GET OUT THE NATIVE VOTE HELD

[Winnebago, NE / Veteran's Memorial Park] On Monday, November 4th, 2024, the Winnebago Tribe hosted a Get Out The Native Vote Walk at Veteran's Memorial Park. The push was an effort that was planned to create voter turnout for the General Election held the following day. Winnebago

Communications Officer, Garan Coons, coordinated the event at the behest of ongoing discussions around the Tribal Council table. "There was a real intent to make sure the people made their voices heard. The timing was short, but we made it happen." Coons told the WIN.

Voter turnout in Winnebago amongst the tribal membership has been quite hit or miss. One year, when tribal candidates

were on the ballot, participation was strong. However, the following cycle, with no tribal members vying for office, turnout was lackluster at best. Lorelei DeCorra, Tribal Council member, stated openly during Council meetings and publicly, "We must honor our veterans, those who fought for our right to vote by going to exercise that right. We can't

[Winnebago, NE] The application deadline for the 2024 General Welfare Exclusion payment is Friday, November 15th, 2024. All adult age tribal members (18 years old and over) must fill out the application form

in order to receive the payment of these funds. "If you want this GWE payment, you must fill out the application form. No application, no payment. It's that simple.", a Winnebago Tribal Finance staff member told the WIN.

The Winnebago Tribal Council ap-

proved the distribution of the GWE payment back on October 7th, 2024. The protocols for payment were defined at that point, calling for all adult age tribal members to file an application to receive the funds. Minors will have their funds deposited directly into

let them down." The sentiment on raising tribal member awareness toward the issues, and about those candidates who took the time to seek tribal votes was echoed around the table.

General Election Day was Tuesday, November 5th, 2024. Besides the major national elections, both US Senate seats were on the ballot as well as US House seats per usual. Local elections were also being decided with several candidates running for Winnebago Public School Board. Winnebago Village Board members were also up for election. Ironically, no listed candidates were present on the ballot for those empty seats. The ballot measures were also on the back of the ballot. Two measures on women's rights, two measures for marijuana, and one about using tax dollars for private schools. As of press time, none of the results were available.

Winnebago voters did turn out though, keeping the decisions within the reach of local candidates. The WIN will report on final results in the next issue. As for the GOTV Walk, WTN staff told the WIN, "We were very pleased with the overall turnout. The people showed up, got a t-shirt, something to eat, and had a good time showing their support."

their trust account and do not have to file an application.


The application deadline of November 15th was established to allow the tribal staff to collect the information from the tribal membership, and then perform the administrative work necessary to effect individual payouts. "There's really a lot of work that goes into making this happen. So, the sooner we get the applications, the better." Billie Kitcheyan said about the overall GWE payment process recently.

The Tribe also wants to clarify a rumor that is being spread. There is no automatic payment for any adult age tribal member. All adults must fill out the application form in order to be paid. Even though paper check distribution dates are set for December, there will not be a check printed unless the application is completed first. Also, the deadline for submitting the application is hardline stop at close of business on Friday, November 15th, 2024. There will be no exceptions to this deadline. Winnebago Tribal Finance department staff advises all tribal members to get the process completed well before that deadline.

The application is completed online using DocuSign software. This software is the same used by the US Government for some of their most sensitive materials. Upon successful completion of the application, the user will receive a "Thank you." from the software denoting successful submission of the application. Garan Coons, Communication Officer for the Tribe told the WIN, "The site is an important place for our people to complete their applications. It is easy to use, but assistance is available through the Winnebago Senior Citizen Center for any tribal elders who need help."

As of print time, just over half our eligible tribal members have completed the application process. With under two weeks to go, more people need to get the process fully completed. Coons went on, "[t]he S.O.L. date will be here before you know it. Don't be one of those people left out. And don't let your relatives lose out either. Reach out to the tribe or the administration for help if you need it. We're here to help everyone get this payment."

All adult age tribal members must fill out the application form to receive these funds. No check will be printed, no funds will be paid out to you, unless you complete the application. DEADLINE IS FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 15th, 2024, close of business day.



"Our Citizenship is in heaven"

'For, as I have often told you before and now say again even with tears, many live as enemies of the cross of Christ. Their destiny is destruction, their god is their stomach, and their glory is in their shame. Their mind is on earthly things. But our citizenship is in heaven' [Philippians 3:18-20a NIV].

There are those who place their faith in Jesus and His sacrificial death on the cross, where he paid for the sins of one and all. And then there are those who are enemies of the cross of Christ. Such enemies of Christ also despise and hate, ridicule and slander his followers.

Those who place their faith, their trust, their hope in Jesus and his saving work do not have our minds on earthly things. Humbly, we acknowledge Jesus' apparent defeat on the cross. But we also have faith that on the third day Jesus rose victoriously from the grave. On that first Easter Jesus danced the dance of victory!

The Declaration of Independence begins: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.' An unalienable right is one that no one should deny since it was given by one's Creator.

A declaration is one thing - reality is another. Slaves were not considered equal and were not counted as equal in the population

counts. For every five slaves - three would be counted. Slaves gained their freedom in 1863 with the 13th Amendment to the Constitution.

The right for women to vote was not given to them until 1920 with the 19th Amendment.

And in the 1924 Citizen Act - Native Americans were finally recognized as citizens of the United States. In this land, they can claim dual citizenship in their nation within a nation.

We have come a long way - and yet - and yet though we are endowed by our Creator with certain unalienable rights - including life - not all life is protected. The lives of some are protected - including the life of a mother, but not necessarily the life that she carries within her. That life can be brutally ended and over a million of such lives each year end before his or her first breath.

As citizens of the United States - we have rights - and with these rights come the responsibility to do our duty - even if there are those in our country who do not do their duty - their God-given duty! Our duty is to speak up for the unalienable, God-given rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness for one and for all.

Unlike the words of the Declaration of Independence which said one thing and in reality was not true - those who believe in Jesus are assured of these unalienable rights in heaven. In heaven believers in Jesus Christ will live forever with liberty - having been freed from sin and its consequences.

Furthermore - believers in Jesus will no longer seek the pursuit of happiness - we will have it!

Believers in Christ Jesus will be gathered from every tribe, including those who speak whatever language, as well as those from every nation and together they will have life - everlasting life with their Creator, along with His Son their Redeemer and His Spirit!

Our citizenship is in heaven with our Creator, His Son our Lord and Savior, along with His Holy Spirit!

Purple Rain is one of his most prominent songs. When I think back about it, all the cruising on the back roads with your soon-to-be snag, just throw on some Purple Rain and enjoy the evening.

Christina: I take back my previous choice. I have to go with my longtime favorite, the Queen, Mariah Carey, the younger Mariah with her fresh vocals, I tend to always join her in the "studio" when I'm in the car. But to narrow down to one song is most difficult, but I'm going to go with "Vision of Love" it captures all of her unique vocals and is one of the classics.

Bethani: Even with advanced notice, I still struggled with picking ONE star from the sky! My band was Tom Petty & The Heartbreakers, so narrowing down to one song was difficult. DRUM ROLL PLEASE! I'll have to go with "Runnin' Down a Dream". From the instrumentals, to vocals, to the lyrics, & of course Mike Campbells guitar solo, it is an absolute classic!!

STORYTELLERS: Gordon Rave

The Winnebago Indian News sat down recently with a special tribal member, Gordon Rave. Gordon serves as the Commander for the Winnebago Veteran's Association, and he is also the Veteran's Service Officer (VSO) for the Winnebago Tribe. Gordon agreed to speak with the Winnebago Indian News in light of our special issue we are running for the 2024 Veteran's Day Holiday. Gordon is himself a veteran, of course, and he shared some of his experiences with us. Those stories are lively and authentic. We are honored to hear them and share some of them with you here. Gordon also includes some of his current activities as WVA Commander – a post he takes seriously and holds with pride and honor.

The WIN will employ a standard verbatim dialogue throughout this printed interview to preserve as much as possible the original intent and context of our discussion. However, some editing has been done for clarity. The original transcript remains in the WIN's possession. Gordon's appearance in the WIN is entirely voluntary and his perspectives are his. So, please enjoy this conversation as it is meant to describe his points of view on the life he has, and the experiences he's lived. We are so glad he openly shared them with us. The WIN appreciates his ability to open-up and share so much of his story with us. Ladies and Gentlemen, please allow me to introduce our second Storyteller, exclusively in this issue of the Winnebago Indian News: Mr. Gordon Rave – in his own words.

WIN (W) - Please introduce yourself.

Gordon R. (G) - First, my name's Gordon Rave and I'm the Veterans' Service Officer for the Winnebago Tribe. I work closely with the Veterans Affairs Office in Lincoln, NE. They oversee what I do. I also work with Thurston County Veterans Services Officer, Penny Warren. My job is to assist Veterans in claims for medical reasons. A veteran who went to war, or [non-combat] if they have [various infirmities] we can help them get claims for that. It helps them out.

I served active duty in Fort Benning, Georgia. I went to Airborne school in Fort Benning, Georgia. I went to Air Assault School in Fort Campbell, Kentucky. I did a year there and then I came back and got into the National Guard. I did ten years with the National Guard. Altogether I did 16 years in the service.

(W) What was your main motivation for enlisting?

(G) Leonard Zach! (laughs). Leonard was the one that got me into it. He was an Army veteran, and he was in the National Guard. So, when I got in I started off in the National Guard. After basic just before we graduated there's a bunch of Airborne guys sitting there at a table, and they had their maroon berets on, dressed sharp, and I signed my name on the list not thinking of what I did. (laughs)

After I graduated from basic, they handed me orders saying I was active duty. And then I ended up coming home anyway to straighten things out. They gave me a year to do it. Within that year I went to Haskell. I spent one year down at Haskell and that next summer I was back on a plane back to Georgia on active duty.

(W) So, you jumped from the planes?

(G) Yes!

(W) Did you ever get used to it?

(G) It's a good excitement. From Fort Benning to Fort Campbell as a repel student I repelled out of helicopters. A lot of walls and stuff. I enjoyed that training. When you graduate you get your jump wings. When you graduate from air assault school, they give you wings with a little helicopter on it. I'm authorized to wear both of them. I seldom wear either, but it's nice to have. I completed the training, which takes a pretty strong person to do it. Everybody can make it, just have to have the discipline to do it.

(W) Can't imagine the anxiety the first time.

(G) The first jump I wasn't scared. I wasn't. It was the second jump! Because I knew what was going to happen. (laughs) The turning of your stomach and the excitement. It hits you all at once and when you're getting to the door, and your hand and the static line to the jump master and all the butterflies... the first one didn't have the butterflies because you didn't understand what was going to happen. And you get to the door, and you jump out. But the second time you feel all the anxiety and nervous and then jump out! (laughs) The third one was a little easier (laughs) ... but it was the second one for me.

(W) [on other Airborne veterans]

(G) One of them, Mark Aldrich, he was a jump master. He did a lot of jumps. He was with the 82nd Airborne, so he did a lot of jumps with them. A jump master is an instructor of teaching people how to jump. He was a Sergeant in charge of them. He had

more jumps. You can have 80 to 100 jumps or even more. You could be a Senior Jump Master with more.

(W) [on being overseas]

(G) I went to Germany. I wasn't there very long. I went there as we call it 'reformer' back then. I don't know what they call it now. Most of those old guys would say, oh you're a 30-day wonder. I was there a little bit longer than 30 days. We were there for training. I liked it.

I learned a few German words. About counting money and stuff. Herman Brown was around he'd always talk German to me, and I think I remember hearing that word once (laughs). But Herman was fluent in German. He could speak German like English and Hochunk too. He was a versatile person like that.

It's a really pretty country, from what I seen. We was always on the base and would drive trucks to places. But the little parts I seen, it was nice. I would have liked to go back [some time]. The people were really nice. And once they found out I was native, they had a lot of questions, and they treated me really good.

(W) [discussion on Germany and its people]

(G) They [German citizens] had so many questions that they'd ask you. The way they present the questions and the way they talk to you. They're excited to see what you had to say and what you do. They treat you really nice over there.

We had one powwow where two bus loads, people from Germany came [here]. They were talking to Leonard. And I said, "I know someone who could help us out." And Leonard said, "where's Herman at?" He [Herman] was walking around with a video camera. And we got him, he comes over and this guy said something to Herman, said it in German. Herman turned around and said something right back. That guy looked at Herman and he said, "You understand what I said? And Herman rambled off something else in German and they [all] just kind of surrounded him and was throwing questions at him in German! (laughs)

He [Herman Brown] ended up taking them around the powwow grounds and telling them what was going on. They enjoyed themselves with his company and he was explaining the tradition to them. After the powwow was over Herman said, thanks for doing that. I said, "What do you mean? (laughs) [Herman replies] You just kind of pushed me in there! (laughs) I was like, well you're the only person I could think of who understands. (laughs)

(W) [about his Germany era]

(G) We was there in 1985. Maybe 84. I say we because I knew Garrett [Walker] was over there. Thunder [Walker] was over there. Joey Bigbear. Tony Provost. Tyler McKeeagan. I think Tyler was over there. And I was. So, we were all over there, but never seen each other. We were on all different bases. It was kinda nice to know that they were there. I'm sure there were more [in Germany] but I think Charlie [Aldrich] and Scott [Aldrich] were there too, but I'm not sure. It's kind of a main thing to be sent over there.

The Marines go to Okinawa and Japan. They kind of got their own places, but so does the Army. Every Army guy would go to Germany and every Marine would end up in Okinawa. (laughs).

(W) [on Cold War Germany]

(G) When we were there, it was separated, and you had to watch what you were doing. You could get shot. When we went somewhere we had live ammo. You never knew what was going to happen. A bombing could happen, people shooting at you when you're driving down on a convoy. Skirmishes would [happen].

(W) [on being recruited]

(G) I was a junior in High School and it was a guard thing for the day. They took us to Camp Dodge in Iowa. I was there with about 50 other high school kids from Sioux City and the surrounding area. We got to shoot weapons and learn how to do an obstacle course. We would repel. Just get to learn to do stuff that services guys did. They even had little booths like first aid and how to look at a map. They just had little stations all over. And after that weekend was over Leonard said, what do you think? And I said, it sounds like something I could do. Probably a couple months later I went back up there and said yeah, I'll join up.

Right after my junior year I left for basic training. After my senior year I went back for my advanced training. I was there. It was about a week after my junior year. I think I missed about a week of school. Jumped back in. I played soldier on the weekend and did school. I was government property after that! (laughs) I wouldn't change it for [anything].

(W) [on being involved with the Winneba-

go Veteran's Association]

(G) [It was] Leonard! (laughs) He was the Vice-Commander, the Treasurer, the Secretary. At one point, Matt Cleveland, Sr. was the Commander. Gerben Earth was Vice-Commander. Leonard was the Secretary and Charles Lonewolf was the Treasurer. But they only had 8 people. To this day we're still a small group. We got a lot of younger veterans that we've been trying to recruit to come and help us, especially at a funeral. We do the 24-hour watch. We try to get the younger guys to sit. Some of the older guys are willing to do it because that's a part of tradition. If you want to be involved, just get ahold of [Gordon]. There are no active female members.

(W) [on building a veteran's memorial area and Sgt. John Rice]

(G) We were talking about it. The veterans were talking about it during the powwow. Putting something out to the powwow grounds. A statue or putting the names of the Winnebago service people; the ones who fought in conflicts. I went to one up in Minnesota for John Rice. They have a post up there.

Me and Lucy went to the [area] for John Rice. They have a nice presentation for him. You can read his bio. And people have questions about why that happened to him. I said, "I have no clue. That's just how people were back then. Sioux City, Iowa got a black eye from that. [WIN – it's still there!]

For the President to have to step in and what it caused for that city. [The President] He said, he died for our country, put him in my cemetery. That great honor that the President gave just to move him into Arlington. That was something. We went to visit his grave. Put out tobacco and it was a great honor.

(W) [on history of veterans within the tribe]

(G) We have a lot of veterans that have good stories. I wish we could have recorded Jim Snow, because he had so many. He could tell a story and just capture your attention. He had so many of them. [WIN – and they were true life experiences]

Talking to the older veteran guys that are long gone now, Matt Cleveland Sr., would tell a real good story of what he went through. Gerben [Earth] would kinda not say too much. Louie Houghton would tell me a little bit of things, but he kind of stopped after some. Jim [Snow] would tell you a whole lot. Jack LaMere, I was visiting him yesterday and he was telling me stories. It's good for these younger people to sit down with those older veterans and listen to what they have to say. Their stories are so, they'll just capture your attention. And you just sit there and listen to them. They'll tell you a whole lot of things that happened in their younger years. And it helps out. It helps them bring it out and it helps the younger kid understand what life was like back then. And they come out with some good stories.

(W) [Living veterans from eras]

(G) World War II – there are none. Korea – Emma LaMere, she was in Korea. Vietnam – there's only a handful [remaining]. Cold War Era, there's still quite a few, Desert Storm and Afghanistan – there's still many. But they all have stories too.

The last WWII veteran I talked to was Emmett McGhee. I talked to him a little bit because he was there. And there was Hollis Stabler. I spoke to him when he was out to Terry St. Cyr's. [with Winona] when they lived out by the Four Corners. I went out there for something, I sat down, and he was talking to me and was telling me stories and a couple of hours went by. It was just him and I sitting out there. Then Terry and Winona showed up and there's a cop car sitting out there! (laughs). What's going on?! We were just sitting there, talking away. He was telling me all these stories. I just keep in mind what he told me. He was telling me about what he seen. It was interesting.

I got to meet a lot of older veterans and listen to what they said because it was something they maybe told other people. Or maybe they didn't tell other people. Some of the older guys I know, if you weren't in the military and you didn't see certain things, they wouldn't talk to you. If you never ducked a bullet they wouldn't explain it. They wouldn't tell you what it was like. They would just kinda stop. You didn't do your time, so I'm not going to tell you. Once you understand that they know you were in the service and did a whole lot of things, they'd bring out that feeling and let you hear their story. That's how I probably got along with a lot of them, just sit down and listen to them. Enjoy what they were saying. Because during that time they could have been taken off from this Earth. Some of them got injured while they were in the service. They still came home but there was a lot of things that went on during that time. Them telling me was interesting. And I had a lot of questions.

(W) [on being a veteran]

(G) When you raise your right hand and you take the oath, you're telling them you'll lay your life down. No worries, no gripes, no complaints. Your job is to defend the United States. If it comes down to giving your life, that's what you do.

(W) [Asked about the upcoming event in California.]

(G) The US Coast Guard, Petty Officer Red Horse. He contacted me and wanted to know if the Winnebago Veteran's Association would assist them in bringing in colors. So, I asked him what it was about, and he said it was for National Native American Heritage Month. The Coast Guard is putting on a presentation. They want some speakers there. There will be other tribal members there from all over. Other California tribes will be there. We're getting things rolling so we can go. We're going to be presenting colors. They've already told me about their parade field – it's a really big parade field. They said they wanted people, if they can, to be in regalia. They asked if we had princesses who wanted to go out there. Funding-wise, California is a long way out there.

(W) Where is this event?

(G) In San Pueblo. It's just south of L.A. It's a Coast Guard base. The Petty Officer sent the agenda saying they wanted to serve us breakfast. We would walk around the base and look at everything. Do the presentation. Then have lunch. Then they want to take us on a ship and go across the harbor. They said that if no one wants to go ride on a ship they don't have to. But they want to take us on the harbor and take us to another part of the Coast Guard [areas]. They'd want us to do the same thing as the day before, present colors, etcetera.

All the veterans that are going are those who help out all the time. Like funerals for veterans, carrying flags for powwows. So, all those who help out all the time, we wanted to reward them for helping.

(W) Is this the first time for the event?

(G) No. They do it every year. But it is the first time for the Winnebago Veterans to go. They contacted me and I let the Omaha tribe know too. But I don't know if they're going to go.

They got quite a few members who participate in things. Their Commander, Andy Merrick and Greg Phillips, they're the two that control what they do. I told Greg about it, and he said they might be going too, which would be nice. Because the native tribes out in California and up the coast [they attend], they had people from Pine Ridge go once, but no one passed that [East of] - except us now. So, they're trying to get native organizations to help out. It's on the 18th of November.

(W) [on Veteran's Powwow 2024]

(G) The event is coming up. [November 9th, 2024] The Women's Auxiliary will be cooking. There will be a newly crowned Veteran's Powwow Princess this year too. My granddaughter will be giving up her crown, but she's had it for two years. She was happy to wear it. We didn't have the powwow last year due to the funerals. I hope everyone can come down to the [Whirling Thunder Wellness] gym and join us.

(WIN) Thank you, Gordon for coming up and speaking with us. We quite enjoyed our discussion. Come back anytime.

Good luck out in California later this month as you continue to represent our Winnebago people. The tribe will look forward to the Veteran's Powwow at the Whirling Thunder Wellness Gym on Saturday, November 9th, 2024. You can find more information about the powwow at winnebagotribe.com

Little Priest: The Last of the Breed

I'd like to dedicate this story to all our veterans, past and present. From the Algonquin Wars of the 1620's with the Potowatomies. To the war on Terror in Afghanistan. If it wasn't for our veterans, we would cease to exist as a people. Winnebago people tend to forget that today. This is not a celebration of contests and giveaways, but a celebration in honor of the last true war-chief of the Ho-Chunk people. The blood that he spilled in 1866, is the reason we are still on the reservation today.

Little Priest (Hoonk-Hoo-No-Kaw) was the son of Mor-ah-tshay-kaw (the traveler). His father was also known as Little Priest and was a village chief at Lake Koshkonong in Wisconsin in 1829. Hoonk-Hoo-No-Kaw was born and raised at the Koshkonong village and became war-chief in 1844, when the Ho-Chunks were residents of the Neutral Ground in Northeast Iowa (1840-46). He signed the treaties of 1846-1855.

In 1862, Little Priest, Hounka (Winnesheik's son), and a dozen others were at the Lower Sioux Agency when the Santee Outbreak started. They joined the Santee-Dakota when they attacked the American settlement at New Ulm. After the battle, the small force returned to their Blue Earth settlement. Since Little Priest was war-chief, he tried to enlist Ho-Chunk warriors in the war. He even organized a soldier's lodge and held meetings concerning America's wrongs and abuses they inflicted on Ho-Chunk people. He did his best to arouse their fighting spirits. But the older chiefs, such as Waukon-Ha Ga, Good Thunder, La Sallier, Good Heart, Four Cloud, Yellow Bank and Little Decorah wanted peace and since Little Priest respected the wisdom of his elders, war was called off.

This was a big disappointment for the Santee-Dakota, because if the Ho-Chunks were at their side, they could of captured Fort Ridgley and the town of New Ulm. Resentment soon broke out between the two groups. And this resentment and hatred ripened into open hostility between 1863-67. In 1863, the Ho-Chunks were moved to their new reservation at Crow Creek, South Dakota. After seeing some of their people die from starvation, Little Priest and his band, and Winnesheik and his group escaped down the Missouri to the Omaha Reservation in Northeast Nebraska.

In the summer of 1863, Chief Little Priest and 46 other warriors enlisted in a Nebraska Cavalry Regiment and fought with General Alfred Sully against the Teton-Lakota at the Battle of Heart River in North Dakota. This Ho-Chunk contingent continued westward with General Sully, when he marched to the region of the Yellow Stone in late 1863.

In August of 1864. Chief Little Priest's Company of Winnebago Scouts were placed under Captain Christian Stuff, an able cavalry leader out of Fort Omaha Nebraska. On August 10, Little Priest and his Scouts led the charge against the Miniconjou Lakota at the Killdeer Mountains in North Dakota. Five days later on August 15, they battled bands of the Tetonwan and Northern Cheyenne at the Battle of the Little Missouri River in Eastern Montana.

By late fall of 1864, 22 more Ho-Chunk warriors enlisted in Company C, and 24 in Company D, of Fort Omaha's, Nebraska Veterans Battalion and joined their War Chief when he fought the Tetonwan, Ihanktonneanna and Wehpetonwan bands of Sioux at Whitestone Hill, North Dakota. While Little Priest was away that fall. Other Ho-Chunk warriors joined the Omaha and stopped the Miniconjou and Sicanga at the Battle of Homer Hills (Present day, Beer Can Hill). These same warriors also had a running battle with the Miniconjou near Mondamin, Iowa. According to tribal legends, the lake north of Mondamin ran red with the blood of the Sioux. Ho-Chunk, and Omaha warriors.

Chief Little Priest returned home in December and led the charge. Then the Ho-Chunks fought the Oglala and Miniconjou Lakota near the site of present-day Winnebago on January 5. After regrouping, the same Lakota bands met Chief Little at the battle of Winnebago Hills, one mile west of the present town of Winnebago. After spending a cold winter in South Dakota, bands of Oglala and Miniconjou fought a revenge with Chief Little Priest at Honey Creek on the Missouri River. Fifteen days later on May 15, Chief Little Priest annihilated a war party of Tetonwan Lakota near George Snake's old residence near the Winnebago/Omaha southern reservation border. Arrowheads are still found at the battle site. By the end of Spring 1865, the buffer zone between the Omahas and various Sioux bands was established. And Sioux raids into Omaha territory came to a stop.

The Sioux at this time began to consider Chief Little Priest "Big Medicine". Because he always accepted death every time, they encountered him and his warriors. After the fight near the site of George Snake's, Little

Priest, his son John Priest, his brother Grey Wolf and about 70 other Winnebagoes enlisted in Company "A", of the Fort Omaha Scouts at Decatur, Nebraska. Little Priest remarked, "that it hurt him deep in his heart to fight his own brothers, but he wanted to bring peace to his people, because he did not want to move again.

At Fort Omaha, the Scouts were issued uniforms, guns, ammunition, horses and provisions. Then they proceeded westward, through Fort Kearney, Julesburg, Fort Laramie, Wyoming, to a part known as Deer Creek. From there they went north into Montana where they encountered Red Cloud's band of Oglala Lakota, with some Northern Cheyenne, Northern Arapohoes, and Itazipco Lakota. This battle was known as the Battle of Tongue River. Chief Little Priest again distinguished himself in battle and was wounded in the leg while leading a charge against the enemy.

After this battle, the Ho-Chunks acted as an escort to an emigrant band of 35 wagons on their way to San Francisco. They accompanied this train as far west as the Big Horn Mountains. Returning from this expedition they were stationed at Fort Tyndall on the Power River. Then came the skirmish on the Power River, the day Chief Little Priest's medicine ran out. While out looking for horses, Little Priest and the others encountered a band of Tetonwan, probably Oglala Lakota. A fire fight began whereas Chief Little Priest became separated from his companions, which consisted of his sons, John Priest, Walking Priest, and James Bird. The Lakota remember that day clearly for they have a song sung in honor of Ho-Chunk Chief Little Priest. After becoming separated, Little Priest fled to some boulders with the Lakota in hot pursuit. After his horse was shot out from under him, he stood between two huge rocks and fought the enemy for hours. Little Priest was shot four times, one through the body, one above the right lung, and two in the left shoulder. Even with all those wounds, Chief Little Priest managed to kill nine Lakota warriors including their war chief and wounded many others.

The Lakota claim in their song that he changed himself into a "Grizzly Bear", and stood his ground as a Grizzly Bear would. White people would say this was impossible, but not to Indian people who know about Indian Medicine. Little Priest was carried back to the fort with his trophies, which consisted of the war chiefs' horse, his rifle, shield, and his bear skin, all big medicine. When his warriors reached the fort, they performed the Grizzly Bear dance to heal his wounds.

After recovering somewhat, his Ho-Chunk warriors brought him home to the reservation where he died of his wounds on September 12, 1866. His remains were buried in a small mound in the Winnebago area. His brother, now Chief Grey Wolf called a council of all the clans down at the Big Bear Hollow council house and proposed a celebration in honor of his death. Besides honoring their great War Chief. They also honored all veterans of Company A, Omaha Scouts, Nebraska Volunteers.

Many veterans have since followed the road that Chief Little Priest walked at death. And they should not be forgotten. These veterans should be honored with traditional song and dance, not all contests and giveaways or else we will lose the real meaning of Chief Little Priest's death.

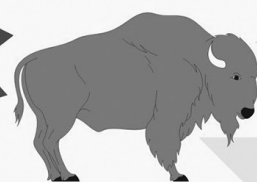
