Omaha Central wins shootout over Winnebago Indians jump up two classes to take on big city powerhouse

OMAHA—Eager basketball fans anticipated a showdown between two

of the more celebrated big men in the state of Nebraska, 6-7 scoring machine David Wingett of Winnebago, and 6-8, 240 lbs. king of the paint, Isaiah Poor Bear-Chandler of Omaha Central.

What they got was a high scoring barn burner, Omaha Central prevailing 97-86, largely decided by the stellar guard play of Keondre Spivey and Roman Behrens. These two accounted for 61 points, and helped the Eagles shoot 66% from the field.

Nebraskahoops magazine rated this contest as the potential game of the year, and it took center stage at Ralston Arena on Thursday, December 22. Taking on a school with fifteen times their enrollment, the two-time defending Lakota Nation Invitational champion Indians showed no fear, matching the Eagles bucket-for-bucket for most of the opening period. But in the first minute of play, the pattern that would spell defeat for Winnebago revealed itself.

Behrens, Central's skinny 6-0 point guard, doesn't look like much of an athlete, and he moves with a casual, unimpressive style, which seems vulnerable, but produces stunning results. If you man-up defensively, he dishes the ball off for an assist, and if you lay off, he slices through the paint for an easy bucket. If you focus on Behrens, try to stop him from getting the 30 points he scored, shooting guard Keondre Spivey strikes for 31 points, hitting five of five

threes, exposing the defensive play of Winnebago guards D'Von LaPointe and Drake Gorrin as needing some work.

To be fair, Winnebago never faces this caliber of guard play at their class level, and if Head Coach Jeff Berridge had it to do over, he probably would have been more aggressive against the Eagles backcourt, but it wasn't like Winnebago played badly, or that they were getting blown out by a bigger school.

"They had us scrambling," Central Head Coach Ben Holling said. "And we had to figure things out, but they were tough to guard."

Fittingly, scoring opened on a Behrens lay-up. He dribbled along the three-point line, saw he could penetrate the paint, and scored easily. Winnebago responded with their big weapon, Wingett, who hit a three from the top of the key.

Jokral Pal, a beanpole 6-6 junior forward then missed badly on a three attempt for Central, and the Winnebago coaches shouted, "Let him shoot!" Unfortunately, he didn't take too many more shot.

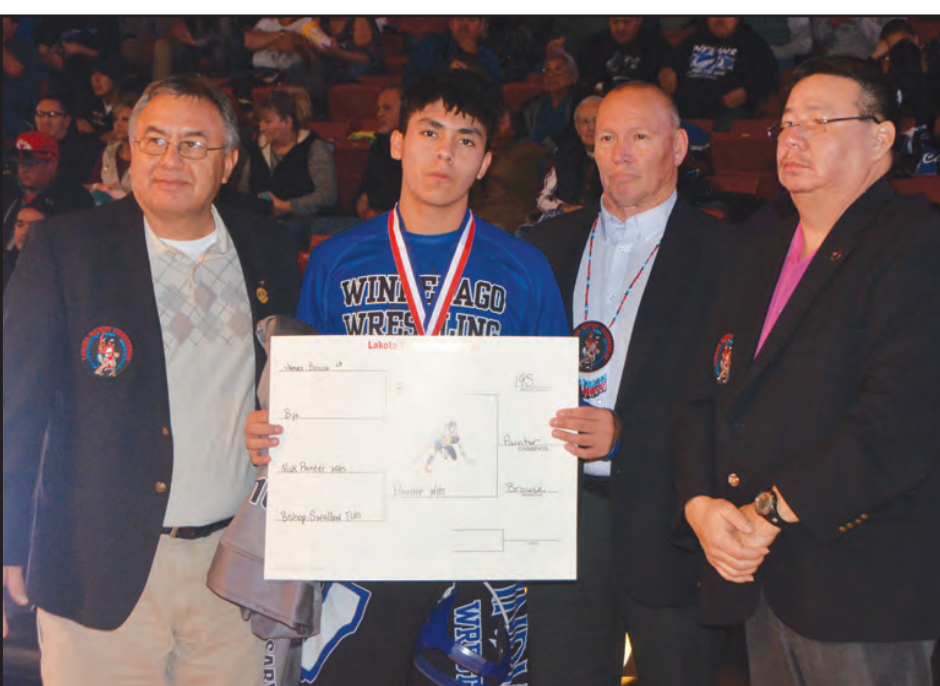

"Disturbing News or Good News?"

Have you ever heard news that disturbed you but was good news for others? Maybe it was when your team lost and your spouse or friend's team won. Or maybe it was when your candidate for tribal council or national office lost and someone you despise, for whatever reason, won.

The season of Christmas can be a very disturbing time as well. People can get so wrapped up in the buying and spending, the attempts to please others through gift giving and are short lived. I noted on facebook several posts that seemed to express a relief that Christmas was over, good riddance. Really, I am so sorry that you missed out on the Good News of Christmas.

For some the birth of a baby boy, born in Bethlehem, now nearly 2,000 years ago is still troubling news. Nothing really has changed. What is truly Good News from our Creator meant for all, the birth of the Savior of people of every tribe, nation and people, is still opposed by all too many.

Matthew, one of Jesus' disciples, renders this account: "Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, 'Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him.'" When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him [Matthew 2:1-3 ESV].

Seriously, Herod the king was troubled by the news of the birth of a baby boy? Yes, and not only him but all Jerusalem with him. "Academic requirements for College"

Did you know that colleges-particularly four-year colleges and universities require you to take certain courses during high school to qualify for admission? Work with your school counselor to create a four-year plan that will ensure you're prepared for college.

If you complete (and pass) these courses in high school, you should qualify for admission to any college in Nebraska: English-4 years in intensive reading and writing. Math-4 years including Algebra 1, Algebra II and Geometry, and an additional year that builds on your knowledge of Algebra. Social Studies-3 years including American history and World History, one additional course in history, American Government and/or Geography, and a third course in Social Sciences. Natural Sciences-3 years including Biology, Chemistry, Physics or Earth sciences. One course must include laboratory instruction. World language-2 years of the same language.

Check the website of colleges you're interested in attending to learn their specific requirements for admission.

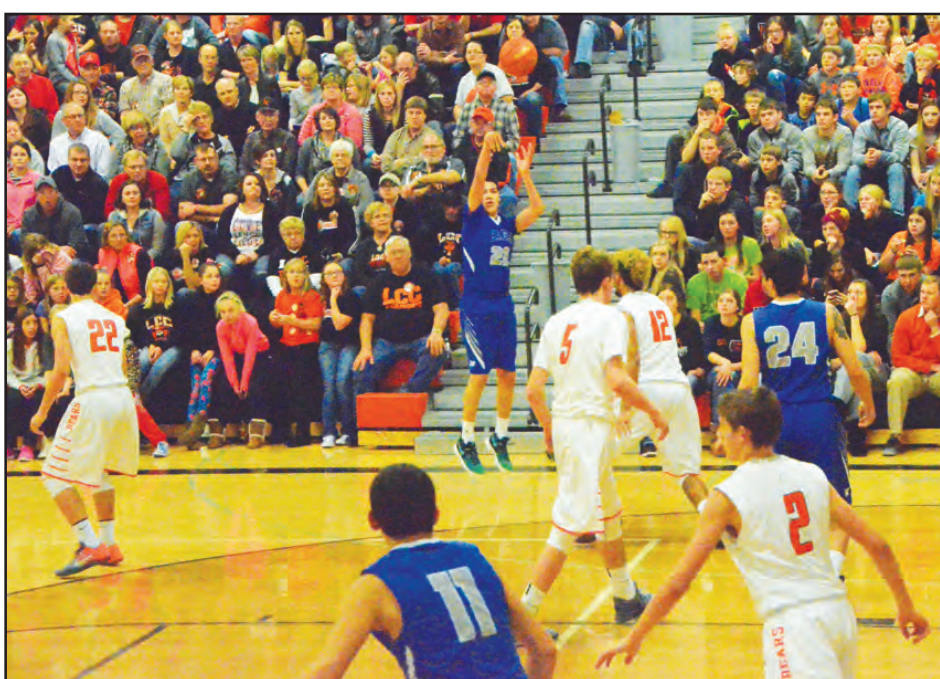

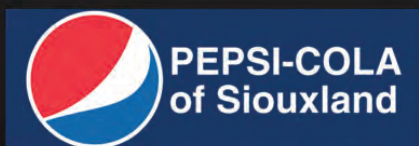

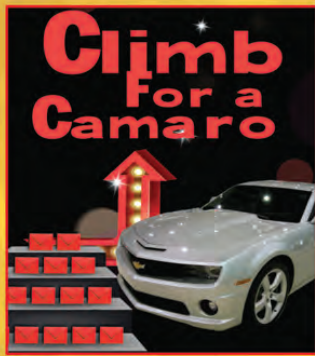
