally relevant environment with the focus first and foremost on patient satisfaction."

The IHS hospital in Winnebago has struggled following the July 2015 decision by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to terminate the facility's certification due to serious lapses in patient care. The hospital, already suffering from inadequate funding, can no longer bill Medicare and Medicaid for services.

Almost three years later, the IHS remains unable to say when the hospital might regain certification, despite repeated questions about the substandard level of care.

"This is the worst kind of chicken and egg problem," Rep. Jack Bergman (R-Minnesota) said at a March 20 hearing on Capitol Hill that focused on the IHS, arguing that the agency faces an uphill battle in correcting problems at Winnebago and other facilities in the

SCI staff include: Katy, Brittany, Henrietta, Elaine, Brenda, DeeAnn, Stephanie & Lola.



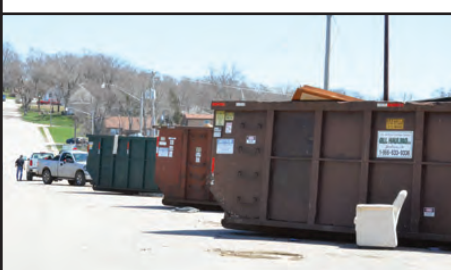

Indianz.com... Winnebago Tribe fights back in court after 'attack on sovereignty' 'A critical source of revenue' Raid of tribal tobacco operations at issue in new lawsuit

WINNEBAGO, Nebraska - With his dying words, Chief Little Priest implored his people to seek a better future for their children.

"Be strong and educate my children," he said.

His words inspired the Winnebago Tribe to establish Little Priest Tribal College on the tribe's northeast Nebraska reservation in 1996.

Maunka Morgan, the college's president, still quotes the phrase as he attempts to describe the college's mission.

"It's part of this long vision that our ancestors had for us to be self-sufficient and independent and not beholden to others," he said. Like so many institutions on Winnebago Reservation, the college works to make the tribe more independent by educating future leaders and workers. In order to do so, however, the college leans on revenue generated by tribal tobacco taxes.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017, the tribe provided \$151,029 in tobacco tax revenue to the college. And while that amounted to only about 2.1 percent of the college's general fund, it is a flexible revenue source that allows the college to fund its priority programs, Morgan said.

He said both the federal government and state of Nebraska fail to equitably fund the college compared to non-reservation-based colleges, and the college has been historically underfunded as a result.

"Utilizing these resources in our own

tribal economies, it's vital," he said. "It's vital to the survival of the tribal college and fulfilling its mission."

But the tribe's tobacco taxes have come under attack in recent years, culminating in a January 30 raid by federal agents on the offices of Ho-Chunk Inc. (HCI), the tribe's economic development corporation. Morgan said the college expects to see a nearly \$40,000 loss in tobacco tax revenue as a result of the raid.

"It's a conservative number," he said. "We don't really know."

But the Winnebago Tribe is fighting back.

On Friday, two HCI-owned subsidiaries, HCI Distribution and Rock River Manufacturing, filed a lawsuit against the state of Nebraska seeking to prevent the state from forcing the tribe to abide by a legal agreement between the state and a variety of tobacco manufacturers.

The lawsuit stems from the raid, during which nearly 50 armed agents of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Explosives confiscated dozens of boxes of documents, office equipment and cigarettes.

HCI Distribution purchases tobacco products from tribal-based manufacturers and resells those products exclusively to reservation-based wholesalers and retailers. Rock River is a federally licensed cigarette manufacturer whose products are distributed by HCI Distribution and other national distributors to retailers throughout the country.

The lawsuit, filed Friday in U.S. District Court in Omaha, alleges the raid constituted an attack on the tribe's status as a sovereign nation. It names

Nebraska Attorney General Doug Peterson and Tony Fulton, state tax commissioner, as defendants.

In a January 31 statement, Winnebago Tribal Chairman Frank White said the tribe believes the state of Nebraska convinced the ATF to investigate Ho-Chunk Inc. in order to "gain advantage in an ongoing tax dispute." The lawsuit alleges the state of Nebraska has sought to force the Winnebago Tribe to participate in a 1998 settlement between the four largest tobacco manufacturing companies and 46 states, which had sued those tobacco companies in order to recover health-care costs related to smoking. The resulting legal agreement, known as the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement (MSA), required the tobacco giants to make payments to the states each year.

Other tobacco manufacturers later became participants to the agreement. The tobacco giants became concerned that the payments they were being forced to make to states would require them to increase the price of their products, and that price increase would cause them to lose market share as their product prices soared higher than those of tobacco products being manufactured by companies that weren't required to make payments to states.

As a result, the tobacco giants renegotiated the MSA in order to require states to force all tobacco manufacturers that operate within their borders to either participate in the agreement or begin paying fees in order to sell cigarettes in the state. States that failed to do so would face the threat of losing

Click It or Ticket Campaign Starts May 21

Winnebago Tribal law enforcement and BIA will show zero tolerance

Winnebago, NE— as the unofficial start of summer, the Memorial Day holiday weekend is a busy time for Americans. Each year, the highways fill with families in vehicles, on their way to start their summer vacations. To help keep drivers and passengers stay safe, Winnebago Tribal Officers and BIA Officers are reminding motorists to Click It or Ticket. Aimed at enforcing seat belt use to help keep families safe, the national seat belt campaign will take place May 21 through June 3, concurrent with the busy travel season.

"Buckling up is such a simple task that can keep you and your family safe in the car," said Chief of Police Jason Lawrence. "But it's more than that. Buckling up is the law. Our law enforcement personnel see the consequences of not buckling up. We see the loss of life and pain in our community. Often, it could have been prevented with the simple click of a seat belt. This should be automatic for all passengers in a vehicle regardless of age."

"As the Memorial Day weekend approaches and the summer vacation season ramps up, we want to keep our community members safe, and make sure people are doing the one thing that can save them in a crash: buckling up," said BIA Officer Gordon Rave. "If the

enforcement crackdown wakes people up to the dangers of unrestrained driving, we'll consider it a success."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, nearly half (48%) of the passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes in 2016 were unrestrained. At night from 6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m., that number soared to 56 percent of those killed. That's why one focus of the Click It or Ticket campaign is nighttime enforcement. Participating law enforcement agencies will be taking a no-excuses approach to seat belt law enforcement, writing citations day and night. On the Winnebago Reservation, the maximum penalty for a seat belt violation is \$25 plus a \$50 court cost for a total of \$75. "I could think of better things to spend \$75 on instead of having to pay a traffic ticket," said BIA Officer Tony Walker

"If you know a friend or a family member who does not buckle up when they drive, please ask them to consider changing their habits," said K9 Officer Matt Benson. "Help us spread this life-saving message before one more friend or family member is killed. Seat belts save lives, and everyone—front seat and back, child and adult—needs to remember to buckle up—every trip, every time."

'Every good gift comes from above'

Don't be deceived, my dear brothers. Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows. [James 1:16-17 NIV84]

James, the half-brother of Jesus, same mother - different father, wrote these words about A.D. 48. Some have referred to the book of James as the book of 'Proverbs of the New Testament.' He wrote to the descendants of Abraham, the patriarchal father of Israel as well as of all true believers. It was through Abraham that all people would be blessed from above. It was through the offspring of Abraham that the Messiah, the Christ, would be born.

James warns his dear brothers, meaning his dear blood brothers and sisters who were related to him through their faith in Jesus who shed his blood to pay for their sins. James warns them not to be led astray, but rather to trust in the Word of God and the good gifts that come down from above.

One such gift is wisdom. In chapter three James writes: 'Who is wise and understanding among you? Let him show it by his good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom. But if you harbor bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast about it or deny the truth. Such "wisdom" does not come down from

heaven but is earthly, unspiritual, of the devil. For where you have envy and selfish ambition, there you find disorder and every evil practice' [James 3:13-16 NIV84].

Take a moment to reflect on which 'wisdom' you are experiencing? Is it the 'wisdom' of the world, the self-centered survival of the fittest type of 'wisdom?' Or is it wisdom that comes down from above - Godly wisdom?

Kelly Pond Update

Spring is here once again, temperatures are warming up and folks are getting back to their summertime activities. This being the case, it is a good time to remind everyone that there is still a 'Fish Consumption Rate' posted at Kelly Pond. Please look at the table below to find out what fish are safer than others to eat.

Note: Consumption limits for Non-Cancer Health Endpoints are based on an adult weight of 150 pounds eating a one-half pound or an 8 ounce (precooked weight) meal. To adjust the meal size for a lighter or heavier weight just subtract or add an ounce of fish for every 20 pounds of body weight.

Example: 170 lb. Adult = 9 oz.
80 lb Child = 4 oz.

Even though, the guidelines recommend 1 meal per month, you can divide by four to get rates in meals per week or eat smaller sized meals over the month. Also, be sure to space out meals throughout the month. For example, don't eat all your fish meals for the entire month within a few days.

Please, don't throw fish caught in other areas into Kelly Pond. Please, don't use fish caught in Kelly Pond for fish fries or selling to the community.

Also, please remind children that Kelly Pond is not a safe place to swim. Many areas along the shore have water plants growing that can tangle and trap a child and there are several places where the water gets deeper quickly.

Animation and well-placed statistics punctuate the thoughtful film's message that, now armed with this information, we can act quickly to mitigate the effects of a public health crisis. 60 MINS.

their sizeable settlement payments. For Nebraska alone, that payment was \$37.7 million in 2017.

Fees paid by tobacco manufacturers who weren't participants in the MSA were meant to ensure price parity with manufacturers who were participating in the agreement.

To meet the requirements of the renegotiated MSA, states - including Nebraska - drafted legislation imposing fees on tobacco manufacturers who aren't participants of the MSA.

"From the perspective of Big Tobacco, the MSA is essentially a federated agreement ensuring that Big Tobacco enjoys a level playing field across the MSA-settling states despite their previous bad actions," the lawsuit states.

However, neither states' attorney generals nor the big tobacco companies invited tribes to participate in the MSA, and they also failed to seek the involvement of Congress, which exercises "exclusive and plenary control over sovereign tribes within its borders independent of state jurisdiction," according to the lawsuit.

Despite these failures, states have attempted to force tribes to abide by the requirements set forth in the MSA and the state legislation they've enacted to enforce that agreement.

"As a result, Big Tobacco has exerted pressure on states to continue to pursue unlawful regulation of tribal tobacco trade in Indian Country," the lawsuit states. "Indeed, Big Tobacco has improperly withheld payments from many states alleging failure to 'diligently enforce' their MSA Laws with respect to the Indian Country activities of tribes."

No federal statute currently gives states the power to regulate tobacco in Indian Country, the lawsuit states.

Indeed, federal statutes that address tribal tobacco routinely reassert tribal independence from state tobacco regulatory authority, including the Prevent All Cigarette Trafficking Act of 2009, according to the lawsuit. The Winnebago Tribe has exercised its "retained sovereignty to regulate tobacco" on its reservation, creating its own Universal Tobacco Settlement Agreement that imposes fees on participating tobacco manufacturers and distributors. In 2017 alone, that agreement generated \$31,681 in fees and \$122,658 in cigarette taxes for the tribe.

In March 2014, Nebraska issued tax assessment against several reservation-based cigarette retailers, prompting HCI Distribution and Red Rock Manufacturing to begin negotiating a possible tobacco compact.

But those negotiations ended in June 2016 when the two sides failed to agree on a compact that would protect the Winnebago Tribe's right to regulate tobacco sales on its own reservation, the lawsuit states.

HCI Distribution and Red Rock Manufacturing have operated under a cloud of uncertainty since March 2014, the lawsuit alleges.

"This uncertainty and threat of penalty and retaliation has created a serious impediment to their business operations and, thus, the ability to expand economically," the lawsuit states.

The two companies are asking the U.S. District Court to prevent the state of Nebraska from attempting to force the Winnebago Tribe from abiding by terms of the MSA. White, the tribe's chairman, said the state's efforts to impose the MSA on the tribe is an attack on the tribe's sovereignty.

"This attack has damaged our tribal economy and in turn threatens our sovereignty, self-determination and self-governance," he said in a statement.

Ho-Chunk Inc. was launched in 1994 to spur economic development activity on the tribe's reservation, and Indianz.com is one of its subsidiaries. HCI said in a statement Monday that tobacco sales and regulation have helped generate significant revenue for the tribe, which has struggled for decades to establish a healthy economy.

The tribe's tobacco sales and tax revenue have provided funding to community development efforts, scholarships, internships and educational endowments. Tribal institutions such as Little Priest Tribal College, the Community Development Fund, Tribal Health Department and Language Revitalization Department, as well as the tribe's roads, have benefited from those revenues.

Maunka Morgan, Little Priest Tribal College president and a tax commissioner for the tribe, said tax revenue

has helped the tribe build all of its institutions.

"We have been pretty good at implementing specific types of tribal taxes, such as the tobacco taxes, and then putting them toward our strategic initiatives to help fund our institutions," he said. "It's a tool in the nation-building tool box." Tobacco taxes even helped 40 families purchase new homes through a down payment assistance program in recent years, according to HCI.

Ann Marie Bledsoe Downes, vice president for community impact and engagement for HCI and a board member for the award-winning Winnebago Community Development Fund, said the fund has provided matching funds for projects ranging from infrastructure for the Ho-Chunk Village commercial and housing development to language preservation projects, renewable energy expansion and community gardening efforts.

"It has been a critical source of revenue to make sure we can bring outside dollars to our reservation and maximize the dollars we do have to improve the lives of our tribal members," she said.

"It is concerning to think that all our progress could be slowed because tobacco sales on our own reservation would be further restricted for reasons we still don't fully understand." In addition to the new lawsuit, HCI is suing the federal government in connection with its tobacco business. As part of the dispute, the corporation agreed to hand over records related to its sales to non-Indian individuals or entities.

But the government contends the Contraband Cigarette Trafficking Act requires tribes to hand over all of their tobacco sales records. In May 2016, a federal judge agreed and ruled that HCI must comply with the law.

HCI has mounted an appeal of the decision. Oral arguments took place on March 15 before the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals, with judges agreeing that the case represented a novel legal issue.

"Not once, until now, have they sought records from my clients, instrumentalities of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska," attorney Ben Fenner, who is representing HCI and its tobacco companies, told the court last month. "Not once, to our knowledge, have they sought records from any tribal instrumentality."

A decision is pending from the D.C. Circuit.

Great Plains.
The Winnebago Tribal Council voted last November to pursue self-governance after failing to see improvements at the hospital. The tribe plans to take over the hospital by July 1.

The move to self-governance – as set forth by Title V of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act of 1975 – allows tribes to assume control over health care funding and programs that the IHS would otherwise provide. A tribe must enter into a compact, as well as a funding agreement, with the federal government that sets forth the terms of their nation-to-nation relationship.

The effort, though, is seeing some resistance. The Winnebago Tribe shares the hospital with the neighboring Omaha Tribe, whose leaders have raised questions about the initiative.

"I feel that IHS has failed us, has killed our people, has not fulfilled their obligations to the people," Omaha Chair-

man Michael Wolfe told Indianz.Com in January. "Now they're bailing out, and they're just happy and tickled pink that Winnebago wants to take this hospital over. They broke it. Why should the Winnebago want to come and fix it?"

The Winnebago and Omaha tribes would need to agree to move forward with self-governance if they wanted to offer all of the same programs with the same level of funding. But the self-governance process could still move forward with just one tribe on board.

Wolfe has said the Omaha Tribe is still considering whether to join the Winnebago Tribe in its effort to take control of the hospital.

On Tuesday, Wolfe declined to comment, saying he wanted to wait until the Omaha Tribal Council voted on the self-governance initiative.

"I'm not going to have any discussion about this until council is solidified in every option that we want to address," he said.

David Wingett could be right fit for final Memphis basketball roster spots

If David Wingett ultimately fills the final scholarship available on next season's Memphis men's basketball roster, the story of how it happened will begin at Friday Night Lights, the Tigers' spring football game.

Bull City Prep coach Daryl Harris was there at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium on April 13, behind the east end zone on an official visit with former player Isaiah Maurice. The 6-foot-10 forward had toured campus and eventually committed and signed with Memphis before leaving town the next day.

But as the Tigers' new coaching staff wooed Maurice, their other recruiting needs came up in conversation. Assistant coach Mike Miller told Harris that Memphis wanted another player to stretch the floor from 3-point range next season, and so Harris pulled out his cell phone.

"Hold up. You got to see David Wingett," he said. "I showed him the film then and he said, 'You need to send that to [Hardaway].'"

Why Memphis likes Wingett

A little more than two weeks later, Memphis officially offered Wingett (pronounced Win-jit) a scholarship on Sunday.

Harris said Hardaway watched Wingett play three games this past weekend with Team Loaded (NC) at an Adidas Gauntlet event in the Atlanta area as part of college basketball's final spring evaluation period. Memphis has one scholarship remaining for next season after losing three players to transfer following former coach Tubby Smith's firing and adding five players in Hardaway's first recruiting class.

Hardaway said last month that he

would like to bring in another shooter to fill the last open scholarship on the roster. But the Tigers aren't the only ones interested in adding a player of Wingett's caliber late in the recruiting process. Auburn, Missouri and Wichita State all recently joined more than 20 mid-major schools that have offered Wingett.

The 6-foot-7 wing averaged 14.8 points and 7.2 rebounds and had two double-doubles over five games this past weekend. He also shot 61.5 percent from the field and hit 8 of his 15 3-pointers.

Harris said Wingett is expected to make a college decision soon and Memphis will be one of the favorites to land him. "He plays the game the right way," Harris added. "Obviously he can shoot, but he's efficient. He doesn't have to get up a ton of shots. He plays with that passion and that's what Penny was telling him in their conversation. 'You play with passion and I just love the way you play so hard.' That's what he liked about him."

Wingett's Native American background would make him a unique addition at Memphis. He's from Winnebago, Neb., and a member of the Winnebago Tribe.

Wingett became a local sensation while starring at Winnebago High School, finishing as the second-leading scorer in Nebraska high school history after registering more than 2,200 career points. But exposure to college coaches proved more difficult, even when Wingett played for Chauncey Billups' grassroots basketball team last year.

For recruiting purposes, Wingett elected to reclassify to 2018 after his senior season at Winnebago and played at Bull City Prep in Durham, N.C. this past school year. The lefty went on to average 24.5 points, eight rebounds and three assists per game while shooting 47 percent from beyond the arc, according to Harris.

Harris noted that Wingett is more athletic than he appears at first glance, with the ability to run the floor, finish at the rim and score off the catch-and-shoot. He's also developed a Dirk Nowitzki-like stepback jumper in recent years.

"He's a matchup nightmare," Harris said. "He's tough enough to guard someone in the post up to a four, but a four can not guard him, most threes can not guard him and he's too tall for a two."

Harris said Wingett plans to narrow down his list of schools in the next few days.

There's close to 30 scholarship offers to sift through all of a sudden. A lot changed in just a couple weeks.

"Memphis is obviously one of the schools that's at the top of the list for him," Harris said. "It's a great chance that he'll be visiting soon."

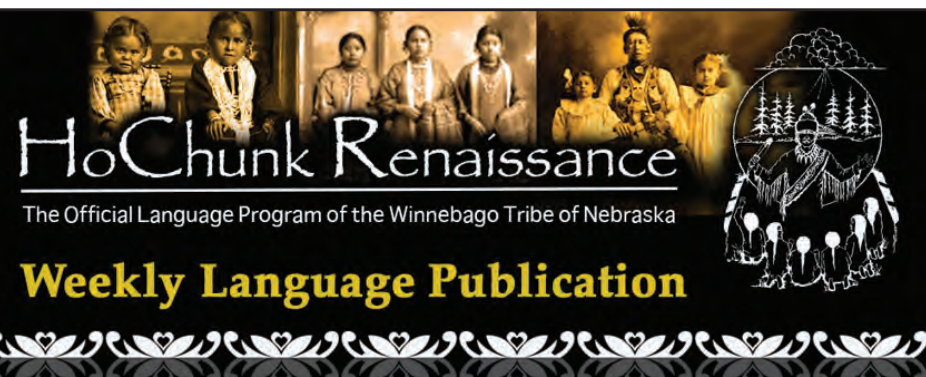

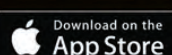
