

Winnebago Tribe has big role in White House Tribal Nations Summit



Winnebago Tribal Chairwoman Victoria Kitcheyan and Deputy Solicitor for Indian Affairs, Ann Marie Bledsoe Downes lead historic panel discussions at the White House Tribal Nations Summit held in November. These Ho-Chunk ladies represented at the national level for all indigenous nations.

Winnebago, NE – On Monday, November 15, The Biden Administration hosted the White House Tribal Nations Summit. This summit hasn't been held since 2016 and was the first under the Biden/Harris administration. Kick-off the virtual summit, Winnebago Tribal Chairwoman, Victoria Kitcheyan had a big role in facilitating a discussion with Chief Medical Advisor to the President of United States, Dr. Anthony Fauci. During Chairwoman's opening remarks she said "I woke up this morning thinking of the Late-Great, Dr. Frank LaMere. He said make them uncomfortable..."

Also joining the discussion was the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, Xavier Becerra. Both Dr. Fauci and Secretary Becerra shared their thoughts to Chairwoman

Kitcheyan about the impact of Covid-19 in Indian Country. Addressing the need for more tribal members to get vaccinated because of the higher health disparities among indigenous populations.

Winnebago Communications Officer, Garan Coons and Winnebago Tribe's I.T. Director, Brandon Stout helped set up the virtual set for Chairwoman Kitcheyan. "It's pretty awesome to get a call from the White House asking to help set up the camera and microphones, but I think everyone should be proud of the role that Winnebago Tribal Members, Tori Kitcheyan and Ann Marie held in this year's White House Tribal Nations Summit" said Coons. After Chairwoman Kitcheyan's panel discussion concluded, the former Ho-Chunk Inc., Community Impact Engagement Director, Ann Marie Downes facilitated a discussion with

Secretary of the Interior, Deb Haaland who also introduced U.S. President, Joe Biden to the virtual attendees. Downes left her HCI position after Secretary Haaland handpicked Downes to serve with her administration as the deputy solicitor for Indian affairs. The discussion was about education in Indian Country.

Chairwoman concluded the discussion with Dr. Fauci and Secretary Becerra by saying "The pandemic is not over and we would like to continue our nation to nation dialog. I would also like to encourage you to listen to the relatives because we have the teachings of our ancestors and the wisdom of our elders. I hope that you think of Indian Country when you craft solutions at the White House..."

A Story from our own: Success is not linear but constantly moving

Aiming for success, Elizabeth "Liz" Johnson is an enrolled member of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska and is the first Ho-Chunk woman to own a trucking company with a customized look that has a spotlight bringing awareness to the Missing Murdered Indigenous Women movement. We pama kere winga is Elizabeth's Indian name, which means Rainbow Woman, is also featured on the truck. Determined to be successful in her own way, Elizabeth overcame many obstacles before she opened her trucking company in May of 2017 and has been on the road ever since.

From her youth, Elizabeth had a hard life and moved off the Winnebago reservation at the age of 12 when she was placed in the care of a foster home. Both on and off the reservation, Elizabeth endured different forms of abuse throughout her youth and adolescence to adulthood. Elizabeth was legally adopted by her Grandmother Lydia Josephine Bradford Johnson. She is the proud mother of four sons: Damian

Johnson, William Smith, Frederick Earl Johnson, and Bruno Chaves Espinoza Jr. Elizabeth graduated with her G.E.D. and went on to receive a mechanics diploma at Western Iowa Tech Community College in Sioux City, IA.

Facing the cold world early on, Elizabeth's personal experiences vary from different forms of abuse, addiction, incarceration, relationships, and motherhood at a young age that all shaped her into the woman she is today. Elizabeth has a message to share about the stigmas that exist within Native American communities regarding recovering addicts. She hopes that her successes can spark that flame of hope and motivation in anyone else struggling with their own personal experiences.

Elizabeth began her journey to obtain her commercial driver's license in 2001. She overcame financial obstacles that hindered her from getting started, so after securing a loan from her credit union, Elizabeth gave praise to her higher power and used her blessings as motivation to change her life and morals. Feeling the need to give back, she was inspired by her niece Jalisa "GiGi"

Horn to use her platform to give back in her own way by putting a spotlight on the MMIW movement across her entire semi-truck. This vision came to fruition by collaborating with other women from the Winnebago community. Each of the women had their own personal reasons for their purpose on the truck. The message reads, "INVISIBLE NO MORE: For 500 years, countless Native women have been murdered or gone missing. Stop killing our sisters."

Her movement comes from within. It takes a heavy amount of bravery to have your story on learning and growing through hard life lessons be shared publicly. Despite having toxic peoples imprints on her journey, being incarcerated and swayed to the side, Elizabeth makes a way for herself. She hopes her story will inspire anyone else dealing with the same struggles to know there is hope; there is strength in knowing your struggles, admitting your downfalls or triggers, and be strong enough to say NO.

"I am not turning back and I will keep moving forward," shared by Elizabeth Johnson.


Question of the Issue:





COVID-19 Testing at Twelve Clans Unity Hospital

Please call (402) 878-3404 for COVID-19 testing appointment.

COURTESY TESTING

(COVID-19 Testing Through the Outpatient Drive-Up Clinic)

COVID-19 testing through the Outpatient Drive-Up Clinic can be utilized for patients who do not need emergency care or have little to no symptoms.

COVID-19 testing is done by **appointment only**. Call the Outpatient Clinic at (402) 878-3404 for an appointment.

Patients who have had a COVID-19 exposure should not get tested until 5-7 days after the initial exposure. This is because you can test negative if you get tested too early. It is possible to test positive up to 14 days after an exposure.

CRITICAL TESTING

(COVID-19 Testing Through the Emergency Room)

COVID-19 testing through the Emergency Room is reserved for patients having severe symptoms like:

- Trouble Breathing
- Persistent pain/pressure in the chest
- New confusion
- Inability to wake or stay awake
- Bluish lips/face

This ensures ER resources are allocated to the community members who need immediate attention. This helps ensure that emergency medical attention is available for you, family, friends, and your loved ones when needed.

develop another racetrack and casino. However, the Norfolk facility is in a bit of limbo while the state of Nebraska examines their approach to future casino development.

Community Development

We have a lot going in Winnebago. The Tribe has allocated significant Federal Covid funding to developing the community and has authorized a wide variety of community projects. Ho-Chunk Inc. was allocated some funding to finish the streets and sewers for the second 40 acres of the Ho-Chunk Village. The Tribe also authorized the construction of another 10 very nice elder's homes. We already charge fairly modest rents on the elder's homes, but the Tribe asked that we set aside a couple units that are designed for lower income elders. The Tribe also insisted we add some solar panels on these units to lower their electrical costs. We also are finishing the infrastructure of the Thunder Way project south of Winnebago, which will open up another 16 housing lots.

I have occasionally been critical of the tribe over the last 25 years, but I need to give credit where it is due. These decisions by the Tribal Council will put in place the infrastructure for housing for the next 10 years and I really appreciate the council using these federal Covid funds wisely.

Historic Fourth Street

Earlier in the year, we purchased one block of Historic Fourth Street in Sioux City, IA. We now own all of the buildings except one small one on the block that includes the historic Aalfs building. We anticipate adding apartments, restaurants and offices to the area. This will give Ho-Chunk, Inc. an even larger presence in downtown Sioux City and set the stage for even more future growth.

Walthill Store

We recently sold the Pony Store in Walthill, NE to the Omaha Tribe. We have had agreements to sell the store to the Omaha Tribe in the past, but for various reasons it never happened. The store had its most successful years when the Omaha Tribe used it to provide for the members. In recent years, the Omaha Tribe hadn't used the store much, so it made sense to sell it to them because they would be able to maximize the facility. This will also allow us to focus on making sure we have enough employees to work at our remaining stores.

Anthony (Tony) Wayne Free, age 62, passed away on August 22, 2021 at his residence in Lincoln, Nebraska of natural causes.

Tony was born on June 30, 1959 in Denver, Colorado to Virgil Lee Free and Dorothy A. (Thomas) Free.

At a young age, he was diagnosed with nerve damage in his ears causing him to be deaf. At the age of 3 his parents enrolled him at the Nebraska School for the Deaf in Omaha, Nebraska. At the age of 18, Tony graduated from the Deaf school and transitioned to living on his own and working for the City/County Law Enforcement Center in Lincoln as a custodian by the age of 19. He worked for 43 years until his passing. Tony had a strong work ethic and over his years of service he only missed 10 days of work.

In life, he enjoyed watching Nebraska football; and only Nebraska. He also was an avid weightlifter. He enjoyed watching TV and visiting with his friends and family.

Due to the circumstances surrounding his death, family not being notified until recent days, his remains were cremated. Upon notification, services and burial were held on November 13, 2021. Services were conducted by Matthew Cleveland Jr. at the Ho-Chunk Center in Winnebago, Nebraska and his ashes were laid to rest by his mother at the James Rave Cemetery in Winnebago.

He is survived by his brother, Carl (Rachel Akins) Free of Farmington, NM and his sister, Alma (Free) Walker of Winnebago; nephews, Jordan and Jacob Walker of Winnebago, NE and one niece, Danelle (Free) McDonald of Winnebago, NE; maternal aunts Velma (Rey) Alaniz and Teala C. Walker, both of Winnebago, NE and many extended family members.

Garden Update

Winter Care of Houseplants

If you grow your own fresh air, you appreciate the liveliness houseplants bring to the indoors during the long winter months. On days when I'm feeling blue, nothing lifts my spirits like taking care of my houseplants. Removing dead leaves, looking for any insect pests that I missed when bringing them indoors last fall, pinching off leggy stems for rooting later, checking soil levels, setting aside plants that require further attention, and admiring the handsome plants are just some of the tasks I look forward to.

If leafy plants aren't your thing, consider growing one of the hugely popular succulents now found in garden centers and online. They offer the ease of growing cacti without all the thorns that make them user-unfriendly.

Light

Unless you have a greenhouse or grow lights, keeping houseplants at their finest during the winter months can be a challenge. With sunlight intensity and duration at a low point, even the best window in the house can keep plant growth to a minimum. Give plants a quarter turn each time you water to keep plants from leaning and getting top heavy. Pinch off stems that have gotten leggy to keep plants looking good and place the cuttings in water for rooting. These can be potted up to give away as gifts or used to dress up outdoor containers in spring.

Fertilization

With reduced growth during the winter months, a houseplant's need for nutrients drops. Unless plants have supplemental grow lights, continuing to fertilize during the winter months risks the buildup of fertilizer salts in potting soil, reaching critical levels that can kill plants. For houseplants in the window, fertilization should take place March through October, when sunlight intensity and duration promotes plant growth and vigor.

Watering

Snow melt water (allowing it to come to room temperature before using), rainwater, and water saved from the AC unit last summer are great for houseplants. Water from these sources have low amounts of minerals that make water hard but do contain trace elements beneficial to plants. Well water and tap water are OK to use but have lots of minerals that can leave deposits on the soil surface. Water-softened water is harmful to houseplants and should not be used at all. The best way to water houseplants is from the top down, allowing excess water to drain into the catch dish below. Allow plants to remain in the excess water for about an hour before emptying the catch dish. The method of watering houseplants known as wicking, along with leaving drained water in catch dishes, deposits minerals and salts on soil surfaces as water evaporates. Water temperature plays a huge

The third thing is that Mauna will gather people from all four directions. The psalm continues:

He sent out his word and healed them, and delivered them from their destruction. Let them thank Mauna for his steadfast love, for his wondrous works to the children of man! And let them offer sacrifices of thanksgiving, and tell of his deeds in songs of joy!

They mounted up to heaven; they went down to the depths; their courage melted away in their evil plight; they reeled and staggered like drunken men and were at their wits' end. Then they cried to Mauna in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress.

The psalm concludes with these words: Whoever is wise, let him attend to these things; let them consider the steadfast love of Mauna.

Setting Houseplants Outside

In spring, when nighttime and daytime temperatures have reached 55° F and higher, houseplants can be moved outside to take advantage of the weather. Because they are weaklings from their protected time indoors, plants should be acclimated first. Start by putting them beneath the shade of a tree or a porch, out of any direct sun, wind, or precipitation. Every few days, move plants to a more exposed place, eventually moving them to a full sun location. Once plants are hardened off, they can be placed in their permanent summer location.

When you grow houseplants, you're benefitting you and your family's physical and psychological health. So... grow your own fresh air!

Request of Proposal (RFP) for Tutoring Services

I. Background Information

The Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska ("Tribe") is announcing a request for proposal ("RFP") for tutoring services through the Educational Pathways to Student Success program under the Education Department. The tutoring services will be provided on an annual basis to Winnebago community members in grades 4th through 12th until 2025.

The Tribe is federally recognized and organized under the 1934 Indian Reorganization Act. The Winnebago Indian Reservation is primarily located in Thurston County, Nebraska in Northeast Nebraska with Tribal offices located in Winnebago, Nebraska.

Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska is seeking a qualified service provider ("Service Provider") possessing the professional skills and personal attributes making them well suited to serve as tutors and have an affirmative impact on participants, specifically in guiding them toward success in school, and as community members. Tutoring services will be offered to participants in the following categories:

In-school participants who are enrolled in 4th through 12th grades and who are at risk of not graduating or being promoted due to poor academic achievement, or failure to perform at grade level.

Participants who are basic skills deficient as measured by their initial skills assessment, or who may be in need of assistance to help them successfully complete the program of studies they are enrolled.

Service Provider will work collaboratively with the Tribe's Education Department and Winnebago Public School personnel.

Program participants may possess some of the following barriers:

_ Basic literacy skills deficient _ School dropout _ Pregnant or parenting _ Disabled

Tutors can expect to work with participants from any or all of these categories who face one or more of the listed barriers.

All service providers are invited to submit their bids.

II. Scope of Work

Service Provider will provide additional academic assistance and instruction to program participants in order to achieve the outcomes set forth by Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska and Winnebago Public School. Tutoring services shall include:

_ Regularly scheduled, in-person or virtual structured sessions in which individualized or group instruction occurs. _ Instruction based on goals derived from participants Individual Education Plans that have been developed with Winnebago Public School staff. _ Assessments to determine if participants progress with positive skills identified in the Individual Education Plans. _ Provide up to 10 hours of individual tutoring or 10 hours of group tutoring per week (Sunday through Saturday) to eligible participants.

The EPSS Project Coordinator will assist with direction and guidance to the Service Provider. Service Provider will be expected to attend occasional meetings with Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska and Winnebago Public School, which may include meeting with tutors who are delivering services, to provide input and feedback needed to continually improve the services provided.

III. Contents of Proposal

of any prior experiences which make Bidder qualified to perform the Scope of Work, previous experience working with Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska or indigenous population or diverse populations, if Bidder is not an individual, the names and credentials and qualifications of the individuals who will be performing the Scope of Work- the Bidder's ability to complete the Scope of Work and billing rates and terms.


