The Black Hawk War of 1832 and a series of treaties forced the Winnebago out of their homeland, and they were removed to reservations in Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota, and finally to a portion of the Sisseton Reservation in Nebraska.

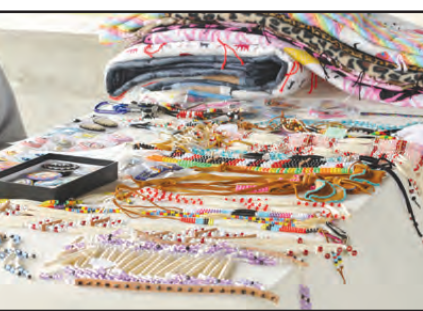

On Thursday, July 16th there was a special Tribal Council meeting and swearing-in ceremony for the newly appointed Tribal Council members Brian Chamberlain and Lorelei DeCora.

WINNEBAGO, NE—On Thursday, July 16th at 1:00 p.m. Lorelei Hope DeCora and Brian Chamberlain took their oath of office one day after special elections. The ceremony took place at the Blackhawk Center Gymnasium in Winnebago.

Due to safety concerns of the COVID-19 pandemic the swearing in ceremony was closed to the public. The Winnebago Communications Department and Winnebago Indian News were able to film the Swearing in Ceremony for all tribal members to view. The Swearing in Ceremony can be viewed on the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska's YouTube

Channel.

DeCora received 226 votes, which was 26.46 percent of the vote, to Chamberlain's 221 votes, or 25.88 percent. "The people have spoken" said the newly elected council member Chamberlain.

During the swearing in ceremony, Chamberlain thanked everyone who voted and to all those who supported his candidacy. This is Chamberlain's 4th time taking his oath for office and a COVID-19 survivor. Chamberlain stated, "each time that I do it I take this responsibility very seriously." Chamberlain also extended his gratitude and appreciation for all the candidates. Chamberlain also stated, "politics is in the hand of our people and the voice

of the people needs to be heard at all times." Concluding, "You will receive my best efforts, you will receive my fullest level of what I believe to be correct and what I believe we ought to be doing and I pledge to you all that through the end of this term."

DeCora the newly elected council member thanked all the people who were apart of the elections process: the election committee, the college students, Garan Coons the Communication's officer, and the two previous council members. Decora stated, "I will do my best between now and until the general election." Decora expressed her gratitude and appreciation to the Winnebago people.

WINNEBAGO, NE--The Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska (WTN) was awarded \$900,000 from U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG) program to support the construction for the new Halfway House.

Joy Johnson the Director of Planning and Development stated, "as a key component of our tribal community's comprehensive response to the Covid-19 pandemic the Winnebago Tribe will construct a new residential facility to serve as a Halfway House and Counseling Center for ten adults (five men, five women) who are graduating from the Drug Dependency Unit (DDU). The facility is constructed with ten private rooms which will facilitate self-isolation and quarantine requirements for residents who may become

infected with Covid-19, or who might otherwise need to reside with family members in a high-risk location where this isolation would not be feasible."

Construction of the Halfway House Project began May 2020, during this phase of construction the 110-year-old wood framed house was demolished and disposed. In addition, an environmental company tested and removed asbestos. Now that the ICD-BG is supporting the construction of Halfway House, the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska has to meet the specific environmental requirements before the tribe can contract and proceed with the project. The goal is to have the rough construction and enclose the building by December 2020.

The previous Halfway House will be replaced with a modular/pre-fabricated residential facility which will also include a counseling center.

The building will support providing residential services, peer support and group meetings. "The lower foundational area will provide office space for up to seven counseling staff, and meeting space for individual, small, and large group counseling sessions. Supervised physical activities will be made available to both residents of the halfway house and counseling clients on the lower foundational area." Upon the completion of the facility job placement and accessing GED and/or career education will be provided.

The new Halfway House is anticipated to be completed in 12 months and is being made possible with the funding support from HUD, the U.S. Department of Justice, Siletz Tribe, Tyson Foods, the Winnebago Community Development Corporation, and the Winnebago Tribe.

NOTICE OF FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT AND NOTICE OF INTENT TO REQUEST RELEASE OF FUNDS

These notices shall satisfy two separate but related procedural requirements for activities to be undertaken by the HoChunk Community Development Corporation.

REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS

On or about August 7, 2020 the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska will submit a request to the HUD/NPONAP for the release of \$900,000 in Indian Community Development Block Grant funds under 14.862 of the Indian Community Development Block Grant FY-2018 and Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended to undertake a project known as the Public Facility: Halfway House & Counseling Center Project for the purpose of constructing a new residential facility in Winnebago to serve as a halfway house and counseling center for ten adults (five men, five women) who are graduating our Drug Dependency Unit (DDU) but require additional structure, programming, oversight, and (if need be) space for social isolation or quarantine. The total project cost is \$2,000,000 with the balance of project funding coming from the US Department of Justice and private donors.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

The Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska has determined that the project will have no significant impact on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) is not required. Additional project information is contained in the Environmental Review Record (ERR) on file at Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska, 100 Bluff Street, Winnebago, Nebraska and may be examined or copied weekdays 8:00 A.M to 4:30 P.M.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Any individual, group, or agency may submit written comments on the ERR to the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska. All comments received by August 7, 2020 will be considered by the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska prior to authorizing submission of a request for release of funds. Comments should specify which Notice they are addressing.

ENVIRONMENTAL CERTIFICATION

The Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska certifies to HUD/NPONAP that Coly Brown in his capacity as Tribal Chairman consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. HUD/NPONAP's approval of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and related laws and authorities and allows the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska to use Program funds.

OBJECTIONS TO RELEASE OF FUNDS

HUD/NPONAP will accept objections to its release of fund and the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska's certification for a period of fifteen days following the date of this notice only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska; (b) the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the development process have committed funds, incurred costs or undertaken activities not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by HUD/NPONAP; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. Objections must be prepared and submitted via email in accordance with the required procedures (24 CFR Part 58, Sec. 58.76) and shall be addressed to HUD/NPONAP Administrator at US Department of Housing & Urban Development, Northern Plains Office of Native American Programs, Region VIII Denver Office at Luisa.A.Bonilla@hud.gov. Potential objectors should contact the HUD ONAP Denver office via email to verify the actual last day of the objection period.

WinnaVegas Casino Resort to Enter Phase Two

Sloan, Iowa – WinnaVegas Casino Resort announced today that effective July 17th they will expand hours of casino operation to 8am -2am Monday – Friday and 24 hours on the weekends. Table games operations will also reopen on Friday, July 17 at 10am. The hotel will now be open Wednesday – Saturday.

“We feel we’ve made the right decision to open with one of the strictest protocols of any local casino,” said WinnaVegas General Manager Mayan Beltran, “we feel confident our cleaning and social distancing practices are ready for Phase Two...I’m excited for all of us to get back to doing what they do best; providing the best gaming and entertainment experience possible for our guests.”

Table Games will open with masks mandatory as that is required throughout the property. Dealers will be required to wear masks & gloves and hours of operation will be 10am – 2am Wednesday - Sunday. Poker will remain closed until further notice.

During Phase Two, Kasu Café will operate under normal business hours from 8am to 2am, seven days a week. The Flowers Island Restaurant new hours of operation will be from 3pm to 9pm Wednesday through Friday and

11am to 9pm on weekends. The 360 Lounge and the Casino Bar will now allow standing or sitting

The entire casino property will continue to be non-smoking and will still temporarily restrict anyone under 18 years old from entering the Resort. Valet, golf simulators, video gaming room, fitness room and hotel pool remain closed for now.

Additionally, masks are still mandatory for all guests and team members while on the property. Entrances restrictions are lifted whereas guests may enter and exit the property from any of the entrances but upon entering we are still requiring temperature checks & masks.

“You, the guests, let us know you appreciated the efforts we made as a team to ensure your safety,” continued Beltran, “We look forward to bringing our favorite table games back for you to enjoy with the same amount of confidence in our safety protocols we have shown since we re-opened.”

Expanded hours of operation will be determined on a later date. Casino management will continue to utilize social media and their website (www.winnavegas.com) to communicate and inform the public on any new developments regarding the different phases of reopening the Casino Resort.

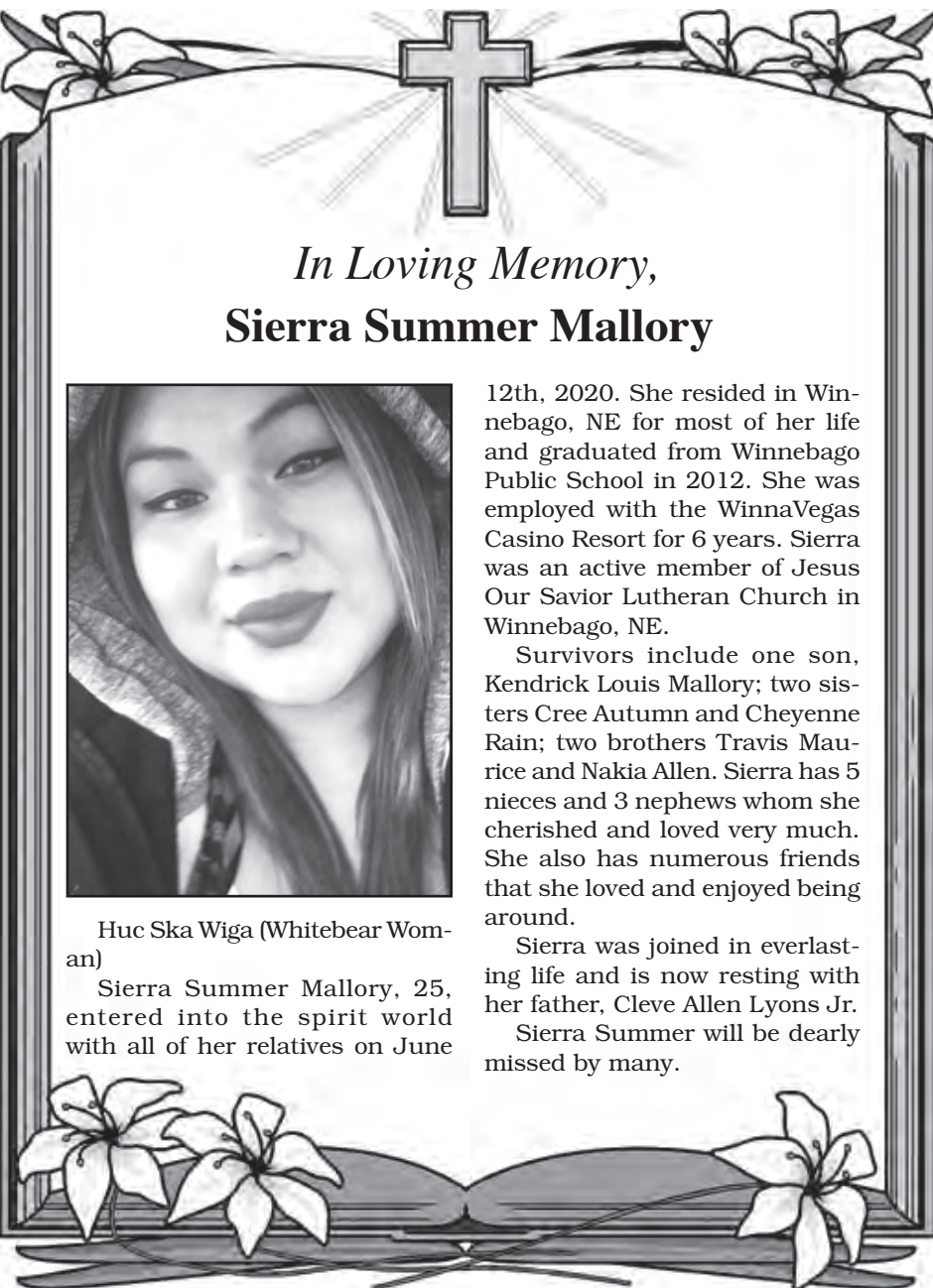

"2020-2021 Bible Verse and Hymn"

Each year we select a Bible verse and a hymn for Jesus Our Savior Lutheran Preschool. This year I selected a two-part Bible verse. The first part goes like this:

"Then [Jesus] opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures' (Luke 24:45).

Jesus was sending his disciples, now his apostles - or 'sent ones' - to go in all four directions and share the Good News found in Sacred Scriptures. You need to have your mind open in order to understand God's Sacred Word. It is our prayer that God's Spirit would open the minds of our preschoolers this school year. And what do the Scriptures teach? Jesus went on and this is part two of our Bible verse:

Then [Jesus] opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. He told them, "This is what is written: The Christ will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, and repentance and forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem." Jesus Our Savior Lutheran Preschool is now accepting applications for the 2020-2021 school year. Our preschool operates four days a week (most likely Monday through Thursday this year).

A child is eligible once they turn three and no longer in diapers/pampers. Our morning class meets from 9 to 11:30; and our afternoon class meets from 1 to 3:30. There is a one-time registration fee (non-refundable of \$25) for first time applicants. Class size is limited to eight.

Our curriculum is designed to meet the individual needs and interest of each child. It includes: Bible stories and memorization of God's Word and the Lord's Prayer in Ho-Chunk; reading and number readiness (Zoo-Phonics Program) as well as preschool level Ho-Chunk language learning; science concepts and problem solving; large and fine motor skills; social development and interaction; music and drama; as well as creative art and expression.

Jesus Our Savior Lutheran Preschool mission statement sums it up nicely. It reads: Each child is a precious gift from the Creator, saved by the love of Jesus. Thus it is our duty to help them grow physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually through God's Word, empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Senator Joni Albrecht WEEKLY UPDATE July 13, 2020

As we move closer to reconvening at the Legislature, Nebraska moves towards economic recovery. Our state continues to lead the country, even in the midst of COVID-19. In June, Nebraska posted the lowest unemployment rate in the Nation, showing once again the amazing work ethic of Nebraska residents and their commitment to a strong recovery of our State.

Speaking of unemployment, the extra \$600 per week for those collecting unemployment benefits is set to expire July 31. Also, beginning the benefit week of July 12, 2020, performing and reporting work search activities are once again required for those claiming benefits unless the claimant has an employer-confirmed recall date within 112 days of their layoff, is in approved training, a union member with a hiring hall, or in a short-time compensation program.

Working from home the last few months has involved more than a few frustrating moments without adequate Internet service. This last week, I directly experienced the need for improved broadband and internet access for those of us in District 17. The gap in adequate rural access to broadband has become even more apparent with increased use of Internet by so many working from and staying at home during the pandemic. Never having left my mind, rural broadband access is once again at the forefront. I serve on the Transportation and Telecommunications Committee. In February, the Committee designated LB992 as one of our two priority bills. LB992 proposes the Broadband Internet Service Infrastructure Act and makes changes recommended by the Rural Broadband Task Force to improve access. The changes in part provide a process enabling broadband to expand service by running over existing electric easements to the rural communities throughout Nebraska. I am looking forward to discussing LB992 during these next 17 days of the Session.

Kudos to Walmart South Sioux City that has actively participated in reaching the goal of Walmart's Veterans Welcome Home Commitment to hire 250,000 veteran associates since its Memorial Day 2013 launch. Nebraska helped reach the goal with 2,200 veteran hires and 421 veteran associate promotions in the state. I am proud that District 17 played a part in this honorable effort.

Looking ahead to reconvening July 20, property tax relief remains a focal point for me and many of my colleagues. There has been hard work since January to try to bring tax relief to individual, commercial, and agricultural landowners. Many senators have worked tirelessly to make LB1106 a better bill. Reports have indicated that there is still a struggle to get the 33 votes needed to pass LB1106. My thanks to Senator Groene for outlining the following changes being proposed in the most recent amendment to LB1106: Agriculture, horticultural & special

valuations within the TEEOSA formula adjusted to 52%; residential, commercial/industrial & centrally assessed property adjusted to 83%

Taxable property valuations for school districts: 55% for agriculture, horticultural & special valuations; 87% for residential, commercial/industrial & centrally assessed property.

Acceptable ranges for property valuations by Counties adjusted to 49-55% for agricultural, horticultural, & special valuations; 79-87% for residential, commercial/industrial & centrally assessed property.

Foundation Aid, currently set at 2.23% of local income taxes to each school district from the State, under LB1106 in its currently proposed amendment would replace the Income Tax Rebate with 15% of net income, corporate, sales & use tax collections divided by statewide K-12 fall membership. Foundation Aid cannot be less than 15% of a school district's basic funding.

Base limitation on budget growth Adjust from 2.5% Basic Allowable Growth Rate of expenditures, which has averaged 1.48% to 2.0% maximum allowable growth in expenditures.

Budget authority, currently allowed to accrue unused budget authority year over year may access a maximum of 2.5% of additional budget authority annually. This would continue after 2020-21, however, would include a one-time reset of all school districts' unused budget authority back to current year expenditures. To eliminate budget authority hoarding, the 2.5% cap would be eliminated and districts that use the year over year budget method would be allowed to set base-year maximum expenditures at 110% of the most recent 2-year budget.

Maximum levy of \$1.05 per \$100 valuation adjusted.

In summary, the State pays a larger percentage of educational costs for Nebraska's children and the school districts restrain spending growth. At the center of the proposal is a plan to reduce local reliance on property tax revenues.

Naturally, the changes noted above, along with a few others may change. As the amendment is currently proposed, District 17 taxpayers and schools will benefit from its passage.

What is certain is that enough is enough. We need to do what is best for the children, the taxpayers, and the State. As we look toward reconvening on July 20, I am challenging my colleagues in the Legislature to join hands across the aisle and to take care of this issue that the people of Nebraska have already waited 40 years for us to fix. Haven House Adds New Housing Program for Survivors

Many people experience abuse in their life, such as emotional, psychological, verbal, physical and sexual abuse. No one deserves to be abused. Haven House is here to help and provide support. They are dedicated to the elimination of violence against women, men, and children through empowerment, education, social action, and support services. Haven House has been providing free and confidential services for survivors of domestic and sexual violence since 1978. They serve victims of domestic violence and sexual assault within a five county area; Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Wayne, and Thurston counties which includes the Omaha and Winnebago Indian Reservations.

Being cooped up at home is tough. But for victims of domestic abuse trapped at home with an abuser, home can also be a terrifying, dangerous place of violence. Haven House has been working hard to expand their services to provide victims safe way out. For years they have been able to provide emergency shelter for individuals fleeing for their safety; Haven House is now able to take it one step further. Haven House was awarded fund-

ing for a transitional housing program by the Nebraska Crime Commission's Victim of Crimes Act. This has been a great accomplishment for the agency. Beginning July 1st, Haven House has the opportunity to further assist victims of domestic and sexual violence by providing transitional housing for up to 24 months. During these 2 years, Haven House can help victims pay deposits, utilities, and monthly rent. While participating in this program advocates will work continuously with individuals to provide intense case management throughout the length of their participation. The intense case management will allow advocates to assist individuals with employment search, financial budgeting, and debt reduction. The goal of the program is to teach individuals the tools need to be self-sufficient and live violence free.

Helicopter to Make Low-Level Flights Over Eastern Nebraska to Learn More About Groundwater Aquifers

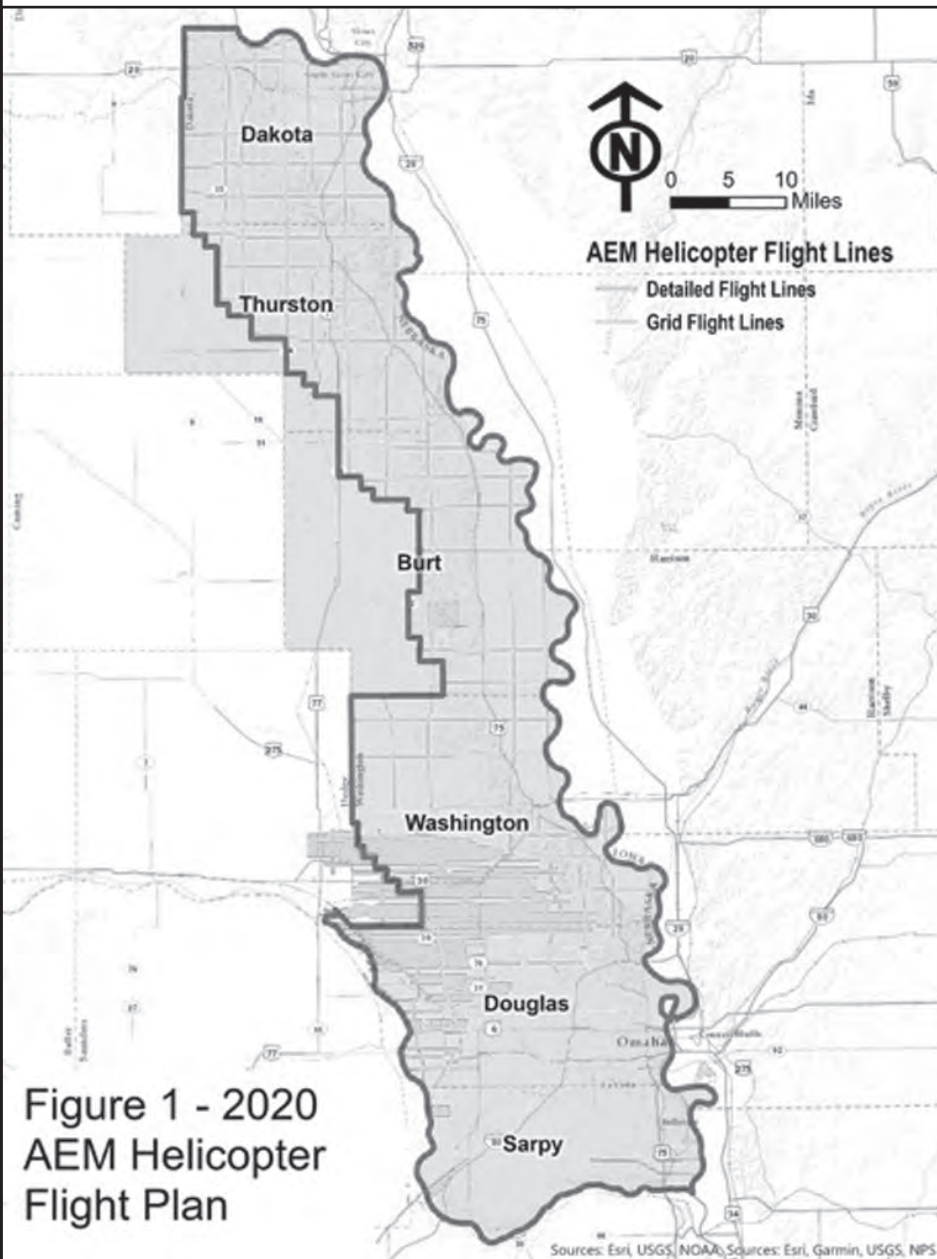


Figure 1 - 2020 AEM Helicopter Flight Plan

OMAHA, NE: Eastern Nebraska residents should not be alarmed if they see a low-flying helicopter over areas of the Papio-Missouri River Natural Resources District in August.

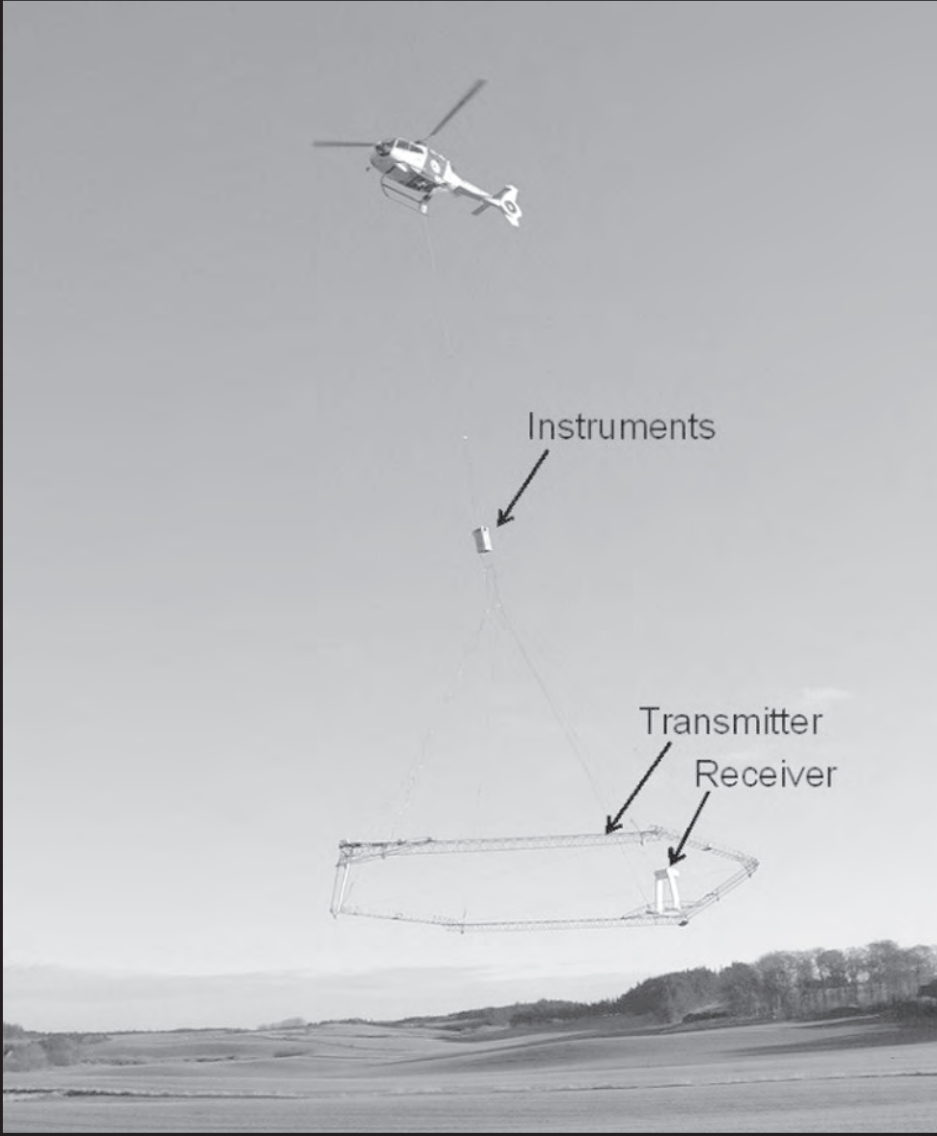
Beginning August 1st and lasting approximately three weeks, instruments mounted below a helicopter will collect and record geologic measurements to learn more about groundwater aquifers in Dakota, Thurston, Burt, Washington, Douglas, Dodge and Sarpy Counties. The Papio NRD, as part of the Eastern Nebraska Water Resources Assessment, have planned the flights and are completing them with financial assistance from the Nebraska Water Sustainability Fund, through the Nebraska Natural Resources Commission. A flight schedule for each area is forthcoming.

"The flights will improve our understanding of available groundwater and its possible connections with surface water in an area of the state made more complex by the presence of

glacial deposits," said Paul Woodward, Groundwater Management Engineer for the Papio NRD.

Aqua Geo Frameworks (AGF), of Mitchell, Nebraska will oversee the flights, process data and produce a final report. The equipment can collect data at a speed of more than 50 miles per hour and explore to a depth of more than 700 feet below the ground surface. Scientific equipment, that looks like a hexagon, is towed about 100 feet below the helicopter in a 'spider web' array and is designed to map geologic structures beneath the surface of the earth. The helicopter will be manned by experienced pilots specially trained for low-level flying with this equipment.

The flights are a continuation of previous data collected during 2016 and 2018 and will provide a geologic understanding of all remaining areas in the Papio NRD. Similar flights have been made across Nebraska since 2007 as NRDs seek to better understand and manage groundwater resources.



1,400 trees planted for regenerative poultry project

Ho-Chunk Farms is changing the way poultry is produced in Winnebago. They have joined a number of other farmers in adopting and developing a regenerative agriculture system.

The first visible step involved planting 1,400 hazelnut trees. Next, a chicken coop needs to be built and fencing installed before 1,500 egg-laying hens arrive.

This food sovereignty initiative has been in the works for over two years and builds on what Ho-Chunk Farms is doing with organic farming.

"We can feed our own crops to the chickens and run an entirely organic operation," said Aaron LaPointe, manager of Ho-Chunk Farms. "It will be fully integrated to where we're producing organic, free-range chickens that we can take to the farmers market, schools, the hospital, grocery stores. We can get more nutritious, locally grown foods into our markets here in Winnebago."

The 3-acre site allows for rotating crops and grazing to naturally rebuild the soil. The hazelnut trees will provide shade for the chickens, plus a cash crop to harvest. The chickens will be able to move freely, continually eating bugs, working the soil, and fertilizing it. Regenerative agriculture is an ap-

proach designed to produce wholesome food, reduce chemical- and antibiotic-intensive farming, reverse environmental damage, and build rural prosperity. It was created by Reginaldo Haslett-Marroquin, founder of the Regenerative Agriculture Alliance, based in Northfield, Minnesota.

"One freedom that should not be compromised is the freedom to collectively own and control our food and agriculture system," Haslett-Marroquin said.

This aligns with ongoing food sovereignty initiatives in Winnebago.

Two years ago, the Winnebago Tribal Council approved plans for an organic tribal garden and poultry operation to be developed on a 40-acre parcel of reservation farmland. The Food Sovereignty Task Force is now executing that plan. The garden was planted last year. Grant funding made it so Ho-Chunk Farms could move on to the poultry project.

Ho-Chunk Farms employees received help planting the trees from the Ho-Chunk, Inc. groundskeeping crew, tribal farmers, the Nebraska Natural Resource and Conservation Service, and the Nebraska Department of Roads. An extra 500 hazelnut trees were planted in the tribal orchard.
