to advancing Native causes. He lived in Sioux City, Iowa, a community with a thriving urban Indian population and one near the homelands and reservations of several tribes.

when she released the results of a DNA test which she said proved her claim of having Native ancestry.

The forum is the first of 2020 presidential cycle to focus on Indian issues and it's the first of its kind in more than a decade. Besides the LaMere connection, there's a reason it's being held in Iowa, one of the most critical early voting states.

During the organization's winter conference this year, NCAI President Jefferson Keel applauded the Cherokee Nation for the way it responded to Warren's assertions. "We've actually had a discussion and dialog about what tribal citizenship really is," he said.

"Via media outlets and streaming live video, candidates will speak to all of Indian Country," said O.J. Semans, a citizen of the Rosebud Sioux Tribe who co-directs Four Directions, a primary organizer of the August 19-20 forum.

While Warren did not address NCAI during the session -- instead choosing to participate in a private gathering hosted by Native women -- Keel offered praise for the presidential hopeful. "I believe she's a great champion for Indian Country," he said.

"We know candidates will be in Iowa for the State Fair just before our forum or at the Iowa AFL-CIO state convention the day after the forum," Semans added in reference to two events that typically attract several Democratic hopefuls.

"I admire her for what she's done," added Keel, who is stepping down as lieutenant governor of the Chickasaw Nation, a tribe based in Warren's home state of Oklahoma, after serving in the post for more than 20 years.

Elizabeth Warren's potential participation in the Frank LaMere Native American Presidential Forum was the subject of significant speculation on social media after Indianz.Com reported that she agreed to appear at a series of roundtables with tribal leaders last week in Detroit, Michigan, during the Democratic National Committee debates. Though she was enthusiastically received by the National Congress of American Indians in early 2018, her campaign stumbled later in the fall

Warren has since won an endorsement from a prominent figure in tribal circles. Rep. Deb Haaland (D-New Mexico), one of the first two Native women in Congress, called her a "great partner for Indian Country."

Winnebago Tribe among few Nebraska hemp producers included in 2019 pilot program

A farming business owned by the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska's economic development corporation has begun growing hemp on the reservation as part of a research pilot program.

Ho-Chunk Farms is among 10 applicants granted a Nebraska license to start hemp farming in 2019. The state received 176 applications after Gov. Pete Ricketts signed the Nebraska Hemp Farming Act (LB657) into law May 30.

"This is a young industry with a lot of potential," said Aaron LaPointe, business manager of Ho-Chunk Farms. "The 2019 season will be very small scale at 5.5 acres total. The data we collect during this pilot program gives us a head start for next year."

The 2014 U.S. farm bill authorized state departments of agriculture and higher educational institutions to grow and cultivate hemp under pilot research programs authorized by state law. Ne-

braska joins many Midwestern states aligning with federal law.

Ho-Chunk Farms planted the week of Aug. 5. The company's participation is on behalf of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska and includes working with the Ag Extension Program at Little Priest Tribal College.

This state pilot program will help the Winnebago Tribe and its entities scale up production next year by learning about local soil types, seeds and growing conditions. Ho-Chunk Farms will also be able to learn more about hemp processing and marketing.

Industrial hemp was legalized in the 2018 U.S. farm bill. That farm bill also authorized federally recognized tribes to develop their own regulatory plan for the production of hemp. The Winnebago Tribe's regulatory plan will go through an approval process by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as required under the 2018 law.

women," Haaland said of Warren, who has been a co-sponsor of legislation like Savanna's Act, a bill named in honor of Savanna Greywind, a Spirit Lake Nation woman who went missing and was murdered in 2017.

Amy Klobuchar is also a supporter of the measure, which requires the federal government to account for the numbers of missing and murdered American Indians and Alaska Natives the first time. She has served in the U.S. Senate since 2007 and pushed for inclusion of the landmark tribal jurisdiction provisions in the 2013 version of the Violence Against Women Act.

"We stood up for tribal rights," Klobuchar said at the U.S. Capitol in May, citing the pressure Indian Country placed on Congress six years ago in order to address high rates of victimization in tribal communities.

In 2017, Klobuchar cited tribal sovereignty in refusing to support the nomination of Jeff Sessions to be President Donald Trump's Attorney General. When he served in the Senate, he opposed the jurisdiction provisions of VAWA and he refused to say whether he'd enforce them as head of the Department of Justice.

"I've had so many tribes in my state that have had trouble getting anyone to prosecute their cases, and we simply allowed for dual jurisdiction when someone committed an act of violence that wasn't a member of the tribe," Klobuchar said. "That didn't make sense to me."

More recently, she opposed the nomination of Eric Miller, one of Trump's judicial nominees because he has repeatedly worked for clients who have tried to undermine Indian rights. Despite the concerns, he was confirmed to a seat on the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, which hears cases affecting hundreds of tribal governments in several Western states and in Alaska.

"I believe we need judges, particularly on the 9th Circuit that respect the history and contribution of tribal nations, not one that seeks to undermine their sovereign status," Klobuchar said in February.

The #MMIW crisis and safety for Native women are some of the rea-

sons why Semans and other partners are hosting the Frank LaMere Native American Presidential Forum. He said panels of tribal leaders and Native youth will be asking the participants about their stances and records on these critical issues.

"We're working to ensure the next president of the United States understands and is committed to addressing the issue of violence against Native American women," said Semans. In addition to Four Directions, the Native Organizers Alliance is serving as host of the forum.

Lynnette Grey Bull, a citizen of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, agreed with the need to advance issues facing Native women. She serves as senior vice president of the Global Indigenous Council, one of several co-hosts of the forum.

"The MMIW issue is older than America, but 243 years after the colonists' Declaration of Independence we're still waiting for the United States Government to address the epidemic," said Grey Bull. "Recently, our legislative recommendations received bipartisan support from prominent members of the House and Senate, yet we are still waiting for meaningful legislation to be passed."

The Global Indigenous Council was created by the Great Plains Tribal Chairman's Association, another co-host of the forum. Fellow co-hosts include the National Congress of American Indians, the Rocky Mountain Tribal Leaders Council, the Native American Rights Fund, the Coalition of Large Tribes, the Midwest Alliance of Sovereign Tribes and the United South and Eastern Tribes.

The Coshatta Tribe, based in Louisiana, will be the "Lead Premier" sponsor for the event while the NDN Collective has joined as "Lead Underwriting" sponsor. Tom Rodgers, a citizen of the Blackfeet Nation and founder of the Carlyle Consulting firm, has joined as "Lead Stage" sponsor.

Mark Trahan, a citizen of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes who serves as the editor of Indian Country Today, is scheduled to moderate the forum at the Orpheum Theatre in Sioux City. Tickets can be purchased online for a nominal fee.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS HVAC Repairs for Pressurized Rooms FY-19

I. SUMMARY AND BACKGROUND

The Winnebago Comprehensive Healthcare System (WCHS) is currently accepting proposals for implementation of a project to repair HVAC deficiencies in pressurized rooms identified during inspection of the Twelve Clans Unity Hospital in Winnebago, NE.

The purpose of this request is to solicit proposals from various candidate organizations, conduct a fair and extensive evaluation based on criteria listed herein, and select the candidate who best represents the direction that WCHS wishes to go.

Winnebago Comprehensive Healthcare System is a tribally managed healthcare organization operated under compact with the US Federal Government based upon Title V of the Indian Self Determination and Education Assistance Act.

II. PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

This Request for Proposal represents the requirements for an open and competitive process. Proposals will be accepted until 4:30 PM on 17 August 2019. Any proposals received after this date and time will be returned to the sender. All proposals must be signed by an official agent or representative of the company submitting the proposal.

If the organization submitting a proposal must outsource or contract any work to meet the requirements contained herein, this must be clearly stated in the proposal. Additionally, all costs included in proposals must be all-inclusive to include any outsourced or contracted work. Any proposals which call for outsourcing or contracting work must include a name and description of the organizations being contracted.

All costs must be itemized to include an explanation of all fees and costs.

Contract terms and conditions will be negotiated upon selection of the winning bidder for this RFP. All contractual terms and conditions will be subject to review by WCHS legal department and will include scope, budget, schedule, and other necessary items pertaining to the project.

III. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

All work taking place under this RFP must comply with the 2012 NFPA Life Safety Code, and the 2014 FGI Guidelines for Design and Construction of Hospitals and Outpatient Facilities, and other regulatory requirements as listed in References section. The contractor will ensure the normal business operations are not affected with minimal interruptions during construction. Contractor must comply with all Federal, State, and Local regulations. The Contractor is advised to confer with Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska regarding any Tribal taxes/permit required in conjunction with this work.

Contractor will be required to secure an Infection Control Construction Permit from the hospital Infection Control Officer, and ensure the costs of those precautions are included in the award price. Following award of the Task Order, a preconstruction conference will be held at the Twelve Clans Unity Hospital, and the Hospital Safety Officer will issue any additional permit requirements for working within the hospital.

Contractor will provide red-line drawings to the WCHS Project Officer at the completion of task order.

The Contractor shall restore all areas disturbed by construction, both interior and exterior, to condition at least equal to that existing prior to construction. Contract shall take necessary precautions to minimize any dust, dirt, or tracking throughout the health center during the construction process, and shall be responsible for any required clean-up or damage related to the construction activity. The Contractor shall dispose of all excess construction materials and rubbish in an EPA-approved landfill.

Technical drawings are available for estimating and execution of the construction. The Contractor is encouraged to contact the Contracting Officer (CO), or designee, to arrange a visit to determine the nature and extent of the required construction. Submittals will be required for all tasks marked below with an (*).

IV. CONTRACTOR EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENTS

All organizations submitting a proposal must have completed previous projects in a Healthcare Setting within the last 3 years; includes experience with the Infection Control and Safety Risk Assessment Process and ICRA Levels 1-4 used for dust management in a healthcare setting.

V. SUMMARY OF WORK

The work covered under this Summary includes all design, labor, tools and materials required to complete the task item(s) listed below:

Mechanical/Electrical/Plumbing:
 - Install mechanical pressure indicators in room D156, as well as the Isolation Rooms (AIIRs) specified in the full work statement.

- Install new exhaust system for rooms within Radiology, Laboratory, and Physical Therapy;
 the new system will be labeled as EXF-15

- Modify existing ductwork as noted in the full work statement.

- Balance HVAC in each room as indicated in the full work statement; requirements are based on the room being in the "occupied" or "in-use" mode. This consists of approximately seventeen (17) pressurized rooms.

The Circle of Nations-Wahpeton Indian School is an off-reservation boarding school serving Native American students in grades four through eight. CNS is located in southeastern North Dakota in the city of Wahpeton. The school's mission and purpose are reflected in the vision statement: "Spirit of Youth Empowered." The mission of CNS is to build academic achievement and foster healthy development of the whole child in a multicultural environment.

To be eligible to attend CNS, the student must be an enrolled member of a federally recognized tribe (must provide certification of degree of Indian blood) OR be able to prove one-quarter Indian blood quantum with supporting documentation.

Along with the student enrollment application, additional requirements include: current physical examination, up-to-date immunization record, copy of birth certificate, copy of social security card, copy of current school records/IEP, and insurance/medical assistance information. If applicable, please include custody order, counseling information, and juvenile court history. Incomplete applications will take longer to process.

For CNS travel planning purposes, applicants are strongly encouraged to submit COMPLETE applications by Monday, August 5, 2019. Applications received after August 5, 2019 may not be processed before the school start date.

School begins on Monday, August 26, 2019; the travel date has been set for Sunday, August 25, 2019. Additional school information and the travel schedule will be provided upon acceptance.

“Help us, as this 110 year old building has exceeded it’s use” – Roland Warner Winnebago Tribal Treasurer



Native Americans on the Winnebago Reservation. The current facility is over 110 years old and has severe foundational issues. It has served the community well, but it is time for the current building to be replaced.

HISTORY - The 110 year old former church building was donated to the Tribe over 40 years ago. Beginning in the 1970s the Winnebago Tribe began to address public intoxication. Starting first as the IHS detoxification program at Winnebago Indian Health Service.

A few years later based on previous successes, two local ecumenical institutions donated buildings to support the need for a residential halfway house, and a counseling center. This effort has been effective ad public intoxication has nearly been eliminated in the community.

Following in the 1990s the Tribe pursued with HIS construction of a regional HIS drug dependency treatment facility. The facility now provides 6-week treatments for up to 12 individuals on a regular basis.

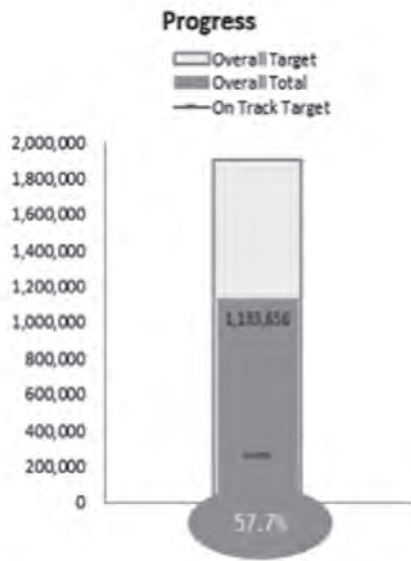
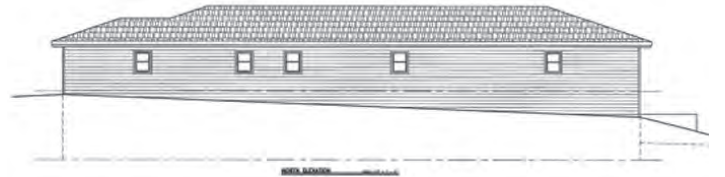
NEED - Native Americans are 1.3 times more likely to be diagnosed with Alcohol Use Disorder than the average American. Our existing services are in jeopardy due to structural issues of aging facilities. The current buildings are not handicapped accessible for residential and counseling. Alcohol counseling services and halfway house are currently not in the same facility to efficiently service clients.

SERVES - The Halfway House serves Winnebago tribal members and Native Americans from several other tribes primarily from the Great Plains Region. Upon leaving Indian Health Service (HIS) Drug Dependency Unity (DDU) individuals often have no place to go and are in need of housing and support to assist the completing their court-ordered rehabilitation. Others who voluntarily seek to overcome alcohol or drug addiction receive housing and support to assist them with rehabilitation. The Winnebago Alcohol Program also provides support through AA and NA as well as looking to starting support services for Co-Dependency groups. Roland Warner, Tribal Council Treasurer noted, “This building has to be replaced. It is standing on its last legs. Those who need to be healed need to concentrate on

The Halfway House fundraising committee is requesting donations to help meet the construction costs to replace the Chee-Woy-NaZhee “House of Hope”, also known as the Halfway House. As our Tribal Chairman, Frank White stated, “Together we can make a better future for the next generation.”

Our goal is to provide a safe environment for Native Americans recovering from alcohol and drug addiction so that they can be productive and positive role models in the Winnebago community or their home community. To make that possible the project will be constructing a 10 bed-residential rehabilitation and alcohol and drug counseling facility for recovering alcohol and drug addicted

their well-being and not worry about the next flood in the basement.”

Ensure that reentry support services are accessible to Native Americans who have been court ordered to obtain alcohol and/or drug treatment.

Razing the current 110 year old facility and replacing it with a modular/pre-fabricated residential facility and a counseling center in the foundational space.

Residential services will accommodate up to five men and five women at any given time.

Peer support and group meetings will be available in the residential setting of the facility.

Lower foundational area will provide office space for up to seven counseling staff, and meeting space for individual, small, and large group counseling sessions.

Supervised physical activities will be made available to both residents of the halfway house and counseling clients on the lower foundational area.

Services once the facility is complete d will include seeking employment, and accessing GED and /or career education.

WEEKLY UPDATE 8.2.19

Fair Fun! I had a great time visiting with folks and enjoying the energetic atmosphere at the Dakota/Thurston County Fair this past weekend. From the Butterfly Encounter to the free rodeo and Equine Parade, from sack races, cake eating and Nail driving contests to the Battle of the Bands, the fair offered a whole lot of something for everybody. For me, it was a packed weekend, as I ran between two fairs, with grandkids participating in the Dakota/Thurston County and the Dodge County Fairs. There's no substitute for the looks of excitement on the kids' faces as they show their projects and receive those coveted ribbons. I was impressed by the hard work and amazing talent on display throughout the entries. As always, I enjoyed attending and appreciate that the communities go all out to provide a fun, welcoming atmosphere and a quality line-up of entry categories and activities. Most of all, I appreciate the community commitment to provide an opportunity for neighbors to connect over good food and great fun. I'm already looking forward to next year!

In other news, the Tax Rate Review Committee had its required meeting this month to determine whether the sales and income tax rates in Nebraska should be changed. The Legislative Fiscal Office presented a report to the committee. No action was taken.

To summarize the report, General Fund receipts for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-19 were \$131.4 million above the April forecast. By law, the additional revenues will be transferred to the State's "Rainy Day Fund" (Cash Reserves). The adjusted revenue receipts for FY 2018-19 rose 8.7%, compared to the forecasted 5.7% increase. However, the actual increase from the prior year is 7.2% (rather than 8.7%). The difference is due to adjustments such as a shift of income tax revenue from FY 2019 to 2020 due to delayed filings related to flooding. How the FY 2018-19 revenue performance will affect the forecasts for the next two fiscal years (FY2019-20 and FY2020-21) will be addressed at the October meeting of the Nebraska Economic Forecast Advisory Board (NEFAB). I'll keep you posted.

Finally, I've been waiting for word from Nebraska Department of Transportation (NDOT) about the Hwy. 94 Bridge in Pender that was damaged by the spring flooding. Although damaged and impassable bridges are an inconvenience

for everybody and we wish things moved more quickly, we also recognize the widespread damage to infrastructure throughout the state. We finally received a status and funding update from NDOT that I'd like to share with you:

HWY 94 East of Pender Project Status: The contractor, Valley Corp, has notice to proceed and will begin the process of excavation following utility location Tribal monitoring has not impacted the schedule of the project as of August 2, 2019.

The Nebraska Department of Transportation (NDOT) does have a six percent TERO tax agreement with the Omaha Tribe and is currently negotiating a Tribal Monitoring Agreement for the HWY 94 bridge and river bank repairs as the Omaha tribe has requested tribal monitoring on the project..

The project is a result of the March 2019 flooding which means it is covered by a Governor's Emergency Declaration, as well as a Federal Major Disaster Declaration. The severity of the event allows the NDOT to expedite the procurement and construction process to restore essential traffic. This means that the typical construction process, to include the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process, is adjusted to allow mobility to be reestablished as quickly as possible.

For repair work on the estimated \$156M in damages to the federal-aid eligible transportation system, initial financial responsibility falls upon the NDOT with the Federal Highway Administration reimbursing NDOT after the repairs are complete. Reimbursement rates are dependent on if work is temporary (100% federal) or permanent (80% federal and 20% state). For roads off the federal-aid system the financial responsibility falls to the local entity and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
