

Winnebagoes Celebrate 151 Years of Military Service



The Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska will celebrate 151 years of service to the United States Military this week. The 2017 Winnebago Powwow, the oldest of its kind in North America kicks off on Thursday. The Celebration is held annually in remembrance of Winnebago War Chief Little Priest and his warriors, Company "A" Fort Omaha Scouts 34th Nebraska Volunteers who served as Scouts for the U.S. Cavalry. In 1865 War Chief Little Priest was wounded in battle and died from his wounds. Upon the 1st anniversary of his death he was celebrated. His brother Chief Greywolf after that first celebration declared that Little Priest and his warriors would be remembered every year thereafter for their service to the people of the Winnebago Nation. Today, 151 years later the Winnebago honor their Warriors, past and present. The 4 day Celebration consists of a Powwow, Ceremonies, Games, Sports Tournaments, a Wilderness Run and Food...lots of food. The Celebration ends on Sunday evening with special dances and an awards ceremony. Everyone is welcome to this event held in honor of our Warriors, so come on out and enjoy a good time with the Winnebago People.

NATIVE AMERICAN COMMUNITY LEADERS MEET WITH OMAHA MAYOR, CITY COUNCIL PRESIDENT, AND POLICE CHIEF

OMAHA, NE - Last week representatives from the Nebraska Commission on Indian Affairs and members of the Native American community met with City of Omaha Mayor Jean Stothert, City Council President Ben Gray, and Omaha Police Chief Todd Schmaderer to discuss issues regarding police contacts with the Native American community in Omaha, including the recent death of Rosebud Sioux Tribe member Zachary Bearheels.

Zachary Bearheels, 29, died on June 5th while he was in the custody of the Omaha Police Department. His death has deeply troubled the Native American community of Omaha and Nebraska. As such, Commissioners Dr. Rudi Mitchell and Lucas LaRose,

and longtime Winnebago activist, Frank Lamere, asked city officials for an in-person meeting in order to discuss the death of Mr. Bearheels, and the Police Department's treatment of Native Americans.

"The meeting was very productive as the Mayor, City Council President Gray, and Chief Schmaderer were very receptive of our thoughts, and are committed to ensuring that Native Americans have positive interactions with the Police Department in the future," said Commissioner LaRose.

"As a former tribal chairman of the Omaha Indian Nation and direct descendant of the last hereditary Chief of the Omaha Indian Nation (Chief Big Elk), this was a tragedy that should have never occurred. The Omaha Indian Nation in the 1854 Treaty gave up millions of acres in Eastern Ne-

braska so that immigrants could live here in the state of Nebraska and this is how Native Americans are treated today. I do hope that better relations and respect for the Native people can occur here in the city of Omaha," said Commissioner Mitchell

All of the City officials present were committed to ensuring that Omaha is a welcoming city to all Native Americans. Mayor Stothert committed to establishing an advisory board, which would provide advice on Native Americans affairs to the Mayor and her staff. Chief Schmaderer committed to providing his Police Department with training on Native American culture and respect in addition to better training his officers on the use-of-force situations with both ethnic minorities and mentally ill individuals.

It is also noted that your child's clothing allowance must be claimed by October 31, 2017.

Indianz.com... Ho-Chunk Nation sees more support for off-reservation casino in Wisconsin

The Ho-Chunk Nation enjoys strong support for an off-reservation casino in Wisconsin that's been in the works for years.

Members of Congress, state lawmakers and local officials say the casino in Beloit will boost the economy. But the Bureau of Indian Affairs hasn't done much to advance the environmental impact statement for the project beyond a scoping report released in January 2013.

Then there's Gov. Scott Walker (R), whose approval will be required if the BIA takes action while he's in office. He rejected a similar off-reservation ca-

sino for another tribe and hasn't offered a position on the Ho-Chunk project. The Beloit Daily News reported.

The tribe is pursuing the casino under the two-part determination provisions of the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. The law requires approval by the state governor in addition to the BIA.

Even if the state and the BIA agree, there's still one more step in the process -- the casino site must be placed in trust. Secretary Ryan Zinke, the leader of the Department of the Interior, has ordered such decisions to be made by political officials in Washington, D.C.

Jim Cason, the Associate Deputy Secretary at the department, has repeatedly told tribes and Congress that

off-reservation acquisitions will be subjected to additional scrutiny. The Trump administration is in fact considering a new rule to erect more hurdles in the process.

The site in Beloit is more than 170 miles from Ho-Chunk headquarters in Black River Falls but the tribe also maintains a governmental office about 49 miles away in Madison. It's located off I-39, a major highway.

LETTER TO THE SHAREHOLDER & TRIBAL MEMBERS...

2016 was a solid year for Ho-Chunk, Inc. Our revenue and profits were both down from our record 2015 year, but by comparison it was still the third best year in our 22 year history. In short, a lot of things went right and a few things didn't go as planned.

Our government contracting companies continue to do well. The

All Native Group continues to be a star performer, but lost a major international contract in the middle of the year, which came as a bit of a surprise and hurt our second half of the year financial performance. We also had a few big opportunities delayed, but the All Native Group is a machine in their field and their success speaks for itself.

The Flatwater Group spent a year going after a major contract opportunity. They were a finalist for the contract, but finished second. At Ho-Chunk, Inc. we have a phrase when it comes to government contracting: "Second might as well be last." However, a few weeks later they submitted for an even larger contract and were awarded it several months later. Flatwater's continued transition to more service oriented contracts paints a bright picture for the group's future.

Two years ago, we made the strategic decision to invest large amounts of our capital in local and regional real estate development and Ho-Chunk Capital was born. We have spent the last two years creating an organization, learning the ropes and developing projects. We have learned some valuable lessons and have started some very interesting projects that are just starting to create significant revenue. We love this business because it creates local jobs, long-term income and provides projects for our construction company, our two housing companies (Dynamic Homes and BluStone Homes), our real estate broker (Keller Williams), and our two banks (Liberty National and the Native American Bank). We will continue using our capital to build our real estate company for the next several years and expect that company to become a major player for years to come in our region.

HCI Construction had a great year, helped in part by our real estate investment activities, but they have also developed a more diversified client base.

Dynamic Homes had a decent year, but it was also helped by Ho-Chunk Capital building an apartment building from 96 modules built in Dynamic Homes factory. Each of these companies provide a high-quality service and have established track records of 20 and 45 years respectively.

Our tobacco factory, tobacco distribution, tobacco importation, and retail store operations all operate under the Ho-Chunk Trading Group. The stores are doing very well, helped by our tribally-manufactured tobacco.

The rest of the business is struggling with various legal and regulatory issues being pushed by our competitors and their deep financial ties to the state governments. A variation of this problem

has been going on for 20 years and I am constantly amazed at how large corporations can have such a sinister influence on our state, and in some cases federal government. This business is important, but is constantly at risk of some attempt to hurt it and it is tough to bank our future on it. This is why we have used the profits from this area to expand our government contracting, construction and real estate activities.

We have always done various smaller things that impact our community. We sell used cars, which has helped people fix their credit. We built storage units, which we had to expand because they are always full. We build homes at cost. We rent housing at several hundred dollars below market in the Winnebago area. We have taken a small ownership interest in a local bank, which gives people access to credit. We also own 32 percent of the national Native American Bank, headquartered in Denver.

The investment is doing very well and we consider it a long-term seed that will bear some significant fruit in the future.

We now donate \$150,000 per year to the Ho-Chunk Community

Development Corporation, a non-profit we started 15 years ago to help find supplemental capital to build up our community. We have contributed approximately \$1.8 million to the entity and they in turn have helped raise almost \$50 million for our community. We are very proud of the investment and what it has produced.

2016 was the first full year of the 100-house plan. The Winnebago Tribe was generous and foresighted enough to allow Ho-Chunk, Inc. to retain one-third of its dividend each year with the goal of building 100 housing units and the infrastructure for 100 more homes within 5 years. We will end 2017 with approximately 50 housing units built and have been taking actions to ensure that we will have the infrastructure in place for at least 100 more.

Our local tribal member employment numbers had stalled out over the last few years. At our strategic retreat in 2016, we set a goal of hiring 20 more tribal members in our community. To date, we have hired 17 more and continue to try and find ways to create opportunity for our members to join our company.

Ho-Chunk, Inc. is complicated. We do things other corporations would never consider. We always know who owns us and why we do what we do.

Our goal has always been the same—make our tribe economically self-sufficient and provide job opportunities to our members. Along the way we added a more socially-oriented approach, which resulted in us building the Ho-Chunk Village, our 40 acre mixed use community, which will double in size in the next year.

When you run any company, you have to think big and you have to think very small sometimes, too. We are pretty good at understanding our big issues and implementing large plans targeted at the problems, but we are also getting much better at the details of how to grow our company and our community in a way that balances our version of capitalism with our inherent desire to share our success across a broad spectrum of our membership.

My goal is not to be the best capitalist corporation ever. My goal is to be a world class Tribal Company and successfully manage all of the complications that such a goal includes.

I always end these letters the same way. I love my job and consider it an honor to be able to pursue my dream on behalf of the Winnebago People.

"I am Yahweh your God"

There is truly one and only one God who created you and me and all that we see. From time-to-time He has spoken. One such time was on the mountain of God, Mount Horeb meaning 'Mountain of dryness,' located in the arid desert land of present day Saudi Arabia. (It is also referred to as Mount Sinai).

From man's perspective, what Creator God had to say was to set up a list of ten commands that were beyond what any man, woman or child could fulfill. In other words, it was a call to a mission that was impossible to accomplish and would inevitably lead to failure, no matter how hard one tries.

Here is a summary of what Creator God said:

"And God spoke all these words:

I am Yahweh your God,

who brought you out of ... slavery.

You shall have no other gods before me. . . .

You shall not misuse the name Yahweh

your God. . . .

Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. . . .

Honor your father and your mother. . . .

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not give false testimony

against your neighbor.

You shall not covet. . . ."

These commands had already been written on each and every heart. Now they had been spoken out loud by Creator God. Not only that, they were also chiseled in stone and for a time they were carried around by the tribe of Israel in the Ark of the Covenant. The Ark of the Covenant symbolized the presence of God, who was with His chosen tribal people, as long as they trusted in Him.

No one can claim ignorance of these commands, although some today will go to great lengths to have them removed from public places. No one is able to justify oneself based on them. No one can claim perfection or being sacred on one's own merits.

Some may be led to believe that one can claim an outward appearance of living up to these standards. However, Creator God can see right through an individual and the sins within one's heart. One major command that trips us up is coveting. Coveting is an obsessive desire to want something that one does not have. Such a person is often

called 'greedy.' Instead of praying for one's daily bread, one longs to make it rich or to envy what others have. They reason: 'if only I had . . .'

Another obvious pitfall is that of murder. Oh, you might be thinking that I have not murdered anyone. But have you ever 'hated' anyone? Have you ever uttered the words, "I hate you or I hate so and so?" Hear these condemning words from Creator God's Word: "Anyone who hates his brother is a murderer, and you know that no murderer has eternal life in him" [1st John 3:15]. Unless that murderer confesses his/her sin and seeks Creator God's mercy found in Jesus Christ).

John writes on, "We love because He first loved us. If anyone says, "I love God," yet hates his brother, he is a liar. For anyone who does not love his brother, whom he has seen, cannot love God, whom he has not seen. And he has given us this command: Whoever loves God must also love his brother" [1st John 4:19-21].

You and I have failed miserably to follow these ten commands of Creator God. We have failed to love our neighbor whom we have seen, and we definitely have failed to love Creator God above everything else. We have not been satisfied with the countless blessings He showers down on us daily, but covet more. Yes, you and I are failures and deserve God's just wrath and punishment.

The Good News comes from what else Creator God has spoken. His words have led to action. As Yahweh delivered the tribe of Israel from slavery, He offers to deliver or rescue you from the slavery of sin and His just judgment. Furthermore, His Word became flesh and dwelt among us. Jesus, Creator God's one and only Son, took sin and its consequences upon himself. He demonstrated His love for us and offers us His mercy and forgiveness. Jesus and he alone was able to fulfill the Ten Commandments and to offer up His life as a payment for the sin of the world. Mission accomplished!

Your Creator God has indeed spoken whether you believe in Him or not. The purpose of His giving of the Ten Commandments was to drive one to his/her knees. The Ten Commandments were certainly not to be used to justify oneself. 



Message from the President's Office at Little Priest Tribal College

Great news!

If you are one of the approximately 232 enrolled Winnebago Tribal Members that have an outstanding balance and owe Little Priest Tribal College, then you are eligible to participate in a special program that can help you pay off your bill and get you back into college.

Recently, the Winnebago Tribal Council successfully renegotiated an easement with the Northern Natural Gas Company. Part of that negotiation has helped to fund a Winnebago Tribal Member education initiative, which includes Little Priest Tribal College.

Winnebago Tribal Members have two options to pay off or significantly pay down your bill. You can use one or both of the following options:

Option 1: The Little Priest Tribal College President Scholarship will be used to match any payment made toward your outstanding balance. The program is a dollar-for-dollar match.

Option 2: Little Priest is establishing a work repayment program for Winnebago Tribal Members to help pay down or pay off their debt to the college. The college will assign a work assignment to the eligible participant.

A standard rate of \$10 per hour will

be used to calculate the value of the work assignment of which will go toward paying the participants' outstanding bill.

Both Program Options are on a first-come and first-serve basis. These funds are limited and once they are exhausted then the program will end. Little Priest accepts major credit cards as one form of payment. To participate in the program, the eligible participant must sign and agree to a Payment Plan with the college Business Office.

I encourage you to take advantage of this great opportunity because the next step for the college is to file a small claim in Winnebago Tribal Court. Please be advised once the claim is approved, the college will move to garnish future tribal stimulus payments or garnish your wages.

The program is critical to the survival of the college as Winnebago Tribal Members owe the college just under \$400,000.00, respectively.


ANGELICA SOLOMON





