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Winnebago Football Earns Trip to the Championship Game



Winnebago, NE – The Winnebago High School Football team find themselves facing a familiar foe for this year's championship game. The #1 ranked Tiospa Zina will go head-to-head with Winnebago in the All-Nations Football League Championship game. Tiospa Zina gave Winnebago their only loss back in the beginning of May.

How did we get here?
Winnebago rebounded from their first loss with a victory in Macy, Nebraska against the #4 ranked Omaha Nation Chiefs. The game was not Winnebago's best game but they got the job done. The first two quarters found both teams taking light jabs at each other. Neither team could get their offense going and the refs found themselves throwing a lot of penalty flags. Antrell Harlan had two touchdowns and Caleb Kearnes scored a 10-yard touchdown. Omaha Nation kept the game close and if it was not for the Winnebago defense, the chiefs could have pulled off the upset. Winnebago produced 3 huge interceptions to seal

the win.

After the win, Winnebago was seeded #2 in the playoffs. That put Winnebago and the #3 ranked Lower Brule Sioux on a collision course to battle it out in the semi-final game. This game was played on Friday, May 21 in Mitchell, South Dakota at the Joe Quintal Football Stadium. Lower Brule came out swinging and scored first on Winnebago. The Indians then marched down the field and scored, came up with an on-side kick and scored again. Lower Brule made things interesting with a 53-yard touchdown. Winnebago was not fazed and decided to go on a touchdown frenzy. The freshman running back Antrell Harlan ended up with 2 touchdowns, Senior Quarterback Caleb Kearnes scored 2 touchdowns and wide receiver Zaiden Bernie found the end zone 6 times - (4) touchdowns and (2) Two-point conversions. Winnebago scored a season high of 58 points against Lower Brule's 28 points.



SLOAN, IA— Fatherhood is Sacred/Mother is Sacred Conference was held on May 19th at the WinnaVegas Casino Resort. The three-day event was made possible by a grant from the Substance Abuse Mental Health Administration Services sponsored Winnebago Alcohol program and the Winnebago Human Services program.

The Fatherhood is Sacred/Mother is Sacred program started 19 years ago, the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska was recognized as the third chapter in the country.

The program (Fatherhood is Sacred/Mother is Sacred) is based off of five principals: Choices, teachable, service, wisdom and Creator. The goal of the program is coming to the bright light of Creator God. Our approach is the Native American Fatherhood Family Associa-

tion (NAFFA). Our method is to teach the fathers and mothers to be uplifting, encouraging, assisting, and teaching. This is to try to help our relatives make a change in their life" said Fatherhood/Motherhood Is Sacred Trainer Facilitator & Probation Officer Terry Medina.

"It is still helping me today. It was introduced to me while at the Domestic Shelter in 2010. Being in an active addiction and being in an abusive relationship you are always looking for a safe place, that's what motherhood brought for me. Something in the curriculum was a guide for my identity and that gave me purpose, with purpose you are able to take care of your family. You start expanding outward. We have to be nice to our children and go out and be nice to others" shared Denise Milford Facilitator for Motherhood Is Sacred &

Lead Advocate for ATLAS.

"The event was very successful in terms of establishing new relationships and partnerships with State agencies and organizations" shared Medina.

The Winnebago Communications Department broadcasted the Fatherhood/Motherhood Is Sacred Conference on the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska's YouTube Channel and Facebook page. It averaged 150 views a day and had 154 in attendance.







What top 3 songs are your favorite and why?





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

Thoughts on a bright future...



It is graduation season. I couldn't be happier for our grads and their families. I don't know the statistics but so many of our young people are graduating from high school and college that I am losing track. I love the pictures of the graduates with their cap and gown and a few members of their family with huge smiles on their faces. This many graduates bodes very well for our future.

My grandparents were not educated, but they were smart. Even if they had a higher education, I wonder what opportunities they would have got in the 1940's and 1950's. My guess is not much. I love that the Tribe has become an opportunity machine for our people. You can work for the Tribe, one of the casinos, Ho-Chunk, Inc., Little Priest Tribal College, or the Hospital. There are also plenty of jobs at the two school and the BIA also.

Most small towns in Nebraska are slowly dying because they lack opportunity which causes their young people to go away for college and

never move back home. Soon these towns close their school or consolidate with another town. These declining communities also lose businesses and build very few new homes. This creates a sort of death spiral for these towns with mostly cheap housing and older residents.

Winnebago is the exact opposite. We keep adding people. Our town has grown by about 600 people in the last 8 years. Our school keeps expanding. Our business community is growing. Most of our people are young and we just keep on building new housing units. None of this was an accident. It was the plan of our leaders back in the 1980's.

The Tribe started the casinos. The Tribe started Ho-Chunk, Inc. The Tribe started Little Priest Tribal College. The Tribe took over control of the hospital. The Tribe invested in higher education and Educare. The tribal members now run the village and the school board. We took control over our own destiny and shaped a future where we can create opportunities.

We still have problems. We still need housing. We still could use more jobs. We still have long term trauma that messes with generations of a single family sometimes. But we are slowly creating a virtuous cycle of expectation and opportunity for success. To me these graduates are an obvious sign that the work put in by the Tribe and hard-working members over the last 40 years is really starting to pay off in a big way.

With the economic growth on the horizon with the WarHorse casino's, I can't help but think the future of the Winnebago people is very bright and I am so glad to be a witness of it.

Vivian Painter (Hok-Jagu-Winga - Bear that returns to the same place), 80, Member of the Bear Clan and enrolled member of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska, of South Sioux City, Nebraska passed away on May 11, 2021 with her family by her side after a long-fought battle with cancer, a real champion after a 12-year battle.

Services were held at 2:00 pm

May 14, 2021 with Mr. John Morris Sr. officiating at the Ho-Chunk Community Center in Winnebago, Nebraska. Arrangements were under the direction of the Winnebago Wake and Burial Program and Munderloh-Smith Funeral Home.

Interment was in the Winnebago Cemetery.

Vivian was born August 2,

1940, the daughter of the late Joseph Painter Sr. and late Mary Cleveland-Painter. After graduation from the Winnebago Public School system, Vivian worked her entire life, retiring from the Federal Government, United States Public Health Service in 2003. In Vivian's early years she worked several jobs in states away from home, most notably in Arizona and Texas. After retirement from Federal Government service she went on to continue her career working for the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska in the Ho Chunk Renaissance Program and Personnel/Human Resources

Department until 2009. She also worked several other jobs just to keep busy.

In Vivian's spare time, she enjoyed visiting with friends and relatives (usually over a good meal at a local eatery), trying her luck at the casino (often hitting good hits), playing darts, and striking a good deal at a local rummage sale, thrift store or retail store.

JESUS OUR SAVIOR LUTHERAN OUTREACH



"Children of God"

On this past Sunday, May 23rd, we celebrate at Jesus Our Savior Lutheran Church the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus walked this earth for forty more days after his victorious resurrection. Before he left, he comforted his disciples that he would not leave them as orphans, but he would be sending them the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Ten days later the Holy Spirit came down on his followers with power. The work of the Holy Spirit is to have Jesus' Father adopt us into the Family of God. Those who, by grace, receive God's Spirit into their hearts are children of God.

I am taking much of the following words from Bo Giertz's devotion book, entitled 'To Live with Christ.' His devotion is based on Paul's letter to the Romans, chapter eight, verses twelve through seventeen.

Here are two of those verses: 'You did not receive a spirit that makes you a slave again to fear, but you received the Spirit of sonship. And by him we cry, "Abba, Father." The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children' [Romans 8:16-17 NIV(84)].

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of childhood. This name indicates better than anything else the reason the Spirit has been sent into the world and what He accomplishes. The Spirit is also called the Helper, Comforter, and Consoler.

The comfort and help He can give consists of teaching us that we can be God's children together with Christ and through Christ. Therefore, He witnesses about Christ and not about Himself. He paints Christ's picture for us. He helps us understand that Jesus died for us. He creates faith in our hearts, allowing us to be born from above.

This is something that might not be noticeable right away. We might just feel an immense helplessness instead. But in the midst of this helplessness

grows a firm confidence in Christ, a confidence like that of the thief on the cross.

In the Gospel of St. Luke we learn that Jesus had been crucified between two thieves. Luke writes: 'One of the criminals who hung there hurled insults at him: "Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us!" But the other criminal rebuked him. "Don't you fear God," he said, "since you are under the same sentence? We are punished justly, for we are getting what our deeds deserve. But this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom" [Luke 23:39-42].

The penitent thief knew he didn't deserve it, but he couldn't help but hope and believe that Christ would have mercy on him. Look up in your Bible (or on-line) for Jesus' response.

If the Spirit has completed the work, then sooner or later He gives us childlike wisdom. He testifies through our spirit that we are God's children. This fills us with a great comfort, a boundless thankfulness, a lovely certainty that nothing can separate us from God's love because Christ is with and has mercy on us. We can say Abba! Father! with childlike confidence.

There are people who think it's obvious that we are all God's children. They have never thought about how much separates us from God. But when the Spirit convinces us of our sin, it's possible that our own conscience, which is the Law's voice in our own heart, can pronounce such an irrevocable judgment on us all our egoism and impurity that we no longer dare to believe we can be God's children.

Only then can the Holy Spirit show us the truth, the great truth that Christ has died for sinners like us and that it's possible even for us to be God's beloved children. He alone, the Spirit of childhood, can convince us of this.

The LPTC Extension office has been busy the past two weeks with our annual kickoff of the gardening year and distribution of seeds and seedlings. We are also distributing trees and shrubs to the community to emphasize the importance of planting trees for the well-being of the environment. We had originally tied the tree and shrub distribution to a combined Earth Day/Arbor Day celebration, but continue to distribute until all trees are gone or spoken for.

The Extension office also has been doing bi-monthly workshops in our ongoing Garden Series, which runs from February to November. We discuss all things gardening and harvesting of produce, canning and dehydrating and even an occasional cooking demonstration.

LPTC Extension has hired Angelica Parker as our Lead Gardener/Extension Assistant. Angelica has been with us since March and is doing an outstanding job getting our Hoop House and gardens ship shape!

We are expanding our Outreach to the youth which had been hampered by the Pandemic. We are currently working with Educare, YCIC, WPS and look forward to doing more with the Boys and Girls Club in a common curriculum, but designed to fit the various age groups.

Our collaboration with various tribal organizations continues to expand and strengthen and we look forward to building strong relationships with all of the Winnebago Community and beyond.

Twelve Clans Unity Hospital Earns ACR Accreditation





Colorado Spruce

The Christmas tree shape of Colorado spruce is beautiful indeed, but several common problems make growing them a challenge.

Deep Cold

February's hard hit of negative double digit cold resulted in the tops dying out of spruce trees. This caused cracks to develop in trunk tissues that then leak sap. This is apparent with the accumulation of white crust on the trunk and branches. Once cracks develop, canker pathogens like Cytospora gain access to conductive tissues within the tree, widening the wound. Unfortunately, sprays and drenches do not counter the effects of Cytospora canker. Prune out the dead central leader and re-train a lower branch to take over as the new central leader. Branches below the new central leader can be cut back to restore the pyramid shape. How To Prune Coniferous Evergreen Trees (uidaho.edu)

Spruce Spider Mite

The spruce spider mite is a small sucking pest of spruce and other evergreens. With their needle-like mouthpart, the spruce spider mite removes sugars, sap, and chlorophyll from foliage. When mite populations are high, needles present an off-color appearance of dusty green. Leaves eventually turn brown altogether and fall from the tree. The spruce spider mite is active in the cooler parts of the season, with activity peaking in spring and fall. A hand lens or a microscope is a handy tool to identify spruce spider mites, but the paper test can also be applied. Using a sheet of white paper, tap a branch over the paper and look for small dots moving across the page. Miticides are effectively applied when mites are active in spring and fall. Rainfall has a nice way of keeping mite populations down by drowning them. Ins of ev 3-6-09 (unl.edu)

Bagworm

Tear drop-shaped bags and loss of needles are clear indications of bagworm infestations. A few caterpillars can defoliate trees in a relatively short time frame, leaving branches bare and killing next year's growth buds. Products containing the active ingredient Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt) can be applied in mid-June to early July to target these caterpillars when they are small. As the caterpillars grow, so do their appetites, causing significant defoliation and being difficult to manage as well. Come August, caterpillars are too big to manage with insecticides and hand-picking bags from trees is really the only option. Rhizosphaera Needle Cast

This fungal disease, caused by the pathogen Rhizosphaera kalkhoffii, interferes with intake of carbon dioxide through the needles. The needle's breathing structures, known as stomates, are clogged with the fungus's spore producing structures. Without the ability to breathe in carbon dioxide and exhale oxygen, trees are unable to photosynthesize, starting a cycle of decline that, if left untreated, can cause defoliation and death to the tree. Cool wet springs provide the perfect conditions for development of needle cast. A hand lens or microscope is handy for spotting infected stomates, which appear as rows of black dots on needles. Good air circulation, keeping irrigation water from wetting foliage, mulching beneath trees, and application of a fungicide will manage needle cast. Dis of ev 1-20-09 (unl.edu)

Tree Overuse

Colorado spruce is suited to rocky, well-drained soils, in locations that receive 6 or more hours of direct, uninterrupted sunlight daily. Heavily irrigated clay soils and shady sites are situational conditions ripe with opportunity for decline, necessitating costly interventions that may or may not work.

With the tree popular for use as accents in front yards, as windbreaks, and in allées, the Colorado spruce has become the dominant evergreen in the landscape. As with any over-used plant, a major concern is the potential for an emerging insect or disease problem to infest the species (think: emerald ash borer for ash, Dutch elm disease for elm, and pine wilt for pine.) Diversity is always the best choice, especially when utilizing trees with insect and disease resistance. Substitutions for this much-overused tree include juniper, Concolor fir, Douglas fir, Fraser fir, Norway spruce, Black Hills spruce, and Ponderosa pine.




